#### DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Camp Ground Church and Cemetery is situated  $2\frac{1}{2}$  miles southeast of Osgood, Missouri in a rural setting on the crest of a level ten acre tract of moderately wooded land. The Camp Ground consists of a cemetery of approximately 400 grave sites, a church structure, and surrounding meadow. The grave sites are encircled by a four foot wire mesh fence separating the church structure on its one acre tract of land, approximately 130 feet to the south. The entire Camp Ground Church and Cemetery location measures 750' 3/4" east to west and 605' 9" north and south.

The Camp Ground Church structure was built in 1901 in a vernacular Neoclassic style of architecture being 3 bays wide and two bays deep, measuring 30 feet by 44 feet. The exterior siding is of white six inch painted clap board siding. Red brick chimneys are at both the north and south ends flush with the exterior walls. The center gable roof has a medium green asphalt shingle covering. The overall structure is of a basic, simple, uncluttered wood frame construction on a broken ashlar foundation.

The pulpit is built into the center of the east wall and sits on a eight inch raised platform which protrudes approximately three feet into the auditorium proper. At both north and south ends of the rectangular structure exist wood or coal burning stoves used to heat the high 14 foot ceilinged interior. White 12" x 18" asbestos panels line interior walls.

Sixteen foot long oak pews line both sides of the auditorium facing east, leaving a five foot wide center isle directly in front of the pulpit area. The wooden pews are seven deep and provide seating for approximately 150 people.

Structurally the church building has been unaltered since its construction in 1901 and is in good condition. The building features a divided, half-ellipitical transom over a double five panel door/main entrance. Windows are double hung, 4/4 lights, eight in number.

### STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Camp Ground Church and Cemetery is significant for its historic association to the early development of Sullivan County, Missouri and to local history during the years after the Civil War. Camp Ground became significant because of its role as a central community and county meeting place, as an area for outdoor religious gatherings, for its alleged use as an overland wagon train layover area to the West, and as the area's only early public burial grounds.

Sullivan County was formally organized in 1845. By 1850 the county had barely 3,000 residents thriving on its fertile land. During the 1850's a post office was located just east of the Camp Ground location referred to as Medicine Lodge Post Office. The nearby towns of Osgood, Harris, Galt, and Humphreys were not established until the 1870's and 1880's. With the advent of numerous schools and mills the Camp Ground area became a gathering area for the entire county in the 1850's.

The origin of the name, Camp Ground Church and Cemetery, appears to come from one or a combination of three sources. One possibility is attributed to the two church groups who organized in the area during the 1850's and used the Camp Ground site as a common meeting place. Another possibility is the alleged use of the grounds by west bound wagon trains as a favored stopover spot along the trail. A third source suggests the name was derived simply through the common use of the Camp Ground as a central community and county-wide meeting area. Whether the name originated from one or a combination of the three sources, the name Camp Ground Church and Cemetery simply became appropriate.

In 1852 the first church at Camp Ground was organized by the Methodist Episcopal church. During the time tents and sheds were constructed for the convenience of both man and beast. This church flourished for about ten years until the Civil War. After the Civil War, the Church did not reorganize at Camp Ground. A second religious organization, the Cumberland Presbyterian Church, was formed there in July 1855. In 1856 the Cumberland Presbyterian Camp Ground group was organized on the farm of Mr. Christopher Copper and services held there one week each year to which people gathered from miles around in immense crowds.

Around the turn of the century, the people of Osgood and surrounding communities wanted a proper church house at Camp Ground after years of having endured standing in the rain and snow during funerals. Grandchildren of the original settlers began the effort to build a church structure, circulating petitions and collecting money to build the church building and for the purchase of additional cemetery and church yard space.

In 1899 approximately 20 acres were purchased for \$200.00. One acre was specified to be used for building of the church structure. The deed was made out to Sullivan County with control being given to a board of five trustees who were to insure that the facility remain open to all orthodox denominations. The effort was a community project in which many participated. After much labor, the church structure was completed in 1901.

Throughout the Camp Ground's history, the present location was used as a burial grounds. During the Civil War the cemetery was also used by both sides as a drilling and preparations grounds with mutual understandings among the interrelated factions for its alternate use. Prior to this period, no other public burial grounds existed in Sullivan County. Because of this, the Camp Ground's central location and all of its associated uses, it became a natural location as a burial grounds. It is quite likely that a number of unmarked graves once existed prior to the 1860's. The first recorded burial was of the infant daughter of Sam Brown in 1851. In 1900, 150 marked graves existed in addition to a number of unmarked graves presently in one portion of the cemetery. In recent times over 400 marked graves exist.

Today Camp Ground Church is still used for annual meetings, special occasions, and as a burial grounds and has an active and interested constituency.






