

Description: Brick stuccoed, with side gable facing east. Although it is on the public square, gable end faces north and the square. Built as commercial space with meeting space on second level. Extensive remodeling performed in the 1960s by locally renowned architect, Don Russell. Russell seriously altered the buildings appearance by adding the white stucco exterior to the simple wood frame structure. Windows are modern one over one with brick sills. Primary entry is arched with transom and side lights. Modern commercial metal door faces square. Chimney is in center.

Significance: This is the oldest building on the commercial downtown square. It was constructed by A. T. Yoachum, a prominent citizen and politician in early Ozark. The building housed the mercantile business Robertson, Yoachum & Inman in 1863. It eventually became Robertson & Yoachum, and then J. W. Robertson & Sons. It remained a mercantile business from the time of construction until 1882 when Robertson & Sons moved the operation to the north side of the square. The

second story was used for dances and public speaking. The Missouri governor spoke there in 1899. The building was renovated to house Dr. A. H. Gheil dental practice downstairs, the upstairs converted into residence for Dr. Gheil and his family.

Description: single story facing west, a hall and parlor plan with rear additions. Partial porch is open beneath dropped hipped roof supported by fanciful wood columns set on rock pedestals, with no railing. Center door is modern replacement, as is the large divided window to the right. The one over one double hung window to left of entry likely also existed in right side.

Significance: This dwelling has been altered during a 1940 remodeling, but retains the hall and parlor shape and appearance from the street. It contributes to the historic streetscape based on its massing and style.



Description: Two story commercial building of brick masonry with brick decorative brick cornice. The masonry is of two distinct colors and composition. The facade and full cornice brick is hard, deep red in color while the side elevation brick is a soft sand brick, orange in color. Entry to commercial space and to stairway to residential space on second floor are from single open porch. Entry to commercial space is set on diagonal. Original store front glass has been filled in with modern brick masonry, however, the configuration is still obvious. Porch has original tin ceiling and tile mosaic flooring. Windows are metal replacements but the original wood framework is intact on all. The facade has two second story windows, one over one. The north street side elevation has five on second story, all one over one configuration. The fist level on the north elevation has only a single door entry with transom.

Significance: This is an early brick commercial building on the Courthouse Square, anchoring the northeast corner. It began as a tin shop, and has the original tin ceiling in the first level commercial space. It is better remembered as a bakery in the 1930s and 1940s, and then as Dr. McCormick's medical office during the 1950s and 1960s. Dr. McCormick was highly regarded in his practice and his family continues to resides in Ozark. This building is the only structure on this west block of the square historically intact. Facades from the remaining block of buildings have been removed and replaced with modern glass and brick.

Description: One story massed square plan with basement, hipped roof, exterior eave brick chimney. This is a rock faced concrete block building built upon concrete foundation and each elevation has five narrow arched windows with colored glass in arches and one over one double hung lights beneath. Original tower removed and replaced with unsightly concrete block entrance. It currently serves as Grace Baptist Church.

Significance: Built as Presbyterian church with funds provided by citizen Mary Yoachum. The Yoachum's were one of the early families to settle and build up Ozark in the late 1800s. Its integrity was seriously marred by the removal of tower and construction of entrance room.



Description: Facing west, this is a one and one-half story folk vemacular set on stone foundation with windowed gable front entry, and low pitched hipped roof with parallel ridge and cross through gables. Entry porch projects from plane, its roof supported with turned spindles and enclosed railings, and has formed concrete staircase. Front, straight sided bay windows are incorporated into floor plan, flat roofed with simple cornice, and pairs of vertical one over one lights. A second open porch sets back from facade twelve feet, and mimics the entry with turned spindle supports and enclosed railings. Building retains horizontal wood cladding, which has become rare in Ozark.

Significance: Constructed in last half of nineteenth century, this is a rare survivor of the Civil War era of Ozark history. Its age, integrity, and massing contribute to the historic fabric of Ozark.



