



Prominant is some very good pressed brickwork - both in a checker board pattern and in an egg and dart motif. A good example of style and type of architecture in which St. Louis excelled. The sunporch appears to be an alteration done in 1913. Other good features are a handsome stained glass window and a copper finial capping the roof top, as well as a modified Palladian window set into a slate gable.

The June 16, 1891 Pitzman survey was for E.A. Hildenbrandt. The city building permit is dated November 13, 1891. It is certainly the oldest house in this area of Compton Heights. Cost \$5,000. Hildenbrandt was a self made man working himself into a position of importance in the real estate industry.



The building permit was issued on July I, 1885 for a \$7,000 brick tenement (multiple dwelling - it didn't have the same connotation as modern usage). As it was built in 1885 Compton Heights and the deed restrictions accompanying it did not yet exist - otherwise, it would not have been legal. The house is still owned by Wolfingers heirs. This is the oldest house in Compton Heights for which a building permit exists.

A city building permit was issued to C. Stoffregan for a \$10,000 two-story brick dwelling on November 12, 1894. The garage was a 1909 addition to the grounds. Its builder was Geo. Mueller Co. In 1916 the house was altered with a brick addition. It was built by Welsch Construction Company. Stoffregan was born in Germany and eventually started a successful retail grocery company here.

Dr. William Swekosky in notes to Mrs. Victor Harris says that the lot was sold June 27, 1894 to Wm. Thorn of the Thorn and Hunkins Line and Cement Co. for \$7,285. 
On March 13, 1906 the Compton Hill Improvement Co. sold this lot to Henry Frank Powitzky, president of Powitzky and Collins Carriage Makers. It was not until March 6, 1908 that the Pitzman Co. made a survey. No building permit exists; the architects Tour Guide, however, says that the house was built in 1909. About this same time the Carriage Co. fell on hard times. After Powitzky's death the house went to his daughter Clara Max, staying the family's until 1941 when it was sold to James H. Hoban.
