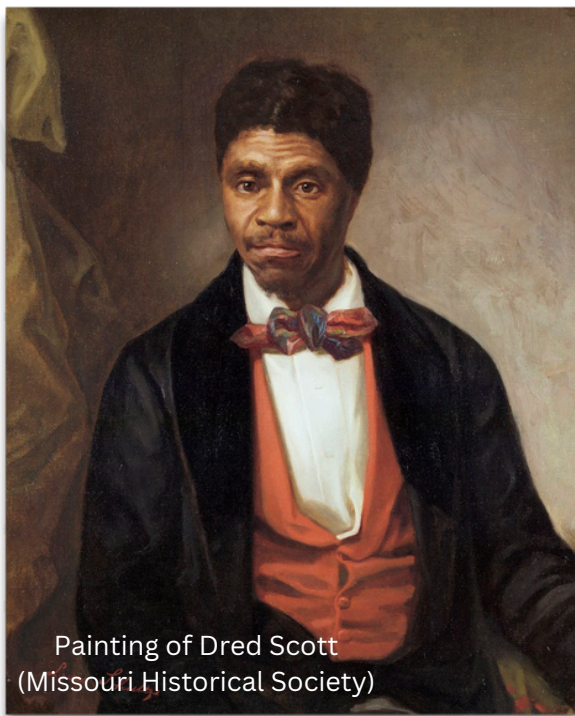


Special Exhibit: Slavery in St. Louis

Slavery existed in St. Louis for 100 years under French, Spanish, and American rule of the city. Famous African American civil rights leaders such as William Wells Brown, Dred and Harriet Scott, and James Milton Turner were once enslaved in St. Louis.

Using primary sources, individual stories of enslavement, and additional resources for teachers, this exhibit helps viewers connect with our complicated history and how it has been remember (and misremembered) in the present.