Description: Linear plan with long facade, facing west, this is a duplex with central entries covered by single porch. Porch has gabled front with scallop frieze, no railing, its extended roof supported by pairs of simple posts, made decorative with small wood pieces that form a zig-zag design between. Entrances are side by side beneath porch. Windows are two to each side and three over one single hung. Single bay garages are on either end and positioned to rear side, they are matching front gabled buildings. Single large flue located in center ridge.

Significance: This double house represents a modern housing development that became popular in the middle century. This building has sustained unusual integrity.

Description: Gable front and wing house, facing west, with open porch in ell. Gable broken pediment flares slightly at ends, as does the hip dormer. Porch roof is extended, supported by columns atop limestone masonry pilasters. Historic entry door has large oval window and transom. Windows are metal replacements.

Significance: This land was settled by the Hedgepeth family around 1900, the house built and is still owned by one of the original banking families in Ozark. Frank Hedgepeth established Ozark Bank in 1905-1906, one of three early home town banks operating during the turn of the century. The Ozark Bank is still a successful operation in Ozark and elsewhere in Christian County, and still owned and operated by the Hedgepeth family.


Description: Typical Craftsman features are side gabled roof with wide eave overhang, brackets, front gabled, partial porch with squared wood column supports grouped in threes at primary corners. Recent remodeling to porch includes some classic Craftsman features such as the square columns. Windows are six over one single hung throughout, and a fan shaped window present in porch gable. Enclosed porch on rear with gabled roof. Chimney in front roof slope. Garage is wood shingled sides, gable roof with exposed rafter ends. Gable end windows are square with two-over-two single hung panes. Original garage door has two sets of stationary three-over-three panes. Attached screened porch has earthen floor and outdoor fireplace/cooker.

Significance: Representative of the prolific building boom of the 1920s as seen throughout rural Missouri towns. Craftsman vernacular was very popular during the period between WWI and the Depression, and indicates Ozark's participation in the national trend in prosperity and building styles.

Description: Single story gable front and wing, facing west, with rear additions. Porch is grade level concrete slab, no roof cover. Entry is through enclosed box projected from ell, its roof extended and flared. Gable end window is a bay projected from elevation plane, added after construction but prior to 1914. Small utility room addition projects left rear wing gable.

Significance: This building is a contributes to the streetscape of one of the most intact streetscapes in historic Ozark.

Description: Facing west, a one and one-half story gable front and wing with Folk Victorian features with cut away bay window in front gable and on the north eave end. Porch in ell has dropped roof supported by round wood columns. Two front entrances nearly abut in porch corner. Windows are one over one single hung. Roof has gable end returns. Building was remodeled in 1918 according to tax records, consisting of an addition and a large porch in rear ell.

Significance: Constructed around the turn of the 19th century, this is a typical expression of a southern dwelling built after the arrival of the railroad. Its style likely migrated from the southern geographic regions.

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



Description: Two story brick masonry building with yellow brick facade constructed destroyed from fire, located on southwest corner of courthouse square. The facade is tied to the three adjoining buildings to the north. Two buildings are divided on first floor by stair to second floor apartments. Two storefronts are glass and metal casing with modern metal doors with side lights. Transoms on all three present but currently covered with awnings. Storefront windows are hooded with shake shingles. Corner building has corner entry. Windows in second story have cut stone lintels and sill. There are five rankings of one over one windows, the center slightly narrower than the two on either side. As described in the five buildings to the north, the decorative brick cornice is the same. This building retains a herring bone brick sidewalk. First story facade has metal pilasters, and a corner column at entrance. Tile capping present on all five buildings.

Significance: This building contributes to the historic commercial street scape, physically tied to the facades of the three large buildings to the north. It was the second location of the first bank in Christian County, established in 1886. It was the location of other businesses such as H. F. Davis Drug Store, Ozarks Drugs Co., and the Ozark Sanitarium occupied the second floor It is typical of commercial brick buildings of the early twentieth century and is significant in its representation of improving prosperity in Ozark and the southwest Missouri Ozarks regions.



