
The Dr.C.L.Gerling House at 245 Lower Street in Augusta, Missouri, is a ca. 1850, 1 1/2 story weatherboarded, half-timbered dwelling (Property Type: Vernacular Residence). It exhibits the characteristics of the most basic examples of the property type, including sparse detailing and a simple traditional plan. A small shed of unknown date and function was not counted. The house has been little altered and retains a high degree of integrity of materials and design.

Facing east and set back from the street about 30 feet, the house measures approximately 27 feet wide X 35 feet deep. The plan follows a two-room hall-parlor extended by a room on the north side which may be original or an early addition; under this rear north room is a small deep cellar (probably used for wine storage) which is accessed from an exterior entry. Circa 1930 a rear room on a concrete foundation was added on the south end of the house. The four-bay primary facade displays paired doors in the center bays flanked by windows in the outside bays. The house rests on a stone foundation and features a side-gabled roof covered with tin. NPE Form 10400-6 (8-64) fr

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The Dr. C.L. Gerling House (Property Type: Vernacular Residence) is significant under Criteria A and C in the following areas: ETHNIC HERITAGE -- EUROPEAN: The ca. 1850 house is an essentially unaltered, representative example of the houses constructed by Augusta's German settlers and of the cultural traditions and processes which they brought with them to Missouri and, particularly, St. Charles County and Augusta. Dr. Gerling was one of a number of Augusta emigrants from northwest Germany, the cultural hearth of traditions which, when transplanted to Augusta, assured the development of the town's German character and its cultural cohesiveness. In addition, Gerling's activities as a winegrower, co-founder of the Harmonie Verein, and Union supporter are all closely associated with Missouri German cultural traditions. See Historic Resources of Augusta, MO, MPS: "German American Culture in Augusta, 1833-1944" and subthemes: "Immigration and Settlement, ca. 1830-1860"; "Development of Cultural Traditions and Institutions, ca. 1850-1865"; and "Wine Industry, ca. 1850-1917." ARCHITECTURE: The Gerling House substantially displays the defining characteristics of Property Type: Vernacular Residence, in its unembellished, sparsely detailed design; weatherboarded, half-timbered construction; simple, traditional See hall-and-parlor plan; and small wine cellar. subtheme: "Architecture, ca. 1836-1943."

Born in Marburg, Hessen, Germany, Christian Ludwig Gerling (1821-1902) arrived in St.Charles county in 1847. In 1855, he purchased the parcel on which the house stands from William Philip Follenius for \$450, an amount suggesting that the property was improved. In the 1860 census, Gerling was listed as a doctor, holding real estate valued at \$1900 and personal property of \$815; in his household were wife Juliane, 29, born in Hesse Darmstadt; four Missouri-born children, and one Hessian female servant. In 1856, Gerling became one of the founding members of the Harmonie Verein, one of Augusta's principal cultural institutions; his interest in music is also evidenced by the piano he insured as part of his household. During the Civil War, Dr.Gerling was among the Augusta Germans who provided strong support to the Union cause through service in the Home Guard unit and through activism in Radical Republican politics, serving on executive committees at the township and county levels.(1)

Dr.Gerling's wine production of about 500 gallons annually is documented in census records and in German newspaper accounts of the 1860s and later.(2) His house includes a small, deep basement United States Department of the Interior National Park Service

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chamber which probably served for wine storage, although it is known through probate records that he also rented the large wine cellar across the street in the ca.1865 Schroer house. Gerling also offered leadership in efforts to stave off prohibition by acting as chairman of a local protest meeting in 1882. As a result, Gerling along with other townsmen drew up resolutions against prohibition, citing violation of civil rights and damage to Augusta citizens, "who for nearly half a century had sacrificed to make the wine industry flourish by turning formerly worthless hills and fields into blooming gardens through persistent, untiring labor." (3)

Among Gerling's probate files are items relating to his dual occupations of physician/druggist and vintner including numerous claims against his estate for labor in the vineyard and wine cellar; a large inventory of wine, along with a wine press, barrels, casks and bottles; a contract for wine delivery to a Chicago firm; a library of medical books; surgical instruments, and patent medicines.
