

The booklet relates that on Jan. 6, 1868, "four School Sisters of Noire Dame arrived from Milwaukee . . . to take charge of the new parochial school about to be opened in the convent building."

On Jan. 13 of that year Sister M. Clara, the mother superior, opened the school with 38 pupils. But before the end of the scho-lastic year the number of students had swelled to 120.

Structure Razed But in 1872 Father Meller built another school where the present St. Peter's elementary school now stands. It was a twostory brick structure with the first floor serving as a boys' school and the second as quarters from the assistant pastor.

In 1889 this structure was razed to make way for a much larger school needed to meet the increasing number of Catholic

children in the parish. It was in 1889 that the present St. Peter's elementary School was built.

The booklet significantly relates that the school was "a twostory brick building with basement, perfectly in keeping with the imposing church and equal in size, and equal in accomodation and general imposing structure to any school in the (St. Louis) archdiocese."





St. Peter's Roman Catholic Church

(formerly The Cathedral)

_______216 Broadway St. _______Jefferson City, Mo.,

The first Mass said in Jefferson City was in the home of Gerhard H. Cramer, at 325 W. High St. It was said by Rev. Felix L. Verreydt in 1831.

of Mulberry and High St. The northwest corner. Rev. Jamess. . Murphy was the first pastor.

The second church of St. Feter's parish was erected in 1855-56, it was built about where the school is now located.

In 1881 the present church was begun and finished in 1883. The edifice was designed by Messrs A. Druiding and Fred H. Binder, of Jefferson City, to whom the contract was awarded..for \$17,766 (not including the foundation, chapel, over 800,00 bricks and other sundry materials.

This church, which, was the largest and one of the most beautiful in Central Missouri(having been built at an aggregate cost of \$40,000) is in the Gothic style. It is 173% feet in length, 60% feet in width. The height of the spire with the cross if 170 feet. Its seating capacity falls slightly short of 1000. From the tower a chime of four bells sends forth its solemn peals. These bells were cast in the foundry of Henry Stuckstede & Co. St. Louis. Their aggregate weight is 8,000 lbs. Were purchased in 1886 for \$1,354. There is also a \$1,250 tower clock to remind us of time's deceptive flight, and life's steady step toward eternity. The inner church is also purely Gothic. Two majestic tiers of pillars support the double-groined ceiling dividing the church into three naves.

Three Gothic Alters form the foremost ornaments of the church. These are of white walnut. The main alter is 34 feet high, but its newt-carved cross rises he wenward to the height of 50 feet. The side alters are 24 feet in height and marmonize with the main alter in style.

In 1846, at the completion of the first church, there were twelve or fourteen families of the Catholic religion in Jefferson City and vicinity. In 1856 the number had increased to forty. In October 1896 there were 396 families.

First divine service was held in the present building on February 2nd, 1883. It was solemnly dedicated on August 12th, of the same year.

The Tabeve information was compiled from the Golden Jubilee of the Parish booklet, which was published in October 1896. This/celebration took place on October 4th, 1896

This building was elevated to a Cathedral in 1956, but replaced with a new one in 1966..St. Joseph's Cathedral located in the 2200 Blk. of W. Main St. Jefferson City, Mo.,

Cronicle of Our Affiliate
Jefferson City, Missouri
Of the Holy Innocense
Founded 1/6/1868

In November 1867, a Father J. Meller of the said St. Peter's Church made a trip to Milwaukee to request sisters for his school children, after a house f for the school and a residence for the sisters had been built. Rev. Mother Maria Carolina promised him 3 sisters and 1 candidate by 1/6/1868. Accordingly on 1/3 Sr. Meria Richards, Sr. Maria Thebalda, Sr. Meria Pikka and the candidate and a stern departed from Kilwaukee for St. Louis, where they arrived at night between the 4th and 6th at the Sisters of St. Mary's Church. Sr. Richarda took over in place of Sr. Clara the position as Sr. Superior, whereas the latter, Sister Clara, because the latter had been designated Superior for Jefferson City.

