

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- 43. The original portion of this house was probably built circa 1873 by George Jamison, the first postmaster and one of the earliest residents of Cuba; Jamison died October 5, 1873. About 1910, it was occupied by J.J. Toner, who, in that year, purchased the Jean-Hurst-Redfearn poultry business and operated it as the Toner Produce Company. The business was in East Cuba, near the Frisco depot. Toner also bought cream, butter, eggs, hides, chickens, ducks, and geese, and he shipped as many of three carloads of dressed poultry in refrigerator cars per week to New York and Boston. From 1910 to 1912, Toner was mayor of Cuba. Toner was originally from Kentucky, and he moved from there to East St. Louis, then to Cuba in 1910. In 1916, Toner moved to Detroit and sold the house at 602 South Bond Street (then Tyce Street) to Dr. John Martyn. According to Breuer, Toner died about 1921. In 1918, Toner sold his poultry business to Payne Commission Company of Marshfield.

43. In July 1937, the Cuba Businessmen's Club, founded three years earlier, successfully lured the Echo Supplies Company of St. Louis, a major producer of shoe dies, to Cuba, in part through the offer of a building to house their firm (see form #51). Six employees and their families were relocated from St. Louis to Cuba and housing was provided for three employees (also see forms #42 and #61). This was built as the home of Echo employee Elmer Kespohl and his wife, Norma.


43. Constructed 1935 by Walter Pilz on one of Cuba's main thoroughfares, State Highway 19, this commercial building originally consisted of the two story central section. It was a gas station, with lodging for the owner above. In 1939, it was purchased by Ronald O. Felt, who expanded the building and opened a small bar called Rockfair. Subsequent owners included John Angler, Bill Jones, Glenn Child, Junior Beers, Ray Ederati, and Anne Karpowecz, who purchased the business in 1979. It is now a bar and grill. Although some of the setting has been lost with the removal of the gas pumps and the widened highway, it still presents the appearance of a classic road house, serving travelers who strayed from Route 66. The living quarters to the rear of the southern most wing appear to be roughly contemporary with the main building.

44. The residence located to the south and west of the main building had identical stone veneer. The main core of the building has a square footprint and is one story in height, with a pyramidal roof. A hipped roof extension (or addition) extends north from the main block of the building. A single door and double-hung, 1/1 window mark the facade.



- 43. On February 22, 1934, the *Cuba Review* published a "State Road Work Notice to Contractors" that solicited proposals for improving and relocating the intersection of Highway 19 and Route 66 (Washington Avenue). Highway 19 was one of the first state routes designated by the newly created Highway Commission in 1922, and it originally followed Buchanan Street south from its intersection with Route 66. Under the new proposal, Highway 19 was shifted (?) blocks east, to Franklin Street. The new intersection would be graded, paved with concrete (in segments twenty, thirty, and forty feet in width), culverts built, and an underpass constructed under the Frisco Railroad. The \$34,714 contract for the project, only 0.265 miles in length, was awarded to Davis Construction Company of Boonville, and Joe Newton of Cuba was superintendent of the project. On August 3, the railroad underpass was opened, and a dispute between the city and the railroad over the street level crossing at Buchanan Street was ignited. The railroad attempted to block the street crossing the tracks and remove the pavement across the tracks, and the city responded by arresting the railroad workers. The dispute was finally resolved with the street crossing removed, as required by the agreement allowing the construction of the railroad underpass.



43. Martyn was born in 1827 in Harrison County, Kentucky, and, when he was 10, his family moved to Illinois. He studied medicine with two Illinois doctors before attending the Louisville, Kentucky, Medical College from 1853 to 1854. Although his Goodspeed biography stated that he first practiced in Le Roy, Illinois, in 1856, the 1860 census lists him as a day laborer in McLean County, Illinois. In 1869, he moved to Crawford County, Missouri, after serving as an assistant surgeon in Tennessee during the Civil War. He married Sarah J. Gritton in 1847, and they had eight children. One son, John H., also practiced medicine in Cuba (see form #34). This may have been the first house T.P. Martyn and his family occupied after moving to Cuba. By 1900, Martyn, 72, was living on Washington Avenue.

Kinder lived in Hamburg, Calhoun County, Illinois. Born in Ohio, as were his parents, he was 36 and his occupation was listed as general merchant. His household included his wife, Lula, 25, born in Tennessee, as were her parents; his daughters, Bonna, 6, and Beatrice, 2, both born in Illinois; and his brother, Add J., 26, born in Ohio and employed as a clerk, probably in his brother's store.

In 1910, J.G. Kinder, 47, lived in St. James, Phelps County, Missouri, where he was again proprietor of a general store. His household included his wife, Lula, 36; daughters Bonna, 15, Fannie (or Hannah), 6, and Mary, 4; and son, Robert, 12. In 1910, however, Add Kinder, 37, lived in Cuba, where he managed a general merchandise store. His household included his wife, Jessie, 29, and two sons, Vaughn, 5, and Paul, one year and seven months. In 1920, both brothers lived in Cuba. James, 54, was a merchant in a general merchandise store. His household only included his wife, Lula, 44, and a daughter, Hannah, 16. Add, 42, was a merchant in a grocery store. His household included his wife, Jessie, 33; sons, Vaughn, 14, and Paul, 11; and daughter, Gertrude, two years and eight months.

