

43. Constructed in 1913 as a motion picture and vaudeville theater, the Fourth Street Theatre was designed, in 1911, by local architect Ludwig Abt and Kansas City architect Robert Sanneman. The property at 110 North Fourth Street was owned by John P. Beuth, but he sold it, before the theater was completed, to O'Keefe Brothers Grocery Company. The theater opened on February 9, 1914, showing the war drama *An Hour before Dawn*, followed by a performance of the Three Elliotts. In 1924, the theater was remodeled by architect Carl Boller, who designed the Missouri Theater in Columbia and the Landers Theater in Springfield, who extended the balcony, added a cry room, six loges, and a segregated gallery with separate box office and entrance. Two additional remodelings followed, but the exterior remained largely unaltered. The theater was originally managed by Everett E. Tritch and Fred A. Selby. They were succeeded by Theodore Davis, and then by Oliver Penton and Don Robb, who managed the theater until 1963. In 1963, the theater was sold to B & B Movie Company, which was owned by Elmer Bills of Salisbury. B & B operated the theater until 1997, when it was donated to the Randolph County Historical Society.

From 1901 to 1908, Ludwig Abt, a native of Wiesbaden, Germany, lived in San Francisco where he worked, and may have received an education, as an architect. Although he returned to Germany, he returned to the U.S. on April 30, 1909, bound for Kansas City, where he was reported by the 1910 census as lodging on Harrison Street and employed as an architect. He worked briefly with Sanneman before moving to Moberly later in 1910.

The facade has a raised glass entrance with stationary windows on each side and above it. The pedimented entry is supported by Classical columns on stone piers. Tripartite windows, also surmounted by pediments, flank the entrance. Part of the basement is visable from the front and has stone facing

43. The first effort to establish a public library in Moberly was in 1872 by the Moberly Library Association, a group of citizens with no official affiliation. The association opened a small reading room in November 1872, with a collection of 335 books and eight magazines. Membership was \$5.00 a year. The association lasted only three years. The second attempt was by railroad employees, who formed the Railroad Library Club. Their attempts to form a permanent library were also unsuccessful.

On April 2, 1901, Moberly voters approved a one-mill tax to support a city library. The Railroad Library Club donated its small collection and fixtures, and, on August 1, 1901, the city library was opened in the space previously occupied by the Railroad Library Club. In January 1902, Mayor Willard P. Cave wrote Andrew Carnegie requesting a library building. Carnegie's staff responded on April 26, 1902, that, if the City Council would pledge by resolution to support a free public library in the amount of not less that \$1,500 a year and provide a suitable location, Carnegie would contribute \$15,000 towards a building. Later, the amount of city support was raised to \$2,000 a year, and Carnegie's donation increased to \$20,000.

Second floor tenants included a number of physicians, such as S.P. Towles, M.E. Lensley, T.S. Fleming, S.T. Ragan, H.K. Baker, W.D. Chute, and R.H. Young.

In 1912, under the ownership of Willis & Vanderbeck, who operated a restaurant on the first floor and a rooming house on the second floor, owner T.F. Willis was charged with "conducting a house of illfame," according to the January 17 issue of the *Moberly Daily Monitor*. Two women, Edna Cain and Lucy Farmer, in the company of a Moberly man and a Mexico man, were also arrested by constable Sam Turner. Cain pled not guilty to the charge of inhabiting a house of assignation, but pled guilty to misconduct and was fined one dollar and court costs. Farmer was apparently not charged. Both women were ordered to leave town.

From 1963 to 2005, the upstairs was apparently vacant. In 2005, the building was purchased by Susan and Kevin Hall and remodeled as a two bedroom apartment. Some original features, such as a 5 foot by 7 foot by 4 foot skylight, have been retained.

43. For most of its history, this building may have been associated with one of the adjacent buildings, possibly as storage space. Listings for the 216 North Fourth Street address were not found in most city directories. The upstairs, 216 ½, was usually rented as lodging space, usually to people who worked at a downtown business. In 1951, the upstairs was rented to the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers Local Union Central Trade Council. Twice, the downstairs housed a business: in 1932, it was the Wigwam Cafe; and, in 1951, it was Noel's Shoe Shop.








