

he kept this site until 1910, when he sold it to Julia Brouk, the wife of Edward Brouk. She paid \$300, with another \$100 held until Goode promised to "straighten Larkin Williams Road so as to move it off the lot." The Brouks probably built the present house, because they were able to sell it to John C. Dennis, Jr. in 1921 for \$2,400. The Brouks also owned more valuable property at the corner of Main and Mound (Block 3, lots 6 & 7), where they had a general store.

According to Della Lang, the business behind the house, called the Fenton Ice House, was operated by Ed Schallom from about 1932 until 1939, when he sold it to Eugene "Boots" McClain. His sons sold the property in the early 1970s to Norman G. and Virginia Elmendorf. Norman died February 9, 1975, and that September his heir Norman Jean Ford sold it to the present owners.

their attorney Ira Green, sold this lot in 1883 to Mary Horan "of Jefferson County." Mary Horan, a widow with two daughters, had come to Fenton at the end of the Civil War, and she operated the Farmers Home Saloon, which was located at Water and Mound Streets, directly opposite the old Gravois Road bridge (upstream from the present one). She also owned land on Gravois Road in Jefferson County, where she operated a store and post office at a place called Longview and later Murphy. This may have been her own home but was more likely a rental property. Lot one was later acquired by the Schuchardts, who operated the Fenton Feed Mill next door, and in 1953 Arthur W. Schuchardt sold off only the present small lot to Leonard L. and Mary Ellen Bauguess.



Goode, a native of Franklin County, had lived in Fenton since 1889 and had married Fannie Rudder in 1891. Their house was in Lot D. They sold Lot 7 in 1905 to Frank M. Swantner for \$300, and Swantner then borrowed \$500, probably to build this house. The house is shown in the 1909 city map. Another house, on the north side of what is now Goode Street, is also shown and is marked F. M. Swantner, so it is not possible to say with certainty that this was Swantner's own residence. It may have been the home of his son-in-law Charles Young, who was his partner in a varied business located across the street from St. Paul's Church. The firm of Swantner & Young was identified in the county directory of 1909 as "general merchandise, saloon, hotel, commission merchants."

For many years this was the home of William E. and Selma Schlecht. The administrator of their estate sold the property to William J. Blanke in 1979 for \$13,000.

The Methodists purchased property at 800 Gravois Road in 1955. A new building was dedicated there in 1958 and a new sanctuary in 1981. The cemetery was moved to Mt. Hope Cemetery on Lemay Ferry Road. In 1959, the Methodists sold the north 100 feet of lot 1, Block 9, which was only part of the land they owned, to three trustees of the Church of Christ, Samuel A. Carter, Callie A. Russell, and James E. Mabery. The cost was \$15,000, of which \$10,000 was borrowed. The Church of Christ has been here ever since.









in 1821 for only \$25. The buyer was Jabez Ferris or Farris, who accumulated a large quantity of land in and around Fenton. In 1848, after his death, his real estate holding ran to nineteen separate parcels, and it is impossible to determine which of them was his place of residence. His quarreling heirs divided his property in 1853, and Lots 6, 7, 8, 9, and 10 in Block 2, this whole side of the block, went to Samuel Anderson. He sold them in 1856 to William G. Sale for \$930 (\$186 a lot). Three years later, Sale sold the same lots, along with another lot in Block 8, to his friend William C. Williams (a witness to his will) for \$1,500 (\$250 a lot).

While it is difficult to know how valuable a simple building like this one might have been in those years, these sale prices seem high enough to suggest that the house was built during Jabez Ferris's ownership, perhaps about 1840. The heavy construction and vernacular Greek Revival detailing may support such a date.

Sometime before 1878, when the building appears on Pitzman's map of Fenton, the property was acquired by James Hull. It remained in his estate until 1905, when his six children and their spouses sold lots 6 through 9 for \$2,700. During most of the time the building must have been occupied by tenants, as son George P. Hull lived in Franklin County and son Wellington W. Hull in Jefferson County. One of the four sisters was Alwilda F., the wife of Louis C. Vandover. The buyers in 1905 were John F. and Emma Stahlhuth. John (1863-1908) had already purchased lot 10 (the northeast corner of Main and Mound) several years before and was operating a grocery store there. His ownership of the intervening lots permitted the construction of the bank there, which he was instrumental in organizing. According to Della Lang, the Joseph Strangeway family lived here in the 1920s and 1930s.