Monday, January 6, the said Sisters journeyed in company with Rev. Sister Maria Boneventura, Supr. at St. Joseph in St. Louis, who as representative of the Rev. Mother, was to open the new mission from St. Mary's and arrived about 4 o'clock in the Capital.

We went to the Rectory but did not find Fr. Meller at home and had to await his return from Stringtown for about 1 hr. After he returned, the Rev. Pastor took us to the school. We learned that the home was neither finished nor furnished. In the basement the plaster was not yet dry, the cartpenter work unfinished, the porch open, no fence around the garden, no toilet, no water, in front of the house only steps made of old boards nailed together. Because of unpleasant weather there was little prospect for completion. All the furnishings consisted of some and kitchen dishes and 3 stoves that had not been set up. Since it was about 6 oclock and on this day bitter cold weather set in, there was nothing left for us to do but to accept the offer which Fr. Meller made, to set us up in a hotel. Together with him we went to Virginia Hotel, which Christy Watson operated. Since, on the same day, the members of Legislature arrived here, every room in the hotel was occupied, and we had to wait until 9 o'clock

until we, since morning anything warm to eat. Whereopon we then were assigned to a room to rest for the night. Even here we had to keep ourselves. For 5 persons we had only 2 beds, 3 pillows and 2 bed covers. Our mantles and shawls, because of the cold, had also to play a main role to protect us from the cold. After that, on following morning after we ste breakfast there, we went to church to attend Holy Mass. After that we started to work. By and by beds came and bed clothing to sew were brought to the house. And because no one bothered about buying groceries, the particular lady, to whom this was entrusted, became sick, so Sr. M. Bonaventura and Sr. Clara, with Mr. and Mrs. Walson promised us some provisions. By evening we were somewhat set up to prepare a sparing evening supper, which consisted of cup of coffee and a piece of dry bread, which we partook for it was in our own little convent. We slept on a hard mattress and sparing cover without pillows. Off and on during the night we enjoyed the heat to protect us from grim cold weather.

A whole week passed by furnishing house, cleaning rooms, finishing of beds, etc. Also during this time workingmen were busy in the house finishing and the remaining wood work. Sunday, January 12, it was then announced that the sisters had arrived and now on the 13th school would be open. In the afternoon, after vespets, the house was blessed. Therepoon, the whole parish took part - the people going in procession from the church to the convent.

Monday, the 13th, school was opened with 30 German and 8 Irish children, boys and girls. Sr. Clara took over the larger German group; Sr. Thebelda the larger Am rican and Candidate Ann the little German and Irish children. In the first week, the number of children increased very little. In February the total number increased to 130 children.

We had to pay dearly for the food we needed. No gifts of food were brought to the house.

In the school things went pretty well, although children were used

to little discipline and . In the public school, which was very near here, children were offered everything to draw away from our school.

Right after our arrival, offers were made, ? to give private lessons in music and hand skills.

By the 20th of January came the first ? to our house; by the end of February the number increased to six.

After school, from 4 to 5 o'clock, some of the girls took up ? study periods.

Rev. Sr. Bonaventura received a letter from the Motherhouse to stay here only until everything is finished. But the continued unpleasant w weather prevented finishing the garden? The furnishing for house and school would first have to be made and thus seven weeks went by before everything was in house and we could live a convent life there without being disturbed. Everything took longer, but Rev. Sr. Bonaventura was able, because of pressing business to return to St. Louis February 19.

On March 28 Dr. Bonaventura sent us a very efficient house candidate in the person of Miss Theresia Weisenfeld.

On April 6 began ? . Rev. Mother Boneventura invited us from St.

Louis with the furnishings of our chapel. Next week we received the altar
and its equipment, east that we prepared the chapel for Mass on Easter Sun.,

April 12. On May 1 we received the Most Blessed Sacrament in our house.

In the morning, 7 o'clock, Fr. Meller blessed the altar and everything
that belongs to it ? Thereupon, he calebrated Holy Mass, in which some

, who showed a special interest in our school, participated and occupied the place inside. We sisters and school children were in the room next door. During Holy Mass the little ones were busy. After Holy Mass Rev. Meller gave a beautiful and impressive address. It was our good fortune to have our dear Lord so near to us. Thereupon, he conducted the customary May devotions. In the evening, 6 o'clock, Benediction of the

Most Blessed Sacrament. During the month of May we had 8 Masses in the chapel. Every Sunday we had Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament.

