The Harold/Knoernschild Farmstead District is eligible for listing in the National Register under Criteria A and C and is significant in the following areas: ETHNIC HERITAGE: EUROPEAN Farm vineyards contributed to the growth and success of Augusta's wine industry which is, an activity closely associated with the cultural traditions of Missouri Germans. German-born owner Christian Knoernschild figured prominently in the development of the local wine industry as one of the original incorporators and Directors of the Augusta Wine Company, a co-op founded by Augusta vintners to compete with larger wineries (See Historic Context, "German American Culture in Augusta, 1833-1944", subtheme: "Wine Industry, ca. 1850-1917"). ARCHITECTURE: The two-story log farmhouse built circa 1836 by Virginia-born Leonard Harold, founder of Augusta, is noteworthy for its early date and method of construction which are associated ---with pioneer settlement in the area. The one story brick addition to the house, erected circa 1882 by Christian Knoernschild, typifies Missouri German building traditions expressed in the use segmentally arched openings, brick denticulation, of and unembellished exterior (Property Type: Vernacular Residence). The agricultural outbuildings (circa 1860 barn, and early 20th century storage buildings) exhibit traditional forms, materials and methods of construction of their periods, and evoke farm life in the 19th and early 20th centuries (Property Type: Vernacular Residence, subtype: Outbuildings) (See subtheme, "Architecture ca.1836-1943"). The period of significance was terminated in 1920, the approximate year that the last historic building was erected.

Compared to the typical small, temporary, log cabin of early settlement, the Leonard Harold house reflects the owner's economic success and established place in society by its substantial size and well-finished appearance. Rising two stories, the log house features a fine stone chimney with hearths on both stories, and a two-story, full facade porch with chamfered posts. At an early date the house was covered with weatherboarding, leaving logs exposed only on the front elevation which is sheltered by the porch roof. When the house was built (circa 1836), Harold, who had resided in the Augusta area since 1810, was a prosperous farmer and extensive landholder.(1) Among his holdings was a tract of 360 acres, part of which he laid out as the Town of Mt.Pleasant (renamed Augusta).

In 1854, Harold sold his farmstead to Bavarian-born Christian Knoernschild, who had emigrated to Ohio in 1847 but moved to a farm near Augusta in 1849. For many years the Harold log house met the

The Harold/Knoernschild Farmstead Historic District is located at 199 Jackson Street on the northwest side of the Town of Augusta, Missouri. The complex consists of a circa 1836 log farmhouse with circa 1882 brick addition (Property Type: Vernacular Residence); a circa 1860 frame barn; and two frame subordinate farm outbuildings dating to the early 20th century (Property Type: Vernacular Residence, subtype: Outbuildings). The buildings survive with minor alterations which do not substantially detract from the overall integrity of design and materials.

Farmhouse (Fig.1; Photos #2,#3).

Facing south, the two-story, three-bay, log section of the house measures approximately 28 feet wide by 18 1/2 feet deep; the twostory porch extends 7 1/2 feet from the house and is sheltered by a continuation of the principal gabled roof. The house rests on a stone basement. A massive stone chimney located on the west elevation opens to hearths on both floors. Weatherboarding covers all exterior walls except for the south (front) facade where logs are exposed. The original plan of the house is not known; at one time a partition (now removed) divided the first floor into two rooms; the second floor still retains a partition wall.

Joining the north (rear) wall of the log house (which originally featured a two-story back porch) is a circa 1882 brick addition with side-gabled roof. Resting on a stone basement, the brick addition features a hall-parlor plan with loft also divided into two rooms. A small gabled roof shelters the front door; original wood porch posts have been replaced with iron supports and railing standing on a concrete replacement floor. Segmental brick arches head all openings; brick dentils trim the front facade. In 1968, a one-story kitchen/dining/utility wing was constructed on the west side of the brick addition.

Barn (Photo #4, left).

Measuring approximately 64 X38 feet the barn employs post and beam construction with hand hewn oak and walnut timbers. The exterior walls are board and batten. The gabled roof, sheathed with corrugated tin, features a small ventilator cupola. Wide wagondoors are installed on opposing east and west elevations; four pedestrian doors are located on the east elevation and two on the south, gable end. Fenestration is irregular, consisting of small, multipane glazing.

Wagon shed (Photo #4, right).

Resting on a stone foundation, the circa 1900 vertical board building measures approximately 15 X 20 feet. The gabled roof is covered with tin. The west end of the building is open for wagon entry; the east end is enclosed for storage of grain.

<u>Plow shed</u> (Photo #5, left foreground).

Measuring approximately 11 X 18 feet, the circa 1920 vertical board building rests on a concrete foundation. The gabled roof is covered with tin sheathing. Two pairs of double doors give entry on the west elevation. Small windows with 6/6 lights are featured on the north gable end and on the east wall.

basic needs of the Knoernschild family while attention was focused on construction of the barn. Characteristically the most important building on a farm, to which the most money and care were given, the barn contributed directly to the economic security and success Erected circa 1860, the Knoernschild barn of the farmstead. features post and beam construction with hand hewn timbers of oak and walnut. Around 1882, Knoernschild enlarged the log house with a 1 1/2 story addition constructed of brick made from clay dug and fired on the farm land. The addition exhibits typical Missouri German vernacular traditions such as the hall-parlor plan, dormered side-gabled roof, segmentally arched openings, and simple, planar walls sparsely trimmed with brick dentils. Two ancillary multipurpose farm outbuildings, built by descendants of Christian Knoernschild, provided additional storage space for equipment in ---the early 20th century. The circa 1900 wagon shed/grain storage building and circa 1920 plow and tool shed employ traditional vertical board construction with tin-covered gabled roofs.

In 1867, Christian Knoernschild was elected Vice-President of the Board when the Augusta Wine Company incorporated that year. Organized to facilitate the making and sale of wine by farmers who raised grapes on a small scale and did not have private cellars or wineries, the company built a communal winery and cellar for the processing of grapes delivered by individual stockholders (see Walnut Street Historic District). Part of the Old World agricultural heritage of Missouri Germans, vineyards consisted of only a small acreage of the total improved farm land. The agricultural census of 1870 reported Christian Knoernschild produced a modest 100 gallons of wine. However in the 1880 census, Knoernschild reported three acres in vineyards (out of 75 tilled acres), 80 gallons of wine made, and 13,000 pounds of grapes sold in 1879. Since no business records of the Augusta Wine Co. survive and 1880 was the last federal agricultural census taken, it can only be assumed that the Knoernschild farm maintained vineyards until Prohibition.

The Knoernschild farmstead, now named Centennial Farm, is owned and operated today by the fifth generation of the Christian -Knoernschild family.





Verbal Boundary Description: District boundaries are indicated by the heavy broken line on the map entitled "Architectural Survey of Augusta," scale 1"=100'.