In that year Garrett and Pat Hitzert purchased the hotel. Garret Hitzert had been a theatrical stagehand in St. Louis. In Fenton, he continued the tradition of the family-style chicken dinner that had been begun by the Holzes. He served as mayor of Fenton for seven terms, from 1955 to 1969. These were the first municipal elections in Fenton since the 1880s, and until 1966 City Council meetings were held at the Navajo Hotel. In 1992, the City of Fenton purchased the old hotel, which had been closed for more than a decade, and began to restore it as a history center.





have his Spanish land grant confirmed by the U. S. land commission. They subsequently lost the tract for back taxes, however, and one early deed suggests that they moved back to Harrison County, Virginia. Survey 1987, with about 512 acres in all, was purchased from the sheriff in 1843 by Jabez Ferris. Ferris died about the end of 1847, leaving a large estate including nineteen separate parcels of land, and it is not possible to identify the one that was his homestead. This parcel remained in the family, however, until 1856, when it was sold as the result of a lawsuit between his heirs and the Carpenter heirs. At that time, the northern 320 acres of the survey were purchased by Levi Ashley, who was married to Susan Ferris, the eldest child of Jabez. In 1862, the Ashleys, who also owned numerous pieces of land in and around Fenton, sold the southernmost 118.04 acres of their tract to William Alexander for \$1,523, and four years later, they sold the next 59.73 acres to the north to the same person for \$1,836.22. (The tract on the river went to Albert Koebel about that time.) The higher price, more than two and a half times the price per acre, suggests that the smaller tract was the one that was more developed at that time; the present house lies in the larger tract.

Alexander does not seem to have been interested in farming these lands. He sold the larger tract in 1864 for \$2,250 to Ellen Girardin, the wife of Charles Girardin, and she sold sold it again seven months later to Adolph Scheven. Scheven must have made many improvements, because he was able to sell the land for \$4,000 in 1870, after he had moved back to Germany. That deed specifies that "all of the cattle, all the farming utensils, and half the corn now being on said farm" were included in the sale. The buyers were Peter and Magdalena Wahlig. The Pitzman Atlas of 1878 shows a house on this site. Peter Wahlig died that same year. His widow leased the farm in 1880 to William Metz, who acquired the old Brock tract to the south about that time. In 1883, however, Magdalena sold the farm for \$4,700 to John Chott, who was a resident of Jefferson County at that time. Chott was required to honor Metz's lease for an unstated period.

William Alexander sold the smaller northern tract about 1875 to Mary M. Hull and James Hull her husband, and they sold it in 1885 to John Chott for \$1,450, less than Alexander had paid for it twenty years earlier. John F. Chott, Senior, presumably the same person, died at what must have been an advanced age on November 30, 1937. By then he had accumulated a

considerable amount of other real estate, including five properties in Fenton; at least three of them were rented, and one of them, Lot 2, Block 4, is the site of 212 Water Street. He left seven children. A year before his death, however, he had deeded the farm, including both parcels, to his son Joseph G. L. Chott, with the provision that he pay \$1,500 to each of three other people as they reached the age of 25. Those three -- Glennon G. Chott, Virgil H. Chott, and Philomena M. Chott -- were not children of John but may have been children of one of his grown children. In 1988, Virgil H. Chott and his wife Margaret acquired full title from a trust that had been set up for Glennon and Rose Chott and from Philomena, the wife of Donald M. Kreutz. The restoration of the property dates from that time. The county assessor now calculates the extent of the northern parcel as 70 acres, but since the new right-of-way of Highway 141 was built across the west end of the southern parcel, it now has only 76 acres.



Deeds show that Joseph Swantner bought lots 2 and 3 of block 2 in 1898 from Michael and Agnes Weil for \$2,500. Swantner borrowed \$1,000 the same day from John Chott, pledging the land "together with the flouring mill with all machinery, engine, boilers, rollers and bolting machinery, pulleys, belting, and all machinery general used in a first-class Merchant flouring mill and all dwellings thereon." The dwelling was probably the pre-existing house now numbered 8 Ferry Street.