Description: Large, two story yellow brick with original store front of large plate glass panels, and single pane doors in two entrances. Currently, a metal awning covers full length. It is currently fully open upstairs and down, used as furniture store and warehouse. The six seonde story windows are modernreplacements, of identical size and detail with cut limestone lintels and sills. Brick cornice is decorative with dentil stepping. Steel fascia includes decorative florets that are painted contrasting color to distinguish.

Significance: Facade built onto 1880 walls shortly after turn of 20th century, when fire ravaged west side of square of all its wood structures. It served as hardware store and repository in 1914, equipped with large freight elevator, one of only two in Ozark. This is a large scale commercial building typical of early 1900 downtown commercial architecture. It makes a significant contribution to the courthouse square commercial street scape.

Two story brick commercial structure located on Description: west block of courthouse square, constructed as two 30-feet wide units with central stair. First story facade and storefront currently concealed beneath siding, along with an inappropriate wood shake awning. The second story has a metal sheathing of faux stone faced concrete block. The original central doorway on first story is intact, but modern fenestration pattern has no historical integrity. Beneath the fibre board sheathing is the original storefront and entrance to stairway to second floor. This stairway entrance is the one used now to gain access to the building from 2nd Street. The first floor is divided by cross walls, but the second story is single room. The entire building is used as computer monitor repair and associated offices. The remodeling on interior consists of an inner shell of wall units, whereby the original second story windows are not visible from the interior but are unchanged from the street. This creates the appearance from the street that second floor is boarded up and abandoned. All inappropriate alterations to first story facade are reversible. according to the owner, for the storefront was not destroyed.

Significance: This structure was constructed between 1900 and 1914, according to Sanborn Maps. It replaced two small wood, single story buildings present in 1900. It served as a harness shop on one side, and saloon on the other until the Central Hotel relocated there by 1930, after that original downtown structure burned. Its massing is typical of early 20th century commercial building, and it contributes a large portion of the commercial street scape of the west side courthouse square.



Description: One story brick masonry structure, facing east, origiannly with three store fronts, now concealed beneath by solid door panels. Modern garage door replaced original garage doors. Building is a large single story industrial or warehouse design, its facade on 2nd Street, and its rear entrance on 3rd Street. Windows and another display window along north side are filled in with wood panels. Building is massive, serving historically as an auto sales and repair facility. Sales rooms were on the front, auto entrance on the rear. Masonry is decorative with the use of two colors, a brownish red occurring primarily on lower portions, light red on upper levels where the darker brick used in simple line designs. Facade roofline is parapeted.

Significance: This is a common commercial/warehousel style building, typical of the early buildings constructued specifically for automobile sales and service operations that became important druing the 1920s and 1903s. 


Site Plan for Multiple Structures Not to Scale



Three original storefronts were replaced when siding was attached, although the plan is intact. Doors are original, but the windows are multiple paned replacements. Concrete stairways provide pedestrian access to entrances, and a concrete loading dock and on south side serves two pedestrian accesses. Buildings are currently utilized as one structure.

Significance: In spite of its loss of integrity by the severe alterations to exterior fabric, this building contributes to the historic downtown commercial district primarily through its massing, occupying the western boundary. This typical commercial brick building of early 20th Century Ozark could regain its integrity by removal of the siding, but should not be listed on local historic register until that occurs.







Description: This is a three story wood frame water mill with pressed metal sheathing. It was operated by water power with a horizontal wheel. The wheel was fed by water diverted through concrete bay. On building front is a shed roof where product was delivered through chutes to trucks. The roof is gabled on east and west ends, with center gable on both north and south sides. On the north, or river side, is row of windows. A small addition is located on the west end that housed the wheel machinery. A single story addition is on the east end which has side gable metal roof. Two large utility buildings sit in succession to the east. Both are single story wood frame with wood board siding, with side gabled shingle roofs.

