DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Corby-Forsee Building is located in the business district of downtown St. Joseph, Missouri. As originally constructed, the building rose twelve stories, but a one story addition was built at its apex in 1927 to house the trade halls of the St. Joseph Grain Exchange. The Corby-Forsee Building measures 80' along the north and south and 114'6" along the east and west and is constructed of reinforced concrete faced with yellow brick and grey-buff terra cotta detailing at the first, second, eleventh and twelfth floor levels. Below, the terra cotta facing along only the Fifth Street and Felix Street facades echoes a modest version of Beaux Arts detailing with exaggerated floral and faunal rinceaux, anthemion antefixes, egg and dart moldings and a frieze of oval escutcheons in a sea of acanthus tendrils, birds and floral imagery (see photos #4,5 and 6). This decor reaches a crescendo at the main entrance in the west end of the north facade. Here, massive modillions of Michaelangelesque design support a lintel which acts as a base for a large glazed tympanum. The plain flat archivolts of this feature are embellished by the addition of plain and enriched water leaf moldings and are topped by an enlarged anthemion supported by flanking volutes.

Above this zone of decoration rise eleven stories, articulated by plain yellow brick piers and spandrels broken only by a terra cotta string course above the third floor. Just below the eleventh floor, terra cotta decoration begins again with a zone of plain panels and bosses. Acanthus encrusted terra cotta verticals rise to a second decorative zone where laurel wreaths surrounding large escutcheons are featured. Above, floreate verticals rise to cornice level. Here, the arcuated theme of the design recalls that of the main entrance and, like it, features elaborate moldings and oversized modillions which support a heavy denticulated cornice.

The addition of 1927 which sits above the cornice measures 30' along the north and south and 45' along the east and west. It is of a contrasting plain utilitarian style of construction which is vaguely Renaissance in inspiration. Notable features include its broad ornamental iron cornice featuring acanthus and anthemion motives and its corner payilions on the north side.

Inside the building, just beyond the Italian marble foyer, the barrel vaulted marble faced lobby is located with polished brass elevators in its south wall; embellished with the coats of arms of the Corby family. Their molded paneled and voluted surrounds are flanked by broad marble pilasters capped with highly embellished floor indicators. Above, the barrel vaulted ceiling, which is painted gold, features extensive coffering and bronze chandeliers. To the east and west the lobby walls are pierced by doorways enclosed beneath Michealangelesque segmentally pedimented surrounds.

The remainder of the interior features 200 rental offices, each with its own lavatory. The corridors carry white tile floors, white Italian marble wainscotting and oak millwork.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Corby-Forsee Building, the first multistory office building in St. Joseph, is significant due to its imposing architectural character which dominates the downtown (see photo #1). In addition, because the history of this building is intimately linked with the stories of the Corby and the Forsee families, two of St. Joseph's most prominent, its significance is further enhanced.

John Corby, a former Mayor of St. Joseph (1856), was born in Limerick, Ireland in 1808. He came to America with his family in 1820 and a few years later he began a career in railroad contracting. In 1843 his job led him to St. Joseph where he became a banker and merchant of note. Corby was instrumental in the establishment of the Hannibal - St. Joseph Railroad in the 1850's, and he served as its director and as the vice president of the Roseport and Maryville Railroad Company during the same period. Later in his career he served as president of the St. Joseph - Denver City Railroad Company and of the St. Joseph - Topeka Railroad Company. In addition to his business success, John Corby was known for his philanthropies. He has been especially noted for his charity work and financial assistance to the Seminary of the Sacred Heart, St. Joseph Hospital and St. Joseph Cathedral. Corby died in 1870 (Rutt, pp. 467-468; Portrait and Biographical Record, pp. 238-239; Hardman, p. 400).

Colonel Joseph A. Corby, nephew of John Corby, arrived in St. Joseph in 1867 from Ohio on a visit to his uncle. He stayed and eventually became involved in his uncle's interests. In addition, he was owner and publisher of the St. Joseph Daily Gazette (1873-1875) and he was a pioneer in the establishment of telephone service in the Midwest. In 1879 he built the Bell Telephone Exchange in St. Joseph. In 1881 he constructed a line linking that city with Atchison, Kansas, the first such line west of Buffalo, New York to connect two cities. In 1882 he assisted in the establishment of the Missouri-Kansas Telephone Company. Colonel Corby's other interests included transportation and utilities. In 1878 he built and operated the Frederick Avenue Street Railway. Later, in 1883, he brought the Pacific Mutual Telegraph lines into this city and he constructed and managed the first electric light plant in town (Rutt, p. 448).

John Corby, the eldest son of Joseph, was vice president of the Zeilda Forsee Investment Company, the corporation which constructed the Corby-Forsee Building (Combe Printing Company's Directory, p. 238).

Dr. Edgar B. Forsee came to St. Joseph with his family from Kentucky in 1856. He became known as an outstanding citizen, doctor and businessman. His wife, Zeilda, managed his large estate after her husband's death. The corporation formed by her constructed the Corby-Forsee Building (Rutt, pp. 263-264).

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