Joseph and Annie Swantner quit-claimed all their land in St. Louis County to Matthew Swantner in 1901, and two years later, Matthew, unable to pay the mortgage, lost the property to John Chott. Chott was the farmer who owned the log farmhouse at 605 Old Highway 141. Chott kept the property only a few months, selling it early in 1904 to James Bunderson for \$2,500. Bunderson and his wife were running the mill during the time that Thomas wrote about it. They sold it in 1913 to Robert O. Schuchardt for \$7,000, "with mill machinery, belting, bolting cloth and all fixtures of said mill and all buildings and improvements thereto belonging." Schuchardt died in 1945. His son Arthur W. Schuchardt may have owned the mill at one time; he definitely owned part of Lot 1 next door, including the house at 12 Ferry Street he sold in 1953.

The 1955 county directory lists Paul Hill as the manager of the Fenton Feed Mills here. More recently the property was owned by Elmer Wille and Armand J. Moussette, who sold it in 1969 to the Fenton Feed Mill and Welding Company. It is currently owned by Daniel Diehl.

the owners of the other undivided half, made a physical division of the tract, giving Lewis the west 42 acres, extending down to the Meramec River. The house may date from that time. In 1865, following the death of his father, Philander and his brothers Rufus A. and Martrom D. made a division of the family farm, giving Philander another 95 acres extending along the west side of Crescent Road to the river. He appears to have acquired another 80 acres from his father's estate, as well.

After Philander's death, the house remained the home of his widow, the former Mary Jane Clark (1848-1930). It was then inherited by their only child, Gertrude Lewis Frazer (1881-1970), the wife of Dr. Samuel H. Frazer (1880-1907). Nancy Frazer (1904-1988), their daughter, left this property to her own daughter, Nancy Lewis Meyer Latt of Kirkwood. The buildings have deteriorated dramatically in the last few years.

Rufus A. Lewis's house was apparently on the east side of Lewis Road south of the Frisco (now Burlington Northern) tracks, so this house was probably built by Philander. A curious feature of the deed, however, is the provision of a life estate for Rufus A., "which entitles him to all of the usufruct of said land during his natural life." Philander was appointed head of the State Board of Agriculture by Governor Hadley and served under three governors. He was a founder of the Bank of Eureka in 1904 and was "a recognized authority on all matters pertaining to dairying," according to his obituary. He died at home in Crescent, where he had a large dairy farm.

decorated with red brackets on the outside. Inside, a corresponding frieze is inscribed with the twelve qualities of a boy scout. Above the front platform is "XII A Boy Scout is Reverent." The terrace at both sides of the chapel is extended to the front in a fieldstone prow overlooking the hillside. On the uphill side, a chain link fence has been angled across the back to deter potential climbers. The chapel is situated partway up a considerable hill on the north side of the main camp drive and is approached through a cleared pine woods, with a thick deciduous woods behind it. A gravel path with timber steps leads on axis to the chapel.

In 1947, Morton D. May, then vice president of the May Company and chairman of the Camping Committee of the St. Louis Area Council, arranged for the purchase of 2,353 acres of the old Ranken tract. William J. Brittain later described it as "hilly, largely unimproved land dotted with caves, traversed by a three-mile stream [Little Antire Creek], served by four known springs, and with an abundance of arrowheads indicating early Indian occupancy." Funds for this purchase were obtained from the Louis D. Beaumont Foundation, left as a bequest in 1942 by May's great uncle, who was a cofounder with David May of the May Company department stores, and the husband of May's sister Rosa. Born Louis Dudley Schoenberg in 1857 in Dayton, Ohio, Beaumont changed his name to the French form after living many years in Paris. May's father, Morton J. May, was one of three Beaumont Foundation trustees.

The tract, about half of which is in Jefferson County, was dedicated October 2, 1948, but major development waited until 1953, when May called for a fund-raising drive to build a training center, trading post, lodges, council ring, swimming pool, headquarters building, and staff quarters. The chapel was originally dedicated to Walter W. Head (1877-1954) by General American Life Insurance Company, which he had founded in 1933. Head had served as president of the National Council of Boy Scouts for twenty years, from 1926 to 1946. The architect was Eric Smith (born 1916), a former Eagle Scout. His partnership with Robert Entzeroth became one of best known local firms of the 1960s and 1970s, designing the University City Public Library, the Gaylord Music Library at Washington University, the Pierre Laclede Center, and the former Missouri Savings Association, the latter two marking two corners of Hanley and Forsyth in Clayton.

The chapel was restored in 1989 after a period of neglect and renamed the Carl S. Bauman Chapel after the longtime scoutmaster of Troop 90, Shaare Emeth Temple.



prospered during World War I but was sold to Abbott Laboratories of Chicago in 1927. In the city, Milliken lived at 1150 Belt Avenue at Bartmer for many years, moving to 35 Portland Place about 1917.