On the Festof the Ascension of Our Lord 17 boys and 11 girls received first holy communion.

On 3 Rogation Days we had here 40 Hours Devotion.

Fr. J. Braun, a Jesuit priest, gave a retreat to the Frist Communicants and also the celebration of their First Communion.

On May 22 came Sr. Bonaventura in order to attend to the business which she could not finish at first vitit, but could not now accomplish very much because Fr. Meller was on a atrip, so Sr. left again on May 23.

By the end of June the fence was finally finished, etc. The fence (Banisters).

On July 25 we celebrated the namesday of our Pastor. The little ones recited verses and brought little presents.

On July 27 began vacation.

On August 8 we went to Washington to make annual spiritual retreat.

Two candidates and a stern T. Weisenfeld stayed here to watch house.

The retreat was to begin Sunday, August 9, but the particular priest, Fr. Hoze (?) got sick. Rev. Peter Seist then gave us a 5 day retreat beginning 9th to 12th (?).

On Feast of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin, Father Bauhaus celebrated Holy Mass in the chapel, during which we renewed our vows. .. altogether 7 sisters. The Sr. Superior of the place, Sr. Fidelis, was in the Motherhouse to make her final vows.

August 18 were turned home.

Sepetember 1 school began again. Altogether 46 children. Until beginning of this suboal year and mother promised two more sisters for music and sewing.

September 9. Sr. Bonaventura brought us Sr. Josephine and Sr. Capilda, the first named for music teacher and last named, housekeeper@

teacher. By Christmas we had 20 music pupils and the number of pupils up to 160.

On second Christmas Day - Feast of Innocent Children and the eve of St. Sylvester, we had benediction in chapel. During Christmas week, for the benefit of the school, a fair and raffle was held, which turned out pretty well, so steps were able to be built at entrance to house.?

On Holy Sat. and Easter Monday we had Benediction of the Most Blessed Sacrament.

On May 2 - First Communion - 19 girls, 16 boys. Fr. Meller prepared children, but immediate preparation was left to us sisters.

On May 4 our Rev. Mother, together with Mother Seraphin, who accompanied her, made us very happy with their visit. But visit was very short.

On May 6, Ascension of Our Lord, they went to Westphalia. From there came back Friday evening. During the evening Sr. Theophisla arrived here from Belleville, who was to take the place of Sr. Josephine. Sat. afternoon Sr. Josephine, with Rev. Mother, left here for Belleville, where the place of Sr. Theophisla was taken over by Sr. Josephine.

May 12. The house sister at different timesbegan to have spells of Weiderspanstigkeit, which probably came from the wallbleitigkeit. The spells
were followed by attacks of Sonderlichkeiten, Abssonderaungen and some
her spells some serious words sufficed. But as time went on the spells
became more frequent, so beginning of June she lost weight and did not
want to eat and then could not and did not want to take care housework.
A letter from Rev. Mother to Sr. Pikka had a good effect and there was rest.

June 13, 1869. The Most Rev. Archbishop Kenrick of St. Louis was here to administer Confirmation. First Communicants and a convert, who had been baptized by Bishop? total number 120

July 23. Because of intense heat began the ? On the same day we celebrated the namesday of Rev. Pastor.

July 24. Sr. Ulricka Fridolina of Westphalia came, in order from

here, to go to our dear Motherhouse to make perpetual vows. On the night of the 25th the 2 sisters, as also Sr. Clara from here, left, meeting Sr. Luidgardis in Washington and arrived about 2 o'clock in the morning, at Rev. Mother Bonaventura, where more traveling companions started out for Milwaukee. Altogether 14 Sisters and 2 candidates, happily and in good spirits, arrived July 30th at dear Motherhouse.

On Aug. 9, the spiritual exercises by Rev. Jesuit Fr. D. Braun began On Aug. 16 we were so very happy to make perpetual vows.