43. In 1900, this was the residence of Charles L. Quayle (September 15, 1868—November 5, 1902), then 31; his wife Eudora "Dora" Goodfellow (July 30, 1870—September 3, 1939), 29; and their daughters, Mary, age 7, and Sarah, age 5. Charles Quayle was born in Guemes, Mexico, the son of William Quayle, a native of the Isle of Man, and Mary Elizabeth Terrill, a native of Missouri. In 1869, Quayle and his parents moved from Mexico to Missouri, and in the 1870 and 1880 censuses, William Quayle worked as a farmer. After public school, Charles worked on railroads, then on the Moberly police force. He left briefly to serve as a Deputy U.S. Marshal, then returned to the Moberly police. In 1897, he was elected Marshal and served in that position until his death.

On December 28, 1916, Mary Elizabeth Quayle (July 25, 1892—April 8, 1981) married Lt. Omar N. Bradley in Columbia, Missouri. In 1910, Bradley and his mother lived across the street from the Quayles, at 604 South Fourth Street (see form #77).





42. An architect has not been identified for this excellent, virtually unaltered example of modern architecture. The contractor was Wisdom Brothers of Moberly. The curved, hemispherical exterior surfaces on the two street-facing elevations are mirrored by the interior walls. The style and pristine condition of the building make it exceptionally significant.

The City Bank and Trust opened on May 2, 1935, originally located in the Hassett Building at the corner of Reed and Williams streets. The bank was remodeled in 1941 and 1946, and by 1960 had outgrown its location. Construction began on the current building in December 1961, and it was completed in early 1963. The bank opened to the public at this location on March 25, 1963. An open house was held on March 29 and 31. In honor of the opening, on March 28, 1963, the *Moberly Monitor-Index* devoted most of its section B to the bank.

43. A concrete plaque centered in the upper portion of the facade, below the cornice, reads "Dingle Bros." with the date 1918 or 1919. In 1919 and 1920, the only tenant listed was Cash Cooperative Mercantile Company. In 1923, Lane's Cash & Carry was the occupant. In 1924-1925, Karcher's Cash Grocery (Thomas Karcher) and John C. Tedford, plumbing and heating contractor were in the building. In 1927, two tenants were listed, both in the basement: Tedford and Owens & Matthews Transfer Company.

In 1929, Temple Stephens, a grocer, shared the building with Tedford and Owens Brothers Transfer Company. Temple Stephens was born in Waterloo, Nebraska on December 29, 1889. His father, Lewis L., served in the Confederate army and farmed in Douglas County, Nebraska, after the war. In 1895, Lewis Stephens retired from farming and moved to Moberly, where he opened a grocery store, first at 709 S. Williams. In November 1918, Temple Stephens assumed management of the business after his father again retired. Temple was educated in Moberly and Kansas City, where he had voice training. He had been a tenor soloist for Ridpath Lyceum Bureau before taking over the grocery business. About 1920, Temple opened a second store on Bedford Street. Two additional stores followed in Moberly, and then stores in Salisbury, Paris, and Centralia. In 1930, the Temple Stephens company was incorporated; in 1948, Stephens opened his sixth grocery store in Moberly, a supermarket, and his 47<sup>th</sup> chain store.

In 1932, Temple Stephens and Tedford were the only occupants. By 1936, Tedford's Plumbing Company was the only business listed. From 1938 through 1960, the building was the Kelly Hotel. In 1938, the Travelers Protective Association, Missouri Division Post E, an insurance company, shared the building with the hotel. In 1962, the city directory noted that 109 North Clark was under construction. In 1963 and 1965, it was listed as vacant. Beginning in 1967, it housed the offices of the City of Moberly. In 1980, the third floor also housed the Randolph County Resource Council.

43. James Thomas Cross was born near Clark on August 6, 1856. He graduated from the University of Missouri at Columbia in 1881 and afterwards taught in the schools of Renick, Sturgeon, and Brunswick. He then served as manager of Flagg Lumber Company at Clark and New Franklin. On July 1, 1907, Cross purchased an interest in the C.D. Everhart [Eberhardt] Lumber Company, located at Williams and Franklin streets. Because the location was subject to flooding, Cross and his partner, R.L. Kingbury, bought the Holtsinger Livery Stable on North Clark and moved his office and the lumber yard, renamed J.T. Cross Lumber Company, to the location, 311—323 North Clark. Cross was mayor of Moberly from 1919 to 1921.



42. Constructed on a narrow but deep lot, the building rises three stories in height. The first floor was constructed as a store front (now heavily altered) and housed a variety of businesses over the succeeding years, while the second and third floors each contained five one-room apartments, a reception area, and a common bathroom.