Milliken bought a total of 124.67 acres in Crescent in 1899 from Bryan and Amanda J. Obear, paying \$5,000. That tract included the site of the present house and barn complex. In 1901 he bought another 130.88 acres between there and the Meramec River from Rufus A. Lewis and his daughter Elizabeth Lewis Frazier.

Milliken was described as "a small, wiry, kindly-faced man of quiet ways. One of his chief hobbies was flowers, and at his country home at Crescent, he spent considerable time in his hothouses. He loved the open and was often seen wandering about the fields." He died in 1919 during the influenza epidemic, leaving a widow (the former May Patrick, who survived until 1942), a son, and two daughters. Harriet married W. Gillespie Moore, an officer of Boatmen's Bank, and they built 20 Wydown Terrace in 1922. Emily in 1926 became the second wife of J. D. Wooster Lambert of Lambert Pharmacal Co., who had just built 15 Pine Valley Drive in the St. Louis Country Club; they were later divorced.

The Kerckhoff family traces its origins here to Casper H. Kerckhoff, who came from Germany in 1841. He bought land in Pevely, Jefferson County, shortly after the Mexican War and started a dairy farm using the recently introduced Jersey cattle. After the construction of the Iron Mountain Railway, Pevely became one of the greatest shipping points in the country for milk and butter. His son Martin moved to St. Louis in 1887 and formed the Pevely Dairy, with offices at 1312 South Seventh Street. A new plant was built at 3301 Park Avenue in 1903. Martin's son Daniel, born 1878, was successful in obtaining several important concessions at the 1904 World's Fair, including the east and west pavilions of the Cascade, the American Inn, and the German House. A third new plant was opened at Grand and Chouteau in 1916, shortly after Martin's death. Daniel then took over as president. He lived at 3640 Utah Place until 1921, when he purchased Milliken Farm in Crescent. Married three times, he died in 1945. The Globe-Democrat reported at that time, "Mr. Kerckhoff's estate at Crescent is a show place in St. Louis County, has large herds of cattle and greenhouses where thousands of rose bushes are grown. Mr. Kerckhoff has donated thousands of rose bushes, particularly in Clyaton for Shaw Park and Parkways. He is known as a parton of the arts." He left one daughter and seven sons, five of whom participated in the business. Elmer M. Kerckhoff (1900-1970), lived at Elm Farm, now 440 Hunters Hill, Chesterfield. The second son, Arthur F. Kerckhoff (1903-1967) was elected president of the firm in 1947 and moved from 6254 Wydown Boulevard in Clayton to the Crescent estate, which was called the Pevely Dairy Farm. His son, Arthur F. In recent years, the future of the Pevely Dairy Farm has been the subject of much speculation. St. Louis County considered buying it for a park but decided the cost was too high. A plan to build a golf course there with houses surrounding it on three-acre lots has been reviewed by the county but not acted on. Although the isolation of the site that once inhibited development is now an attractive quality, development to a higher level of density will not be possible under county guidelines until the construction standard of Lewis Road is improved.

of the Missouri Pacific and Burlington Northern (originally Frisco) tracts and totalling 279.25 additional acres. The present entrance is from the south off Lewis Road and down a curving lane lined with cedars. The original entrance, still usable, was from the northwest off Allen Road. The ground, now heavily overgrown, slopes down to the north and west toward the Meramec River. Considerably west of the main complex, the Crescent Community Cemetery forms an enclave, also accessible from Allen Road. The legal description of the farm includes 120 acres in the southeast quarter of Section 29, 37 acres in the southwest quarter, and most of the northwest quarter, as well as about 120 acres of section 20 lying south of the Meramec River. and a grandaughter Susan Alice Horn, the two-year-old daughter of his son James, who had died a month earlier. A month later, the children sold their interests in this property to Thomas Ranken, Jr., and David Ranken, who were buying up large tracts in this area. These deeds, however, except "one fourth of an acre in the southeast corner reserved for a graveyard," and presumably the property remains in the possession of Horn descendants. When the St. Louis Genealogical Society recorded the cemetery it was badly overgrown, but the development of the larger property as the Crescent Valley Golf Club after 1978 led to considerable imporvement. The Crescent Vally Golf Associates sold in 1991 to The Players Club of St. Louis, which operates the facilities now.