On Aug. 18 we started journey back home. In order to make some purchases, we stayed in St. Louis until the 23rd.

?? Gilberta was the traveling companion of Sr. Clara and was to change places here with Sr. Capilda, who on the 26th left here to Rev. Sr. Bonaventura. The sisters from here, namely, Srs. Theobalda, Theopiska, Capilda and Pikka made retreat in Westphalia.

On Aug 6, the same, with little orphan child, Louisa Zahn, who Rev. Mother, on her visit took over. From here by railroad to Osage, where a wagon had been hired to take sisters to Westphalia. The train arrived 2 minutes late, arriving at 6:02 at Osage, where they immediately got into wagon. After they were in the water a short time, suddenly a dark storm cloud appeared in the sky. All at once a storm broke out and the rain poured and the sisters feared they were near death. After much work and ?? we finally came to landing about 2 o'clock. From here on we still had to go three miles by land. The candidate, who was from Westphalia, sent to meet sisters at Osage, now looked for the next house to refresh ourselves. It was already stark dark and still and the storm was still caryying on and poured down rain. When she finally came to the house and got a wagon, we went on to Westphalia. We arrived about ten o'clock.

Aug. 9 began their spiritual retreat. The prayers were led by Rev. Goldiun and the conferences by Rev. Hoze. (Meditation)

Aug. 15. Renewal of Vows.

Aug. 18. Sisters went to their houses. Sr. Thebalda took care of the house while Sr. Clara was away. Two candidates Stern Weisenfeldt took care of the house during retreat.

Sat. Sept. 4, 1869. Rev. Sr. Mary Scolastica came unexpectedly to change places with Sr. Thebalda. Sr. Thebalda was assigned to go to Florissant to take over the position of Sr. Superior. This mission was to open Sept. 8, so that the Sisters had to leave for St. Louis immediately but a sudden ? prevented them from leaving until Mon. ? Uncertain will try her obedience so that Rev. Mother had to transfer her from there back to Baltimore.

On Sept. 6 school began again with total & 54 children.

Sept. 20. We have ? 7 ? and 15 music pupils. The canditate Pikka began with her ?; constant dissatisfaction. She made herself unbearable. Because Rev. Mother had no one to replace her, we received from Sr. Agatha in Washington temporary help. Sr. Pikka went to Washington. In beginning the change worked out well, but by middle of October I heard from there that the poor sister is mentally ill and had to be taken to St. Louis to hospital.

Oct. 9. We received in the person of candidate Mary Purnhagen help for the house because the lay sister was sickly and could not get along with candidate. Sr. Purnhagen was sent to us by Sr. Bonaventura. Presently we have 10 rostkinder, 20 music pupils, and the parochial school counts 140 children.

Dec. 8. With permission of our dear Rv. Mother, we took in a girl on a part time basis. Her name is Leantine Rautier. Our dear Sr. Mary 8 Scalastica has been complaining for some time about earache; difficulty in hearing. Since the doctor here could do nothing about it, Rev. Mother permitted sister to come to St. L. Accordingly, Sr. Scolastica with Sr. Clara

Sr. Clara for help, who in a hurry tore down all the curtains in order to keep fire from spreading, but roleaux, also curtains and some boquets of flowers, ornaments, gold? altar, pictures were all enveloped in smoke. The ceiling and window frames were black with smoke.

Every Sunday in the month of May, benediction of Blessed Sacrament.

June 24. Feast of Sacred Heart? Fr. Meller had arranged Benediction at £ 5 o'clock. As was her custom, Sr. Roberta went to Sacristy to get Monstrance, cape and velume. Fr. Meller had habit on Sundays after Benediction to take Blessed Sacrament out of Monstrance and put in container in the Sacristy. Then it happened, previous Sunday, a strange priest conducted afternoon devotions and left the Blessed Sacrament in Monstance. He should have locked it in the Tabernacle. Sr. Gilberta





The original building on this site contained 47 rooms, and was used for hotel purposes for years, then adapted to school uses. The Board of Education rented the parlor and dining room for temporary quarters of high school classes in 1885.