43. The building at 208 West Coates was first listed in the 1913 city directory. First floor tenants were Albert C. Gladney, lawyer and justice of the peace; Henry (Hy) T. Owens, a constable and deputy sheriff; and James R. Childers, a merchants' policeman. Gladney remained a tenant through at least 1920, and Childers reappeared in 1920. In 1923, the first floor tenants were Allemong & Gross, and Frank Quattrocchi & Sons, both vegetable and fruit wholesalers. In 1920 and again in 1924-1925, two upstairs tenants, Roy and Betty Owen, were listed; Roy Owen was an employee of Jefferson Pool Hall.

In 1924-1925, USL Battery Service Station and H.T. Owens Tires were the first floor tenants. From 1927 through at least 1945, the USL Battery Service Station remained on the first floor. From 1927 through 1932, city directories listed Mrs. Adeline Fisher, the hotel manager (see below) as living upstairs. In 1936 and 1938, the upstairs was listed as Sycamore Rooms. In the 1948-1949 and 1951 directories, Jim Holman's Laundry & Dry Cleaning was the first floor tenant. In 1940, one upstairs tenant, Clyde Howell, a brakeman for the Wabash, was listed. In 1945, tenants were Charles White and Robert Wood. In 1948-1949, Howell was again listed, and in 1951, David E. and Jerry Fisher were tenants.

Gee died in January 1924, but his wife, Lillian, and Nebergall owned the building until February 1926, when it was sold to Edward A. Willott, who also purchased the Lyric Theater and a threehundred acre farm at the same time. Willott hired Mrs. Adeline Fisher, of Boonville, to manage the hotel, which was referred to as the Fisher Hotel. On July 27, 1933, Mrs. Fisher was found dead in her Sycamore apartment, and management was assumed by Mr. and Mrs. A.J. Price. On August 4, 1937, the Moberly newspaper reported a raid on the Sycamore Rooms and the arrest of four people, including Mr. and Mrs. Price, who were charged with operating a bawdy house. From 1937 to about 1964, under several different owners, the upper floors of the Sycamore continued to operate as a brothel. Finally, following the publication of a feature article on Moberly's seamy side in the *St. Louis Post-Dispatch*, with special focus on the 100 block of West Reed Street (the "Levee") and the Sycamore, and an investigation by a grand jury, the brothel closed. In 1993, the Sycamore and the building at 223 North Clark (see form #6) were purchased by the Randolph County Historical Society.

43. In the summer of 1880, C.W. McDaniel and Frank M. Clark acquired a lease for a telephone exchange in Moberly from Bell Telephone Company. During the winter of 1880 and 1881, the exchange was constructed to serve thirty-seven subscribers, and a switchboard was assembled locally and installed in rented space in the second floor of the Levi Building. In 1893, E.D. Graham and his sons, C.R. and G.T., purchased the telephone exchange. In February 1911, the Grahams sold the Moberly Telephone Company to the Missouri-Kansas Telephone Company. In March 1912, an agreement between the Missouri-Kansas Company and others created the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company. Also about 1911, the building at 225-227 West Coates was constructed (the west half of the two-story portion of the current building). On January 1, 1917, the companies that were party to the agreement merged as the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company (Missouri), and the Moberly facility became the division office of Southwestern Bell. In 1956, Bell secured options on adjacent property in order to implement an extensive expansion to their building. Additions to the north and east of the original building were designed by the Kansas City firm of Neville, Sharp and Simon.

42. The sides of the building had arched windows that had the arches bricked in and the windows replaced. The windows have concrete coins at the corners. The attached gymnasium is actually older than the main building.

43. This building is located on the site of the 1895 Moberly High School, which replaced the 1876 building that had burned in 1894. In 1917, a gymnasium/auditorium was added to the rear (west elevation). On January 29, 1929, a fire destroyed the 1895 High School, but the gymnasium/auditorium was saved. To finish the school year, space in other buildings was sought, most notably in a building constructed in 1927 for Faessler Manufacturing Company, at West Logan and West Lee streets. On May 14, 1929, a election to authorize the issue of \$490,000 in school bonds, the largest such bond issue in Moberly's history, was held. The measure was approved by a five-to-one margin, 2,996 votes in favor and 622 opposed.