The Beach monument records the deaths of five infant children of Martha L. and Timothy C. Beach. She was a daughter of David Horn. Another inscription at the base of the same monument, not transcribed by the Genealogical Society, records the infant children of Elizabeth and Alexander Watt; she was another Horn daughter. A third daughter, Margaret, married George Gudermuth, whose family owned another large tract in Crescent.



Hamilton C. Williams himself died about 1851, and in September of that year his executor Samuel Byrnes, or Byrns, offered the southwest quarter of Section 33 (160 acres) and 20 acres in Section 22 for sale. He himself then purchased this large tract for \$904.60. The 1870 atlas shows the property owned by William C. Byrnes, but by 1878 it had passed to Thomas Ranken, Jr., and David Ranken, as did so much other land in this area. 


Windows in the dormer are paired except for two at each end. A one-story extension to the east end has another door, and behind it is an emergency stair connecting with the upstairs. have no knowledge of these records. The history of this historic property can thus be reconstructed only sketchily. Steiny's Inn was named for Edward I. Steinberg, who is said to have opened it in 1939. The situation of the restaurant on U.S. 66, in a beautiful spot overlooking the Meramec River, made it a local landmark. Mrs. Leistner recalls that the building was enlarged to the west in the 1950s, after a yellow freight truck went through the porch. The restaurant even survived the rerouting of Route 66 to the south as Interstate 44, which turned the old road into an access road. Edward and his wife Estelle finally sold the property in 1972 to William L. and Jeanette J. Klecka. They called the restaurant the Galley West.

Although the location on the east side of the river was not part of the original subdivision of Times Beach, it was included in the municipal limits after the city was incorporated in 1954. When the cancer-causing agent dioxin was discovered to have been present in large quantities in oil that had been spread extensively over the streets of Times Beach, the federal and state governments agreed on a plan to purchase all the property in the corporate limits and to raze all the buildings. Although Steiny's Inn was not in the contaminated area of the city, it was included in the state buy-out. The Kleckas then moved to Mexico. The building has been adapted for use as an office and, although covered with vinyl siding, is in exceptionally good condition in comparison to most other Route 56 sites that have been similarly bypassed.



This plaque is thus significant as one of this handfull of reminders. The Tyson Valley site was a tract of 2,620 acres acquried by the U. S. government for the manufacture of gunpowder early in this century. It was turned over the fledgling county parks commission shorty before World War II but then reclaimed for the war effort. The tract was again quitclaimed to the county in 1950, and this plaque dates from that time. On October 2, 1951, however, the U. S. Army reclaimed the property a second time. In a final settlement in 1955, 2,371.70 acres of the Tyson Valley Powder Farm" were sold to the U. S. for \$74,448.24, and the county was left with only 213.34 acres, which were renamed West Tyson Park. The central Tyson Valley tract is now owned by Washington University and operated as a research center. West Tyson has been expanded over the years to encompass a total of 672.73 acres.





Apparently Lamkin died without a will, leaving a large number of heirs, including Silas, George, and Peter Lamkin. About 1844 they began selling their interests in this property to George W. Higgins. Higgins eventually assembled 656 acres, including 515 acres in Survey 879, 22 acres in Survey 880 to the east, and 120 acres in Survey 985 to the west. He and his wife Sarah sold all this property in 1880 to Thomas Ranken, Jr., and David Ranken, who were in the process of buying several thousand acres in this area. George and Sarah then moved to a homestead farm on the north side of Manchester Road just east of Ballwin. He died there in 1885, leaving five sons and four daughters. Since the Rankens seem to have allowed most of their acres to revert to forest, this house must have been built by Higgins, if not by Lamkin or Williams before him.

to the west. Thomas was possibly a brother of John. John Williams, Senior deeded this tract in 1823 to Isaac Williams, referred to in several deeds as "his bastard son." Isaac and his wife Elizabeth in turn transferred it to Silas Lamkin in 1846. He was the son or brother of John Chatin Lamkin, who had owned Survey 879 to the west. Two years later, however, Lamkin sold the tract to William W. Bassett. Bassett and his wife Lavinia sold part of the west side of the tract to George W. Higgins, who had also bought much of Survey 879, and they sold 350 acres the next year, 1849, to Thomas T. January. January had made a fortune as a pioneer railroad man, and, with his brother Derrick January, had an iron foundry in St. Louis. He lived near Ferguson, in the northern part of St. Louis County. He held this property for only a month, however, selling it for \$2,500 to George Smizer.

