### **EXTERIOR**

The Calloway Manes home is a two story I-type wood frame house with a medium pitch gable roof sheathed with asphalt shingles. The house, which faces the southeast, is sheathed in clapboards painted white. Across the front is a two story porch with a concrete floor supporting six hollow square wood columns and a pent roof. The main block of the house is five bays wide. The two-story rear wing is two bays deep. The house sits on hand hewn 8" x 12" wood sills which rest on dressed stone blocks placed at each corner.

### INTERIOR

The front door opens to a central hallway flanked by parlors with a kitchen directly to the rear to which a porch and bath have been attached. The stairwell is located in the central hallway and features turned balisters painted white with a dark stained hand rail and tapered newel post. Though modified through the years, the northeast parlor fireplace appears to have the original bricks still in the open hearth. Upstairs, three bedrooms open to the central hallway, repeating the downstairs floor plan with the exception of a bath and back porch. The floors are of random width pine boards.

### **ALTERATIONS**

While the main block and rear wing of the house have remained structurally unchanged the southwest corner is now three-sided creating a two-story bay window effect which is likely a Victorian era addition. The roof extends over to form open corners adorned with stick work while the gable is decorated with imbricated wood shingles. Shaped lintels adorn the windows on the outside of this end of the house.

Although two original chimneys, contained within the fabric of the house, are still intact, another brick chimney was centered in the southwest wing serving both floors before it was removed in 1963. Besides the addition of a bathroom and the addition of plumbing and electricity, decorative shutters were added to the outside in 1963. In that same year the present porch was built to replace a one-story porch, topped by a railing and supported by round wooden columns, which was accessible through a second-floor door directly above the front door on the first story. This front door had sidelights at one time but they are now covered and replaced with wood siding.<sup>2</sup>

### SITE

The Calloway Manes house is located approximately .4 of a mile northeast of the Richland City limits on a gravel road known as the "Old Ozark Trail" road which becomes Pine Street inside the Richland City limits. The house is in Section 6, Township 36, Range 13, of Pulaski County. Four contributing outbuildings still remain: one of the old barns, an old smokehouse, chickenhouse, and another old shed - all within 100 yards of the house. The house, outbuildings and surrounding yard occupy approximately 3/4 of an acre.

### **YEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE**

The Calloway Manes home is significant as one of the oldest residences in Pulaski County and as the home of an early Ozark settler, preacher and church organizer. It is also a good example of the durability and practicality of an I-type farm house with associated outbuildings that has remained functional and lived in to this day. The ableged murder of its builder and stories of hidden gold lend an intriguing legend to the home.

Calloway Manes, and his brother Seth Manes II, both farmers and baptist preachers, left Tennessee in the 1830's, with their families. After staying a while in Indiana they finally settled in Pulaski County in time to be included in the 1840 census. They are credited with organizing at least three Baptist churches in the area: Friendship Baptist Church, near present day Fort Leonard Wood, Swedeborg Missionary Baptist Church and Eurekah Baptist Church.

Between 1840 and 1850 Calloway laid the foundation for the house and staked off his farm adjacent to Seth's farm. Together they built their homes and developed their farms. Things went well for both for the next twenty years and each raised a large family.<sup>2</sup>

Just after the Civil War broke out, however, "bushwackers" who disagreed with Calloway's reputed support of the Union and the content of his sermons, rode up to the house one night and shot the farmer/preacher as he stood in the front door.<sup>3</sup>

One account of the shooting says that Calloway disregarded a warning to quit preaching and the next night the bushwackers shot him and then commanded his daughters to hold candles while they shot him again.<sup>4</sup>

A popular folk legend that is known to those involved with the house and the remaining descendents of the Manes family tells of Calloway hiding or burying either bars of gold or jars of money shortly before his death. One account relates that one of Calloway's daughters saw him taking the money to the barn before she was ordered to go back in the house. The most common version, however, has Calloway burying five or six gold bars before he was shot. Although several people have searched through the years, no treasure has been found.

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The 1850 census reveals that at that time both Calloway and Seth II had nine children. Many of those descendents became ministers, lawyers, teachers and politicians who played significant roles in the histories of both Pulaski and Laclede Counties.

Ownership of the house has changed hands several times since the Manes family settled on the land and the families that have lived there include the Bohannons, Shaftoes, Murphys, Kanzigs, Wrinkles, Brownings and the present owners Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Powers who acquired it in 1963 and who still farm the land.









View from South showing Front and Southwest corner