Significance: The original Hoover Mill was constructed on

this site in 1833 by John Hoover. At that date, it represents the earliest building site in the town, and site of first business operation in what was the Finley Township, yet to become the city of Ozark. Associated businesses were Jacob Eustler's

blacksmith shop and Mr. Eldridge's store. Original land on which the town of Ozark was laid out was donated by John Hoover, the mill's owner. The village was referred to as Hoover Mill long before the moniker Ozark became well known. Typical of early Ozarks mills, it served as an important gathering location for people from miles around who came to have their corn and wheat ground, and their timber milled. It served as the first polling place in the area in 1839, twenty years before the county had been designated Christian County in 1859.

William Lawing ran the mill from the 1860s until it burned in 1899. It was sold and rebuilt on the same site in 1900 to Jim Tindle who operated it until 1921 when it again burned. The wooden spillway was replace in 1912 with one of concrete. Local lore indicates that a number of wagon and buggy axles were used to reinforce the concrete. This spillway has been a favorite swimming hole for local youth since its construction. When the mill burned in 1921, the brothers Fred and Leonard Hawkins purchased and rebuilt it. It again burned in 1939, but was immediately rebuilt one last time. It has been in continuous operation, albeit as a feed mill after the last fire, until the recent late 1990s.

The mill is typical of water mills of the Ozark Mountain region, significant as earliest rural industrial development. It is symbolic of Ozark political and economic history and development. Its location on the Finley River, at the site of the city park and local swimming hole make it an important architectural landmark in Ozark.

Description: Three story sand brick masonry building, two building units wide. It occupies a street corner in the center, north side of courthouse square. Decorative brick cornice adorns the facade, and all upper story windows have arched masonry hoods. It is large and symmetrical with a fenestration rhythm on two upper stories of nine by three feet windows with arched brick lintels and limestone sills. These occur on two elevations facing streets, the rear windows mostly filled historically with brick masonry. Store front in comer building is relatively intact with exception of transom light covered with plywood. Store front in east building has been configured with new metal door, pilasters and transom framing is intact, but currently obscured. Entry to upper floors is in facade, its transom also obscured and modern commercial metal door currently in use.

Significance: This was the first three story brick building constructed in Ozark. Its third floor was financed and leased for one hundred years by the Masonic Temple. A Masonic emblem of carved limestone marks the building facade at the third floor level. The second floor housed the first telephone office, and the rear section was the Clark Opera House. The first floor corner building was the Bank of Ozark, the first bank in the village operated by a prominent Ozark native, Jeff Breazeale, the building's builder and original owner. Sanborn Map

Description: Two story commercial building of glazed red brick masonry on a stone foundation. It has a decorative brick cornice that steps back to facade plane. Horizontal rows of but and finished limestone are at signboard level, just above the second story window lintels, just above the cornice, and as wall cap (on facade only). Store front is intact, although transom lights currently obscured and painted. Entry is transomed door at left end of facade within recessed porch. Porch retains its original mosaic tile floor. Access to second story is by stairs located in building to the west, then through sliding metal fire door. Windows on second floor are one over one metal replacements, however, the configuration one over one configuration is historically correct. Windows on rear and east elevations vary in size, but are all two over two, historic metal in wood frame, arched wood lintels.

Significance: This is a typical early 20th century commercial building in size and design. It was built as Ozark was in a building era, replacing many of its wood frame commercial structures with brick. This building represents the increased economic success and expansion in the Ozark region in the early 20th century.

Description: Massive two story religious building of yellow and brown hued brick masonry. Roof is parapeted cross gabled, located on corner so each gable faces a street, but corner entrance faces southwest and courhouse square. Ground level story is utilitarian basement and offices, the sanctuary located on second story. The ground level story is concrete with stucco covering. Entry to sanctuary is on southwest corner, accessed by concrete steps rising to the second story doorway. Doorway is double wide with triangular pediment, and flanked by pilasters. Decorative features include turrets to either side of primary entry, concrete walled stair. Cut stone lines parapet, and wall corners have bracketed cornices. Windows are modern metal single fixed pane. Gothic arched stained glass windows located in the south facing gable end. Here there is one large window flanked on each side by smaller but identical arched windows. Modern addition of glass and steel erected in 1976, attached to the east elevation. This addition is incompatible in material and size, but visually the building is viewed from the Courthouse Square to the southwest, so the addition troubles but does not destroy the original feel of the corner facade.


