Description: This building is very similar to the one next door at 4008 Enright, although the facades use different Craftsman-inspired materials and motifs. Here a light brick is set with contrasting dark brick at the lintels and the arched center door and window. Terra cotta caps at the center of the facade have been stolen, and the area directly beneath this appears to have been rebuilt.

Description: The house at 4015 Enright was originally given a street number in 1883 and occupied shortly thereafter; however, it appears likely that the entrance bay with its turret-like bay window and spindle frieze at the front porch was either added or remodeled in the following decade. The left (west) side of the building projects strongly; it could be considered two bays or one, since the projection is treated as a unit. Two windows at each floor have segmental arches with stone archivolts and bracketed sills; the outer few feet at each side are recessed about one brick width, corbeled at the top of the window level to rejoin the main surface. The cornice has minor corbel detail.



Description: The facade of this 1880s brick building appears largely original below the parapet wall. A band of light variegated brick with glazed brick inserts below a dark variegated parapet wall appear to be some of the results of a \$1,400 alteration permit following the 1927 tornado. Three bays wide, the building has its front door or doors (now boarded) behind a recessed entry in the left bay. The entry and all five facade windows use segmental arches with soldier brick archivolts anchored by carved stone keystones. Sills are stone with small bracket details beneath. The basement windows are bricked up; other facade windows are boarded.

Description: Like many of its neighbors, the house at 4027 Enright was altered after the 1927 tornado, but it retains obvious hallmarks of a 19th-century design. The Craftsman facade treatment, with dark glazed brick panel and diamond designs set against a red brick background, is similar to its neighbor at 4035 Enright. However, the L-shaped footprint of the building is very typical of its original 1884 construction date. 

Description: This U-shaped apartment building sets three stories on a raised basement. Terra cotta details against the buff brick body reveal a Tudorish influence, particularly in the ogee-arched door surrounds. Modernization has detracted from the building's historic integrity: doors and stair windows facing Enright have been closed over and windows are replaced with modern dark vinyl sashes. The permit was issued a little more than three months after the 1927 tornado.



Description: The Frank Wiliams Apartments building presents its narrow side to the street. The first story of this Renaissance-inspired building is faced with nearly white terra cotta blocks; above the centered front entrance, terra cotta griffins carry the address "4223". Sash windows are at the outer bays. Above the first story the surface is light brown brick with terra cotta quoins and sills. Windows are paired at the outer bays and single at the two inner bays. A modillioned conmice sets off the upper parapet wall with balustrades in the spaces directly above the windows. All windows are modern replacements.

History: The Williams Apartments were built by Frank L. Williams (see 4217). Among its many prominent black residents was Frank S. Blesdoe, attorney and original member of Mound City Bar Association. Description: This double house has a buff brick facade on a high limestone basement. Arched entrances are at either end of the facade; a corresponding arch in the eastern wall of the house makes that entrance an inset front porch. Variety in the disposition of windows and surfaces must have been a factor in making this basic facade design popular enough to use twice on this block (the other example, at 4257-59 Enright, has been razed). A round-arched sash window is above the left bay's arched entry. All other windows on the facade are rectangular sash windows, one-over-one with the exception of one two-over-one at the second story. The 1943 Negro Directory also lists this as the home of Harry Brooks, a journeyman painter/decorator (this could not be confirmed in the 1944 directory).

Description: The three houses at 4243, 4239 and 4235 Enright were built for owner August Heman in 1891. This one has a gabled front porch at the left bay, apparently redesigned decades later in the Craftsman/Tudor idiom with a faux half-timbered look in the gable end and green tile roof. 

Description: This 1928 two-family red brick flat has a symmetrical facade. Its bungaloid front porch has a gabled roof broken by an inset second story porch. The two front doors are at opposite ends of the facade, a trend which became common by the end of the 1920s. Separate front steps are located in front of each door. 

Description: Although this Queen Anne style light brick building is very similar to its neighbor at 4418 Enright, this one has more of the decorative detail that is expected of high style examples. Most notable is the detail in the projecting left bay: the first floor window has an elaborately carved stone lintel; its end blocks are part of brackets which extend down from the second story sill course and extend up on either side of the second story windows as pilasters. Description: This squarish red brick house uses unomamented surfaces and clean horizontal lines to create a late nineteenth century builder's interpretation of the Colonial Revival style. Its massing and materials are also reminiscent of some of the late work of H. H. Richardson and his successors. Two stories high, the facade has wide window openings (infilled with modern sliders) at both bays of the second story and the right bay of the first. The front door is set almost a foot back in a beveled opening at the left bay; between the door and small side window is a three-sided brick pier with foliated capital. 



Description: The elevation of this brown brick row facing Whittier Street is four bays wide. Each bay is divided into a storefront and arched entry at the first story with two rectangular windows and a projecting bay window corresponding above. The facade is symmetrically arranged with the arches and bay windows grouped together at the middle of each half. Terra cotta moldings define the parapet and the shop fronts. Windows at the facade are boarded or empty; the projecting bays at the second story are significantly deteriorated.