In 1930, Kinder, then 65, was still listed as a merchant—retail store (also see form #56).

- 42. As a result of the current renovation, the entire interior of the building was gutted and any historic divisions have been removed.
- 43. Walter Sherman Cox was an early Cuba physician with a variety of business interests. For example, in 1902, he shipped thirty-five tons of fire clay in one day. Cox served as mayor of Cuba from 1914 to 1918. He was born on February 1, 1867, at White Oak, Arkansas. In 1889, Cox graduated from Missouri Medical College and moved to Cuba 1892, where he remained a resident the rest of his life; he died November 18, 1926, on a hunting trip to Fort Worth. He retired from active practice in 1917. From 1900 to 1920, he engaged in the mining of iron and fire clay. Shortly after his arrival in Cuba, he bought the west half of the block bounded by Main, Hickory, Washington, and Smith streets, on which all the buildings had been burned on January 7, 1886, with the exception of a two-story frame house at the northwest corner of Washington and Hickory. Cox repaired the house and lived in it the remainder of his life. He also built the brick building at 605-613 NW Main (occupied, when Breuer's book was written, in 1972, by Watsons' Old time Store and Cavanaugh's Upholsterers). Early tenants of the building were Holsinger Meramec Drugs, "Granny" Benton's Barber Shop, Blumel's Bakery, and Cox's office, in the corner storefront. After Cox retired, he enlarged his former office and the post office relocated there from the northeast corner of Washington and Smith streets. North of his brick buildings he built a row of frame sheds that housed rest rooms, storage, and a dynamo, part of a small electric system for the businesses on the block and his house. He also built a tworoom cottage north of his office (see form #11), first occupied by Mr. and Mrs. George Blumel, who operated the bakery, and later by Ralph Malone, his brother-in-law.

- 42. Although the building still retains its original "L" shape, the gable front facing Main Street has been extended significantly toward the street.
- 43. In August 1865, the Reverend S.B. Shaw began efforts to organize the First Presbyterian Church in Cuba. Shaw preached in Phelps, Dent, and Franklin counties, as well as Crawford County, and, on June 10, 1866, he succeeded in establishing the Cuba church and served as its first pastor. On November 11, 1867, the County Court incorporated the church, which had twenty-six members. In 1870, John Fleming, an Irish immigrant who had worked at the Moselle furnace and Meramec Iron works and accumulated about 1,200 acres, constructed a building, at the northwest corner of the intersection of Evans and Monroe streets (the southeast quarter of Block 22), at a cost of \$2,100 and sold it to the congregation one-third of its cost. The first church building constructed in Cuba, it was used for services by other denominations until they could construct their own buildings. In August 1874, S.N. Mitchell succeeded Shaw, and he was followed by J.N. Annon in November 1880. On October 21, 1927, the last service in the original location was held. According to Breuer, the building was moved to the corner of NW Main and Hickory streets, to a lot donated by the O.R. Hitch family, and services resumed on October 30. A house on the church lot was also demolished and a new parsonage constructed. In the early 1950s, an addition to the gable facing Main Street altered the entrance to the building. The porch, designed by John West and built by Jim Blunt, was added about thirty years later and dedicated on September 25, 1983.

In addition to replacing the doors, Boda also installed a wood stove, beds, and a desk inside the jail, and a picnic table outside.

-`43. In a 1974 newspaper article, J.I. Breuer described W.H. Haskell as "a poet, orator, traveling salesman, and merchant." He owned the Golden Rule Store in Cuba. His wife, Fanetta Sargent Haskell, was characterized by Breuer as "a noted elocutionist, dramatist and writer, who traveled world wide professionally." She was the author of one book, *In the Cup of Those Hills*. W.H. Haskell sold Wilfenwild because of his wife's deteriorating health, and they moved to Pacific. In 1920, the former Haskell House and seven acres were purchased for Holy Cross by the Reverend Curtis J. Hornsey. In 1927, the house was occupied by the Catholic Sisters of Notre Dame, who used it as a school. The current school building (visible in the left edge of the survey photo) was constructed in 1952.

- 43. Prior to 1880, Catholic services were conducted in the homes of parishioners. In the summer of 1880, construction began on a church on Buchanan Street just north of its intersection with Washington Street. The building was destroyed by a wind storm shortly after its completion. It was rebuilt at the same location. In 1897-1898, the vestry, loft, and steeple were rebuilt by Father O'Laughlin, and the church was named Holy Cross. In 1920, the Reverent Curtis J. Hornsey purchased the former W.H. Haskell House and seven acres. In 1927, the Sisters of Notre Dame established a school in the Haskell House. In 1937, the current Holy Cross Church was constructed, with at least some of the masonry work done by Albert C. Stumpf, who became one of Cuba's most prolific masons. In 1952, the current school building was constructed. From 1973 to 1975, the interior of the church was renovated to conform changes promulgated by the Second Ecumenical Council of the Vatican. Much of the masonry work was also done by Al Stumpf, including a new alter constructed of rocks gathered, for example, from the Sea of Galilee and Delphi, Greece, and donated by members.