Significance: This massive building is an important architectural anchor to the courthouse square. It repreents is one of three downtown neighborhood area churches remaining, its construction contemporaneous with the other three extant religious structures, the old Methodist Church (now Christian County Museum) across the street, and the Disciples of Christ Christian Church one block south. A massive religious structure such as this one, with not only its size but its detailing, is indicative of the religious devotion common of rural natives of the Ozarks geographical region. These things also signify the improved economic situation in Ozark in the early 20th century.

Historically, the building had a square tower in the ell. Windows are one over one single hung with four on facade and three on side gable end. Round single windows appear in second half-story in each gable end. A single story porch of brick masonry with a flat roof is on rear. A new addition has been added to that, with a shed roof and stuccoed exterior.

Significance: It is located just off the Courthouse Square, and contributes to the downtown street scape. It now serves as the museum of Christian County.





Description: Hipped two story with attic story, full basement, side walled and gabled dormers in front and sides, and exposed rafter ends. Facing north, it is a two ranked four square with corner wrap porch, rear boxes project to sides creating the T-plan. Porch has shed roof with low pitch gable front with stick detailing. Porch roof supported by squat classical columns, grouped in threes and set on rock faced concrete block pedestals, heavy spindle railing. Side entrance to porch is gained from covered carport. Primary entrance to porch is from sidewalk and an amply wide concrete stair framed by concrete retaining wall that continues around corner yard, punctuated by occasional concrete pedestals. Facade entrance is flanked by side lights. Windows are one over one metal replacements, with limestone lintels and sills. Facade has second story small arched window with keystones at top of arch and to either side.

Utility

Significance: This is a unique example of architectural high style in Ozark, conspicuous in its massing, design, and landscape features. Nothing like it exists elsewhere in historic Ozark. It was originally owned by a Doctor Young, who had a hospital on the Courthouse Square, and was known for his health retreat at nearby Lindenlure on the upper Finley River.

Description: Three story brick masonry set on concrete with full basement, currently used as public storm shelter. Square in plan, with flat roof and a concrete cornice, entrances on all four sides with entry porches. First floor of red brick masonry with concrete guoins. Second and third stories of orange brick masonry. Each facade is identical with concrete pilasters at entry, column pilasters spanning 2nd and 3rd stories. Fenestration consists of paired one over one single hung windows, three sets on either side and one set in center. The second floor windows also have a transom light. Within the projected center elevation, small windows flank central set of windows, or doors in the case of the first floor. The openings are progressively smaller from the first floor to the third. The first floor is a narrow one over one single hung. The second floor has three panels, the upper a tilt, the lower one over one double hung. The third floor is a decorative concrete molded oval of garland with eagles with spread wings perched above. The wall top of the projected facade on four sides is a concrete balustrade. Construction began in 1914, but its completion was delayed by the advent of World War I until 1920.

Significance: There were two previous courthouses in Christian Count y since Ozark became the county seat. One was burned by arsonists in the 1860s and the second razed. The architect was Henry H. Hoenschild. Hoenschild designed three other Missouri courthouses in Barry (1913), Scott (1911), and Pemiscot (1924).

Description: Two story brick commercial, facing south, with brick cornice on facade and east elevations. Original storefront is intact with exception of shake awning, soon to be removed. Storefront has rounded iron pilasters marking the recessed entrance. Entrance to second floor is in facade to left, through recessed porch. Second story windows are one over one metal replacements, with arched brick masonry lintel and original framing concealed beneath vinyl flashing. These are three on facade and seven on east elevation. On the east elevation in fist story are are three small blocked window openings.