This section of the byilding remained the same except for changes of the tops of the windows which are now arched. On June 7, 1899, an article appeared in the Jefferson Ctiy Daily Press with headlines reading "Tennessee House, part of the historic hotel building being torn down to make room for modern store building.







THE SUPREME COURT

Under Article II of the 1945 constitution, the powers of government are divided into three distinct departments—the legislative, executive, and judicial—each of which shall exercise separately and independently the powers belonging to such department. The highest court in the judicial department is the Supreme Court, consisting of seven judges, which has general superintending powers over the entire judicial department, including the power to prescribe the procedure and practice to be followed in the trial of cases in other courts.

The Supreme Court performs the greater part of its work in two divisions, each consisting of three judges. Each division is assisted by three commissioners who sit with the judges when cases are heard. The commissioners are appointed by the Court and serve for a term of four years. The decisions of the Court are in the form of a written opinion prepared by a judge or commissioner, and adopted by a vote of the judges.

The seven judges also act as a single court, which is referred to as sitting "en banc". The judges

elect one of their number as chief justice who presides over the Court en banc and has a number of important duties in connection with the administration of the judicial department.

If the judges in one of the divisions do not unanimously agree upon an opinion, the case is transferred to the Court en banc. Also, some of the more important cases are assigned to the Court en banc.

With certain important exceptions, the work of the Supreme Court, both en banc and in divisions, is limited to a review by an appeal or other proceeding, of cases which have been tried in one of the lower courts. Printed or typewritten briefs are filled by each side, and usually there is an oral argument. The party who has taken the appeal, termed the "appellant", is ordinarily allowed 40 minutes to argue his case and may divide the time between opening and closing the argument. The other party, termed the "respondent", is permitted 30 minutes, which follows the main argument of the appellant. The Court hears arguments in several cases in the course of a day, sitting from 9 to 12 and 2 to 5 if that much time is required to dispose of the cases set for that day.

After the arguments for the entire day are linished, the Court, or the division, as the case may be, meets privately in a conference room where each of the cases is discussed and tentative votes are taken. The cases are then assigned, in rotation, to individual judges or commissioners for the preparation of opinions. Once a month the Court en banc and the reences" where opinions are voted upon. If a division opinion receives the vote of all, or of a majority, of the Court, unless one of the judges has dissented, in which event, the case may be transferred to the Court en banc for final disposition. Opinions are adopted en spective divisions meet in what are termed "conferthe judges in the division, it becomes the opinion of banc when they receive the vote of a majority of the judges. In the course of an average year, several nundred opinions will be filed. Since 1940, the judges of the Supreme Court have been selected by the non-partisan court plan provided in the constitution. A commission of seven members, consisting of the chief justice, three mem-

bers elected by the attorneys, and three members appointed by the governor, submits the names of three nominees to the governor, one of whom he appoints. At the next general election after twelve months in the office, a judge so appointed runs on a separate ballot on which the voters vote "yes" or "no" to the question of whether he shall be retained in office. If so retained, he holds office for 12 years. At the expiration of his term, no further nomination is required, but he may run on a similar ballot for a successive term. If a majority of those voting on the question vote against his retention, a vacancy is created which is again filled in the same manner.

THE HISTORY OF THE COURT

When Missouri became a state in 1821 the Supreme Court consisted of only three judges who were appointed by the governor with the advice and consent of the Senate. It was not until 1851 that a constitutional amendment provided for the election of judges of the Supreme Court. The elective system remained in force until the adoption of the non-partisan court plan in 1940. The Court was increased to five judges in 1872 and in 1890 it was increased to the present number of seven judges and provision was made for two divisions. The new constitution authorized additional divisions if necessary.

Since 1875, provisions in the constitution have required the Supreme Court to hold its sessions only in Jefferson City. Prior to that date, court was held in many different cities. In 1821, when the Court was first created, it met in St. Louis, in St. Charles, which was then the state capitol, in Cape Girardeau, and in Franklin, an early settlement of considerable importance which has since been destroyed by a shift in the channel of the Missouri River. At various times prior to 1875, the Court also sat at Fayette, Bowling Green, Boonville, Palmyra, Potosi, Lexington, Columbia, Hannibal, Jackson, and St. Joseph. For over 100 years at least one session each year has been held in Jefferson City.