He was mayor of Cuba from 1920 to 1928 and from 1938 to 1940; he also owned and operated the Barnett Motor Company and was agent for Ford cars and Fordson tractors from 1915 to 1932, when a fire destroyed the dealership; the only part of the business not destroyed was a service station across the street, at the southeast corner of Buchanan and Washington, the later site of the Peoples Bank, which moved into a new building in 1959.



- 42. The original division and use of the building is still apparent. On the south end of the facade, above a pair of double-hung, 1/1 windows, is a concrete lintel inscribed "Cuba City Hall." Adjacent and north of the windows is a single door with transom. In the center of the elevation and level with the city hall sign is a small lintel inscribed "1934." Just north of the center of the elevation is a single double-hung, 1/1 window. A third lintel, centered above an opening that probably originally housed a large vehicle door, is inscribed "Cuba Fire Dept." Below the lintel is a single door with transom and a large, plate glass window with two transom windows. The lower portion of the building, below the eaves and gable, is rough stone, which the gable end is stucco. A circa 1954 concrete block jail has been added to the rear, and the jail addition butts up against the 1946, concrete block fire department building.
- 43. On July 12, the Cuba Review reported that, according to Mayor C.E. Belden, a city hall and firehouse would be constructed in part with funds from an unspecified federal agency. Previous plans for a community building, funded by the Civil Works Administration and public labor, had been abandoned, but the new city hall would be constructed on the M.E. Church property sought for the community building. Original plans called for city offices, a fire truck garage, and a room for the young men of the town to meet for sports, reading, and other beneficial activities. The church lot cost \$500, and \$1,500 in federal funds were obtained. The new building was forty feet wide and 30 feet long. The portion that would house a fire engine was eighteen feet wide and twenty-eight feet, six inches long. In the final plans, the space for athletics and other activities was eliminated. The new building saved the city six dollars a month rent for meeting space for the city council and three dollars a month rent for a garage for the fire truck. In August, the Cuba Review reported that the city hall would be complete by October 1. A revolving crew of eight men selected from local relief rolls had already worked twenty days on the building's rock work. According to M.C. Reid, foreman on the project, the men were not skilled workers but were selected from those needing work and provided training in the masonry work. A new fire station was constructed in 1946 to the west of this building.

- 43. Cicero Ogle was mayor of Cuba from 1940 to 1946. As a businessman, Ogle owned the Meramec Ice and Fuel Company, which dealt in coal, ice, and beer, as well as propane distribution and appliances, and included a locker plant. The business was located on East Washington between Park Place and South Franklin Street. During his administration, the ordinance was presented that urged Sho-Me Power Company to sell its distribution system to the city (which was accomplished during the administration of Ogle's successor, George Alva West, mayor 1946-1958). Also during Ogle's administration, Smith Street between Washington and North Main was made one way, and all city ordinances, unrevised since 1927, were repealed and new ones written and printed. The park commission was also established.



Recklein also financed the construction of a public library, which was completed in the summer of 1961. According to the 1900 census, William Recklein was a twenty-six year old student, born in Missouri, living on Geyer Avenue in the twelfth ward of St. Louis. Living in the same household were his sisters, Nellie, 23, and Frieda, 18. Their father was born in Germany and their mother in Missouri. In 1910, Recklein, now 36, lived in Benton Township in Crawford County and owned and worked a farm. He was married to Ida, 35, who was born in Missouri, as were both her parents. Also in the household was a hired laborer. In 1920, Recklein, 45, and his wife, 44, still lived in Benton Township, on the Steelville Road. Recklein's occupation was listed as insurance agent.

- 43. The house was constructed for John M. Wallace, who operated a general mercantile store and dealt in grain. Cuba's Methodist Episcopal Church, now the United Methodist Church, was organized in 1872. A frame sanctuary was constructed in August 1885 at the northeast corner of the intersection of Washington Avenue and Green Street (see form #48). In 1928, the church purchased the John M. Wallace house at the northwest corner of Washington and Smith streets and added the brick sanctuary to the west elevation of the house.

He was one of the founders of the Peoples Bank. He also was a bulk distributor for Waters-Pierce Oil Company. In 1929, he was appointed Superintendent of the Commissary of the State Penitentiary at Jefferson City by Governor Henry Stewart Caulfield (1929-1933) and served for four years, after which he returned to Cuba and retired. He died December 5, 1941.





Artificial siding covers both boomtown fronts, and the upper portion of the side elevation. Metal siding with a block pattern covers the remainder of the side elevation. A single window is located near the south end of the side elevation.
- 43. Cuba's Methodist Episcopal Church, now the United Methodist Church, was organized in 1872. This building was constructed in August 1885. In 1928, the church purchased the Dr. Wallace house at the northwest corner of Washington and Smith streets and added the brick sanctuary to the west elevation of the house (see form #20).