Significance: This building was constructed to serve the expansion of Robertson Brothers store, the oldest retail store in Ozark. It moved from its original location on the south side of courthouse square. It was built the same year as the Frisco Railroad was constructed through Ozark. The Robertson stores were well known for the family was in the dry goods business on the courthouse square from 1863 through the 1940s.

Description: Large two story commercial building three units wide, yellow brick with cornice, facing south. Storefronts have been replaced with modern full front glass and metal. Left building facade was altered with infill when passenger elevator installed in 1950s. Windows in second story of the primary building are replacements and represent a change in height. Presently, there are two pairs of three with the configuration of two one-over-one flanking single fixed pane, a decorative wood inlay fills upper space of the original transom lights.

Significance: This building was constructed by the proprietors of Robertson Brothers Store. This building was built as a larger replacement for the smaller commercial building to the east side. It replaced a single story brick commercial building on this site. This building was used by the Robertson until the 1940s when it became the A.D. Roper Company store. It has been a structural landmark on the courthouse square for more than eighty years, representing Ozark's growth and economic prosperity after the turn of the century era.

Description: Three story red brick commercial building, two units wide, anchoring the northeast corner of courthouse square. Tit has two intact store fronts of metal cased glass, but transom lights are obscured with fibre board. Both doors are original wood and large single pane glass. One entry, at the east (right) end is in facade plane. The entry at the west (left) end is a comer entry. This corner of building is supported by brick column. Windows in second floor are one over one single hung with arched lintel. Third story windows are ill fitting replacements, wood filling large gap at top. Upper story windows are emphasized by masonry arch keystone. Cornice steps back to meet the slight inset of the facade. Brick columns frame the building and divide them structurally in half.

Significance: Built in 1905, this structure is a physical anchor to the northwest corner of the courthouse square. It represents the expansion efforts of Ozark businesses at a prosperous time in this region. The building was the long time site of a drug store and doctor's facilities.

Porch is in tight ell beneath principle hipped roof, supported by single classical column, no railing, but with lacy brackets at corners. Porch has wood floor with formed concrete steps. Description: This is a public building, large rectilinear in plan with long facade, stepped parapet ends and a flat roof. The exterior is faced with uncut field stone. Pilasters break the surface on all elevations. Windows in primary facade are metal divided lights. Lintels are stone masonry and sills are stone slabs. The current entry is serviced by concrete steps and open porch, and access ramp running vertical to the facade.

Significance: This is one of two public buildings constructed through Workers Progress Administration funds and local labor. It represents the common struggles of rural America during the Depression Era, and the physical remains of WPA program's relief efforts. It has served the community by providing space for public functions and events. 

Description: Large, massed plan of stone faced concrete block masonry. It is a cross gable with a square tower protruding through eave of front gable. Tower has castellations, paired round arched window vents on front and side, and a one over one glazed window on side, below pairs. Windows in main building are arched with stained glass within arch over one over one single hung windows. The arrangement of one large window in gable center with small, linear versions of arched stained glass over one over one. On front gable there are two linear arched windows, but on the side gable there are two on either side of the dominant arched window. Entry is transomed double doorway set in the right corner of the front gable. A large, double wide concrete stainway provides access to entry. Full basement is entered from ground level left of stair. Chimney located in eave of side gable. Small rounded window in second story of each gable. Plain concrete block addition on rear of building built in 1963.

Significance: This building was constructed in the early part of the 20th century by the Disciples of Christ Christian Church and is

still owned and occupied by this organization. The Disciples of Christ Christian Church was the first organized religious group in Ozark, established in 1840. This building is located just off the Courthouse Square, so it contributes to the downtown street scape and visual characteristics of downtown.

Significance: Although this building lacks architectural interest, its age signifies its contribution to the commercial community of Ozark and the street scape on the square.