The files and opinions of the Court reveal the history of Missouri. Early cases deal with such matters as the fur trade with the Indians. Many of the early cases dealt with slaves or slavery. The most

famous one, decided in 1852, was the Dred Scott case, where the Court denied liberty to a slave who had accompanied his master to a free state. A similar ruling by the Supreme Court of the United States was one of a series of events that led to the outbreak of the Civil War. In 1867, in the so called "test oath" cases, the Supreme Court of Missouri held invalid, as an ex post facto law, a provision of the 1865 constitution adopted just after the Civil War which attempted to take away civil rights from persons who had been Southern sympathizers and therefore could not take the prescribed oath of loyalty. Questions arising out of our subsequent wars appear in later decisions. (For Historical Review of the Judicial System of Missouri see volume 27 Vernon's Annotated Missouri Statutes, pages 1 to 26)

At the front entrance is a large lobby, the principal feature of which is a massive marble staircase with railings of ornamental iron work and a brass handrail. The first floor contains the offices of the commissioners, clerk, marshal, reporter, the Judicial Conference, and the attorney-general. The second floor contains the library, two court rooms, and the quarters (known as "chambers") of one of the judges. These quarters were used temporarily as the office of the governor after the old capitol burned in 1911, as was Division One court room for the Senate Chamber. The other judges have chambers on the third floor.

The two court rooms at opposite ends of the second floor are almost identical except for a difference in the color scheme of the furnishings. The eastern court room is used by the Court when it sits en banc and by the judges and commissioners of Division 1 when sitting as a division. The western court room is used by the judges and commissioners of Division 2. Each court room has an entrance lobby and a side entrance which leads into a conference room for the judges. Running across the end of each

court room is a massive mahogany bench, behind which are the chairs for the judges and commissioners. In front of the bench is a table and podium from which the attorneys make their arguments to the Court, and farther back from the bench are counsel tables and chairs for attorneys and spectators. In front of each end of the bench, mounted on floor standards, are the flags of the United States and the State of Missouri, the former being to the left facing the bench. These flags are always in place but are unfurled only when the Court is in session.

There are draperies across the wall back of the bench and in the center is a large embroidered seal of the State of Missouri. The window draperies and floor coverings are in soft tones, giving the court rooms an air of ease and dignity. On the walls are hung portraits of former members of the Court.

The building was constructed in 1905-06 on the site of the home of General Thomas Lawson Price, which had been a social center of Jefferson City since long before the Civil War. Funds for the building were in part provided from the unexpended balance of an appropriation by the legislature for the Louisiana Purchase Exposition in St. Louis in 1904. The Supreme Court had formerly occupied a building near the site of the present State Highway Department building opposite the east end of the capitol.

On the stone trim underneath the eaves, there are two legal maxims in Latin. The first is "Jus dicere non dare" which means "To declare the law, not to give it." This is an abbreviation of the full legal maxim "Judicis est jus dicere non dare", which means "It is the province of a judge to declare the law, not to give it." The other maxim "Ubi jus ibi remedium" means "Where there is a right, there is a remedy."

Just inside the front door is a bronze tablet reciting that the commission which erected the building was headed by Governor Joseph W. Folk and the other members were Supreme Court Judges James D. Fox and William C. Marshall, State Treasurer Jacob F. Gmelich, and Attorney General Herbert S. Hadley (later governor of Missouri). The architects were Guy C. Mariner and Louis LeBeaume and the

building was constructed by the Hill-O'Meara Construction Company.

THE LIBRARY

The Supreme Court Library on the second floor extends the entire length of the building. The reading room in the central portion is two stories in height. Shelved in this area are over 70,000 volumes consisting of the printed decisions of all the states and territories; decisions of the federal courts and federal administrative agencies; decisions of the courts of the British Empire, including colonial reports; legal periodicals; statutes and laws of all the states and territories; federal statutes; statutes of the British Empire; legal textbooks and a large collection of United States government publications.