The school board proposed to construct four new buildings: a building to house the 11<sup>th</sup> and 12<sup>th</sup> grades of high school and the first two years of college; a junior high school to house the 8<sup>th</sup>, 9<sup>th</sup>, and 10<sup>th</sup> grades; and two elementary schools to replace West and East Park, built in 1885-1886. A new gymnasium/auditorium was also constructed for North Park School. Ludwig Abt was hired as architect for the ambitious building program and designed all the new buildings, including the junior high school building, and the North Park gymnasium. Contractor for the school was the Peterson Construction Company, which was also the contractor for the East and West Park schools. The junior high building contained nineteen class rooms, eight on the first floor, ten on the second, and one in the basement. The first floor also housed the superintendent's office and an activity and clinic room. The largest room in the basement was a manual training room. Girls' and boys' lavatories were located on each floor. The lower portion of all interior walls were glazed tile, and steel lockers were installed throughout the building. The 1917 auditorium was also repaired, with new plaster on most walls, the stage cornice replaced, and damaged floorboards repaired or replaced. In the fall of 1930, the Junior High School building was completed. This first year, the building housed all four high school grades and the two-year junior college classes. In 1939, under PWA Project #MO-1514-F, the junior high was renovated. Abt was again the architect and work included new flooring in the 1930 building, repair and replacement of plaster, anchoring lockers, new woodwork, and a new auditorium and stage floor.



43. On September 28, 1938, Moberly voters approved an \$88,000 bond issue for the construction of a municipal auditorium. Total cost of the project was \$160,000, with the federal Public Works Administration (PWA) agreeing to pay 45% of the project cost, or \$92,000. Local architect Ludwig Abt designed the building, designated PWA Project #MO-1406-F. The completed building was accepted by the city on November 18, 1940. At the dedication of the new facility, a speech by Governor Lloyd Stark was followed by music provided by Ozzie Nelson and his band. The first major performance in the auditorium, arranged by the Moberly Business and Professional Women, was by violinist David Rubinoff, on October 10, 1940. The auditorium has hosted a variety of performances and functions during its history, including City Council meetings, concerts, and high school and local college graduations. In 1955, the building was used as an armory by the National Guard. A new armory, designed by Abt and Cleavinger at a cost of \$150,000, was scheduled for completion in August 1958.

43. On May 17, 1929, the *Moberly Monitor-Index* announced that a new Masonic temple described as an "Egyptian Temple"—would be constructed in Moberly. The new building would be shared by as many of five Masonic organizations. A new temple had been proposed over ten years earlier, but plans were deferred first because of the Great War and then because of the 1923 Wabash strike. Less than a week after the original announcement, ground was broken for the building, estimated to cost \$60,000. The building consisted of two stories and a basement, with the elevation fronting on Fourth Street fifty feet wide and the elevation fronting on Rollins 120 feet wide. The basement, or lower level, was faced in stone, with the upper stories of buff brick. The lower level included a large room that could serve as a ballroom or a dining room. The second level contained a lodge room for the Commandry and Royal Arch Masons, as well as ladies' and men's lounges and a men's smoking room. The Eastern Star, Blue Lodge, and others would also use the main lodge room. On the third level was a smaller lodge room for committee meetings. Both the upper levels included mezzanines. The architect for the building was Victor T. Defoe, whose office was in Kansas City. Contractor was J.M. Haley, of Moberly. On August 15, Masonic officials from Hannibal, Trenton, Kahoka, St. Louis, and Independence, participated in the laying of the building's cornerstone.





43. This building was constructed in 1889 (the same year as the Union Depot) as a Pacific Express Company office. In 1905, Pacific Express and American Express Company were both operating from the building. In 1915, the building was the office of Wells, Fargo & Company. During World War I, the U.S. Railway Administration assumed operation of the country's railroads and consolidated the four leading express companies—Adams; American; Wells, Fargo; and Southern, except for that portion of Southern Express that operated on the Southern Railway and the Mobile & Ohio—as American Railway Express, Inc. In March 1929, the assets of American Railway Express were transferred to the Railway Express Agency (REA), which was owned by eighty-six railroads. Shares of ownership were based on the amount of express traffic conducted over the various rail lines. In 1969, REA was sold to five of its officers and renamed REA Express. The Moberly office closed sometime in the late 1960s, probably when REA was sold. Although REA and its successor expanded its delivery options to truck and air, in November 1975, the company had been crippled by decline in business and embezzlement by its officers, and it ended operations. In 1976, the Moberly Historical and Railroad Museum acquired the building.