Description: Two story commercial brick with full basement, facing north. Retail storefront with transoms and recessed doors, originally single door. Second story windows are arched with vertical brick lintel treatment, currently covered on exterior, but are double hung. First story windows along west elevation are smaller, single pane, arched with vertical brick lintel. Historic storefront generally intact with porch entry. The entry has was altered to accommodate two doors set at angles, the historic center entry made into glazed display. Non-historic infill was built between the M.F.A. and the next historic structure to the east. It is a 20' X 90' brick masonry, one story, with flat roof and stucco exterior. It was built and used by M.F.A. for feed storage. The second historic building is a one story brick with stucco, located east of the infill structure. This is a simple building with no adomments, and its display window and door are currently blocked.

Significance: This building represents the commercial vitality of Ozark at the turn of the century. It was constructed to house Hershell Reid's Ozark Mercantile Company. Reid moved this business to the west side of the square when Christian County Farm Club bought it in 1928. It eventually became the Missouri Farmers Exchange and functioned under that name until 1997. As one of the larger commercial structures it serves as a physical and visual anchor of the downtown commercial district, occupying the southwest corner of Ozark square.

Description: Two story commercial brick facing north. Limestone course located at sill height in second story (2½ ") and wider versions (8") at lintel height in first (sign board) and second stories. Two entrances, one that accesses second story, and commercial access, both have large transom lights and limestone door sills or thresholds. Storefront windows also have large transoms, two over two fixed panes. The commercial door is modern, full glass. Windows in second story are metal replacements, one over one panes. This building was built to abut large, older commercial building to the left, or east. This building survived when the adjoining building was razed after 1930. A contemporary one story brick building replaced the three story original, so this structure occupies and awkward position, seemingly unanchored.

Significance: Although this building awkwardly abuts a modern structure, one that occupies a significant corner of the historic commercial square, it nonetheless contributes to this important street scape. It demonstrates the tenacity of this commercial building style in the Ozarks, with the residence space above the commercial storefront.

Description: Rectangle plan with hipped roof, and two stories facing north. Exhibits some French Eclectic form in linear massed box style, steeply pitched hip roof with facade parallel ridge, and stucco exterior. Exposed rafter tails in soffit. Center door entry with pilaster, door modern with multipaned glazing in upper half. Second story windows are five ranked, first story has same symmetry with entry door playing as one, and another facade entry that likely replaced original window. All windows same size, one over one single hung, with decorative shutters. The structure sits on lot at an angle leading away from the street plane on the right end.

Significance: This building was built as a hospital in the 1940s. French Eclectic became popular after WW I when American soldiers spent some time in France, and photographic studies appeared in the 1920s which helped popularize the style for some areas during the 1920s and 1930s. It is the only such style building in Ozark.

Description: This gable front and wing faces northeast, occupying the comer of Hall Street and 4th Avenue, its ell porch addressing the street corner occupation of the building. Wings are of equal proportions, and the ell porch has dropped roof with a pediment at the comer entry, supported by classical columns set on brick pedestals, and a wood railing. Two entrance doors with transom lights are positioned in the comer, each awkwardly close to the other. Windows are one over one double hung, one on each level in each gable end. Chimney located on ridge near juncture of two box units. Small open porch added to back has shed roof and spindle columns, concrete floor.

Significance: Built by a Mr. Whitlock of nearby Sparta, Missouri, it was owned in the 1890s by Jacob Hartley, local judge. By 1911 it was owned by William C. Vanderventer, a local attorney. Mr. Vanderventer's father was from Garrison, Missouri and a member of the Christian County Baldknobbers. This is a fine example of the gable front and wing house whose popularity migrates from the rural South. It exemplifies the early Southern influences in Ozark, before more Midwestern building patterns became preferred in the early 20th century.