There are several ancient and rare books in the English law collection; one of the most notable is an original copy of Statham's Abridgment, published in the 15th century.

THE PORTRAITS

On the second floor of the Supreme Court building are hung the portraits of nearly half of the former judges of the Supreme Court, including that of John D. Cook of Cape Girardeau, one of the original members of the Court when it was formed in 1821. Each portrait has been presented as a memorial to a former member of the Court. Many were painted after death from photographs or prior portraits. The artists are not all known, but many portraits bear the signatures of famous Missouri portrait painters. Dear Nancy:

In response to your letter of August 3, 1975 concerning the building on the southwest corner of Jefferson and High Streets presently owned by the Central Trust Bank, please allow me to advise you that even though this facility is being submitted to the National Register as a historic site, I feel personally that there is a great deal of difficulty in generating support for this action.

Firstly, I would point out that the facility occupies an extremely prominent corner in relation to downtown and the State Capitol Complex. As such, that entire corner has been master-planned by Skidmore, Owings & Merrill of Chicago intending to create a plaza area and a new banking office facility for the Central Trust group. Secondly, I personally am quite concerned about the amount of work which has already been done to this late 1800's facility. I feel that it would be extremely costly, in fact prohibitively so, to restore this building to its original condition. Naturally, the restoration would be the primary intent.

While I am unaware of the interior characteristics of this facility, I would suggest that you consider that most private as well as public agencies are not in the "museum business". I personally believe that restoration is only viable when the restored facility can play an important and dominant role in any endeavor. A prime case in point is our commitment to the Wainwright Building. I am absolutely positive that the State of Missouri would not have committed to the Wainwright project had there not been an economically feasible and totally efficient use of space.



"William G. McCarty became postmaster on February 23, 1886 during the administration of President Cleveland. During

Postmaster McCarty's term in 1889 the first Federal Building was erected and occupied. Site for this building cost \$10,310.55, and the building was completed at a total cost of \$143,162.68.

City delivery service was also established under Postmaster

McCarty on January 1, 1890.

Joseph Stampfli next succeeded to the office February 28, 1890, followed by George J. Vaughan March 19, 1894 and George F. Robinson March 21, 1898. William W. Wagner was appointed postmaster February 24, 1903; followed by Julius H. Courath February 10, 1911; J. Thomas Fisher February 20, 1915, and Benjamin H. Linhardt September 12, 1923. Mr. Linhardt served the second longest term of any postmaster, 9 years and 6 months, or until July 31, 1933 when Miss Nell L. Pool was made acting postmaster. Col. Albert Linxwiler took office February 20, 1934.

We have not been able to find the architects drawing of the Historic Village concept for Capitol West. In that rendering he had shown the buildings in place. It was used for a display at a Bicentennial meeting and it has simply disappeared.

The enclosed Riverfront Preliminary was not carried far enough west to include the Historic Village. Now, it appears to me that we must produce a brochure to include maps and perspectives showing the area from just West of Bolivar, past and including the Historic Village, Capitol West, The Capitol Complex, Jefferson Landing (Lohman's Landing) and, the Bicentennial Riverfront. This, if we hope to support the inclusion of the Historic Village as an Historic site on the register. Whatwe have here is just enough to indicate failure in spite of the Authority's commitment to provide buildings and land. If you agree, let me know. We will prepare the documentation.

I mm enclosing newspapers, showing Riverfront, Jefferson Landing, and a map showing the Historic Village in relation to these other historic areas. If you have enough here to start positive negotiations with the Keeper of the Record, please move ahead. If not, let me know.

We appreciate your assistance and particularly your patience. We can and will get our part completed and we will have the necessary local support regardless of the present apparent disorganization.

I just talked with Bob Little, Urban Programming Corporation. He is sending you a map showing the Riverfront Drive. The historic sites are shown on it and it could be helpful.

Afterwards the office of Commissioner of the Permanent Seat of Government was created by act of legislature and title to all City of Jefferson town tract and all State property located therein vested in said commissioner.

Said commissioner was authorized to expose for sale at public auction inlots and outlots at stated periods, which periods were varied from time to time by act of legislature.