Smizer's story deserves further investigation. He (or William A. Smizer, whose name also appears in these records) apparently borrowed a total of \$160,000 from the county government over a period of several years and ended up having the whole amount foreclosed in 1859. One reference in a history of Carondelet alludes to this event as a scandal treated extensively in the press, which caused discomfort to many county officials. No details of this event have been found. An inventory of historic buildings conducted by the St. Louis County Historic Buildings Commission in 1965, however, identified a stone ruin on the hill north of this house, including a large stone chimney, now disappeared. This may have been a remnant of Smizer's investment. In 1959, George and Martha Smizer, then living in Montgomery County, Missouri, deeded this property to St. Louis County for five dollars. The deed specifies that this is the property "where Smizer formerly resided, together with all the buildings, improvements, fixtures, machinery, and appurtenances upon said land." Included were two additional tracts, bringing the total acreage up to about 510 acres.

In 1864, the county court, "for the purpose of aiding the humane and patriotic work of taking care of our sick and wounded soldiers, donated to the Mississippi Valley Sanitary Fair the tract of land owned by St. Louis County known as the Smizer Farm." The farm was sold at the fair to Lucien B. Martin and George F. Carpenter of Davenport, Iowa, for the grand sum of \$40. Martin acquired Carpenter's interest and then sold the whole thing in 1866 to John Gates for \$14,500.

Complete records for the period of ownership by the Gates family have not been found, but John Gates died in 1872, leaving a wife, a daughter and two sons. One of the sons was William Jasper Gates, who is shown as the owner in the 1878 county atlas. The 1893 and 1909 atlases show Eliza Gates as the owner; she was a daughter-in-law of John. In fact, however,

246.83 acres of the farm, the west half, were sold in 1900 by Roman Stranz of St. Louis to Bettie May Monroe, the wife of Charles M. Monroe. The price was now down to \$2,500.

In the 1930s, Charles M. Monroe and his wife, now named Lillie, derived considerable income from the lease of their Meramec River frontage to persons wanting to build "clubhouses" or summer retreats there. One such was Horace S. Rumsey, member of a prominent St. Louis family. During this period the property remained the Gates Farm, and the agricultural part of the property was leased to the Kraus family. Charles M. Monroe died in 1942. Finally, in 1983, Charles Milton Monroe, Junior, and his wife Marion, who had retired to Jupiter, Florida, sold the farm to Darwin F. and Geraldine Kraus. They used the same legal description Roman Stranz had used in 1900, although the farm had been bisected in the meantime, first by U.S. 66, and later by Interstate 44. The Krauses still operate the farm, which they now call a ranch because of its emphasis on horses.

down Hillsboro Road from Meramec Station Road and well back on the east side of the road in the west lee of the hill. The property on the west side is flat and includes a large complex of modern barns and other farm buildings. The land is bounded on the west by Williams Creek. According to the present owners, the property was purchased about 1930 by George John Wulfmeyer. He found a two-story four-room frame house that had been built around the original building after it burned in the late nineteenth century. Over the years, he first replaced the original second story with a large dormer and then removed the dormer in favor of first-floor wings extending from the original building south and east. He also reoriented the house, which originally faced Hawkins Road to the south, so that it faced west toward the private drive. A garage wing was added to the north end of the house. The house was inherited by his son and then by his grandson, the present owner.



Umphrey Dunnavant died in 1859, and his property was divided among 6 heirs in 1861. This property was included in Lot 5 (114 acres) which was inherited by Felix Dunnavant, a son. Felix Dunnavant probably built this house in 1861, but it is not shown in the 1878 atlas. That map shows a house north of Hawkins Road. Felix died in 1903, leaving 6 heirs: Julia Young; Ada or Ida Graham; Martha Dunnavant; William Dunnavant; James Dunnavant; and Mary Dunnavant, his widow. When Felix's land was divided this property became Lot 4 of the Felix Dunnavant Subdivision and contained 65 acres. Lot 4 was given to Mary Dunnavant, the widow, by a quit claim deed from her children. The 1909 atlas shows W. E. Dunnavant there.

From 1912 until about 1960 a family named Johnson owned the property. They had 3,000 chickens. Families from St. Louis would spend the weekend at the Johnsons' farm and enjoy home cooked fried chicken and biscuits.