Description: Single story massed plan, facing north, with low pitch side gables. Modern deck replaced original porch, and this is uncovered, full front and wraps to left side elevation. It is simple wood deck with post and board railing. The symmetrical facade has central doorway and one over one windows on either side. Left elevation is a repeat of this, but the door has a shed roof of metal supported by metal brackets. The cabin is a one room frame structure in rectangle plan, facing south, with simple vertical wood siding. Primary access is on right elevation near facade corner. Viewed from rear, or north, is deteriorated porch with shed roof, shuttered windows on either side of door. Cellar space is accessed here with door through stone foundation. Barn is a rectangle plan with gable end utility access, vertical board siding. It has some add-ons that do not posses integrity. Log structure facing north, is miniature in height, has porch area at front covered by principle roof which is supported at the corners by posts. Windows are on facade, with door on left, and in side elevations. Its original use or origin is unknown.

Significance: Example of simple farm complex located in picturesque creek valley at the eastern edge of historic city development, this site overlooks historic road access to Jackson Port, from where manufactured goods were transported from the navigable terminus of the White River.

Dwelling adjacent to the right, or east, has similar plan with side gable, short eaves, closed entry with long eave, six over one glazing, and detached garage.

Significance: This building occupies and contributes to the streetscape of perhaps the oldest road in Ozark. Period houses were popular in other parts of the country between the first World War and the Great Depression, and perhaps this house, and it's neighbor, are similar attempts to copy an element of style onto the facade of a simple box plan.



Description: This is two-lane steel truss bridge with one concrete pier in center. Abutments are concrete and stone. There are two identical sections with a through truss meeting at center pier. The deck is currently an asphalt bed.

Significance: This is the first Finley River crossing to get a bridge, beginning with a covered wood bridge set on rock piers in 1849. That bridge washed away in the flood of 1909. It was replaced that year with a narrow steel bridge set on same the rock piers. That one-lane bridge was moved to the Riverside Inn crossing in 1914-1915, and replaced with the current, larger steel truss. The all metal truss bridge became the most popular American design during the late 19th and early 20th centuries. The crossing has been integral to Ozark travel then at least since

the building of the first mill in 1833, and is still used heavily by local traffic. When there was talk of closing traffic on this bridge public outcry quickly curtailed such notions. This bridge, like the old swimming hole it spans, is a local landmark, protected by a local historic zoning ordinance. Along with the Ozark Mill and spillway, it contributes significantly to the cultural landscape of the city, and defines the eastern boundary of the City park.



Description: This is a complex of buildings added to the original resulting in a sprawling compound of connected structures to serve as restaurant dining rooms. The original building was the first restaurant in 1923, then the speakeasy was constructed to the right rear of the restaurant. Both buildings are masonry covered in

stucco material. The primary restaurant building has flagstone wainscoting on the facade, and two fixed

windows with colored glass surrounds. Entrance is at the right end of facade. The speakeasy building is rock masonry with stucco finish, with heavy rock buttressing in rear, on the river side. The residence is attached to the speakeasy building to the right, and is constructed of brick masonry covered with stucco finish. The last additions are at the left of primary restaurant building. All buildings connect and are accessible from one end to the other, but the facade and rear elevations are irregular. It is only the continuous stucco finish and monochrome asphalt shingle roof that visually makes it the least coherent.

Significance: While Riverside Inn lacks physical uniformity and integrity, it has been a well known and publicized restaurant since its early days when it was praised for its breakfasts and fried chicken. A local man named Howard Garrison took over the restaurant in 1926-1927 and turned it into the first night club in Christian County. Garrison became infamous for the liquor he sold at the Riverside Inn speakeasy during the Prohibition years, as well as for the gambling he provided his customers in the back room of the original building. Garrison was an avid painter, and his paintings and murals still cover the walls of the restaurant, still enjoyed by patrons today. A prolific painter, Garrison's paintings are collected by many in the area, and several can be viewed at the Christian County Library. The restaurant today continues to be a popular venue for fine dinners and special events, capitalizing on its long colorful history and a menu that has changed little since its heady days of fried chicken and cocktails.

Significance: Represents a typical house style of the rural south, but not frequently found in post-railroad Ozark. It was built by Jim Kerr, a local inventor who designed the "Kerr Hand Corn Planter."
