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
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South Hyde Park Historic District
Jackson County, Missouri

SUMMARY DESCRIPTION

The South Hyde Park Historic District is a residential neighborhood in Jackson County, Kansas City, Missouri with some commercial development along Troost Avenue, its eastern edge. The district is roughly bounded by E. 39th Street on the north, Brush Creek Boulevard on the South, Troost Avenue on the East and Gillham Rd on the West. The district is located northeast of the Nelson-Atkins Museum of Art and south of the Hyde Park National Register Historic District (Listed 11/21/1980). The proposed historic district contains 1010 buildings and 1 site. Of those, there are 735 contributing primary buildings, 48 noncontributing primary buildings, 32 contributing secondary buildings, 195 noncontributing secondary buildings (garages and sheds) and 1 contributing site. Prevalent architectural styles include American Foursquare, the locally popular Kansas City Shirtwaist style, Bungalow, Craftsman, Colonial Revival, Queen Anne and Neoclassical. The district also has a number of multi-family colonnaded and walk-up apartment buildings. The streets are lined with concrete sidewalks, stone retaining walls in some areas and mature trees.



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The proposed district is bounded by E. 39th Street on the north, Brush Creek Boulevard on the south, Troost Avenue on the east, and Gillham Road on the west. With the exception of the curving Gillham Road and the adjacent parkway, the boundaries fit with Kansas City's grid system of streets, providing clearly defined borders for the district. East 39th and East 47th Streets are major east-west thoroughfares that run from the Kansas-Missouri state line to Kansas City's eastern edge. Troost Avenue runs along the district's eastern boundary. Troost historically served as a commercial thoroughfare and streetcar line from downtown to Kansas City's southern boundaries. The street is a mix of single- and multi-family housing and commercial properties. The road was paved around 1904 and the streetcar line extended from 33rd Street to 48th Street, concurrent with the burst of construction activity in the adjacent developments. Gillham Road Parkway, the district's western boundary, includes one of Kansas City's major boulevards and the adjacent green space serves as a neighborhood park. Gillham Road was laid out as part of George Kessler's park districts plan. The Kansas City Board of Park Commissioners acquired the land through condemnation between 1901 and 1906 and completed the road and landscaped parkway from 1904 to 1908. Kessler planned improvements in 1907-1910 for the 10-acre Gillham Park that included a playground, ball field, field house and outdoor gymnasium, but the Westport Park District lacked funds at the time to build these facilities. Further improvements in 1913 included the addition of a casting pool in the park at 41st Street, now removed. Gillham Road retains its 1908-1910 Kessler design.

SETTING

The topography of the district is characterized by a gentle sloping from the highpoint of 950 feet at 39th and Troost, moving downward to a low point of 833 feet at Harrison and Brush Creek Boulevard. Gillham Road also sits at a low point of 877 Feet at the intersection of East 39th Street and Gillham and slopes south to 833 feet at Brush Creek Boulevard. These slopes all lead toward Brush Creek, which is three blocks south of the district. Gillham Road and the associated green space, known as "Gillham Park," are in a low area that flows into Brush Creek. The streets laid in a grid pattern from north to south and east to west were cut into this gently sloping area. This change in elevation places some of the houses ten feet or more above street level.

The neighborhood was designed on the grid pattern between the major thoroughfares. The single lots vary from 25 feet to 50 feet along the frontage and about 125-150 feet deep. One factor in the design of this suburb was its proximity to the streetcar lines along Troost Avenue. Since the automobile had yet to gain widespread popularity and the streetcars provided convenient transportation, the houses and apartment buildings did not have driveways and parking lots. Most of the existing driveways and garages were constructed after the houses were built. They are not considered significant in the early development pattern of the neighborhood.

PROPERTY TYPES AND STYLES

The proposed historic district contains 96 multi-family residences, 660 single-family dwelling, 20 commercial, 1 commercial warehouse, 3 religious facilities, 2 park/recreation buildings and 1 fire station. The period of most rapid growth was the decade after 1900, when 522 buildings, or 67 percent of the district, were constructed. The table below illustrates the district's major building periods. The major impetus for the building boom was the

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establishment of city water to the neighborhood in 1905, the extension of the streetcar along Troost to 48th Street in 1908, and the construction of Gillham Road.

By far, the American Foursquare form and the smaller bungalow dominate the district. Of the American Foursquare, a local variation called the Kansas City Shirtwaist is the most dominant subtype. The Shirtwaist is denoted by the use of shingle, clapboard or stucco on the upper story and brick or stone on the first story. The transition from one type of material to another creates a flair or “shirtwaist” effect for which it gets its name.

The multi-family dwellings in the district include two and three story walk-up flats with Neoclassical and Craftsman details. There are also a number of colonnaded apartments in the district. The 2003 *Colonnade Apartment Buildings of Kansas City, MO MPS* describes the features of the Colonnaded Apartment as:

The purpose-built colonnade apartment buildings of Kansas City, Missouri include buildings designed and constructed specifically to function as multiple dwellings for the middle and upper-middle classes. These buildings are at least two stories in height, contain at least two self-sufficient apartment dwelling units (i.e. with private kitchen and bath facilities), and date from c.1900 to 1930. They are brick buildings with prominent multi-story colonnade porches. They feature symmetrical façades and are either stand-alone buildings or identical conjoined buildings with separate entrances.

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INTEGRITY

Overall, the district contains a high degree of integrity. There have been demolitions due to neglect and fire, but few of those vacant lots are concentrated in any one area. When reviewing each property, the following guidelines were used to determine the contributing or noncontributing status of a building.

Contributing:

- For an individual building or site:
 - A majority of the building's openings (doors and windows) are unaltered or altered in an appropriate manner using similar materials, sizes, and profiles as original building elements.
 - Later additions are located on a secondary and/or front facade in an appropriate manner respecting the materials, scale and character of the original building.
 - Front porch is intact and retains the majority of its elements.
 - Major decorative elements are intact.
 - Alterations to the building are reversible and the historic character of the property could be easily restored.
 - The overall character of the building is preserved.
 - Garages or sheds that fall within the period of significance or have complementary architectural features to the primary building.

Noncontributing:

- Buildings that fall outside the period of significance of 1885 to 1939.
- Garages or sheds with no building date or that have alterations to siding and doors.
- For an individual building or site:
 - A majority of the building's openings (such as doors and windows) are altered in an inappropriate manner using new materials, profiles and sizes.
 - Later additions do not respect the materials, scale, or character of the original building.
 - Front porch substantially altered or missing.
 - Alterations are irreversible or would be extremely difficult, costly, and possibly physically damaging to the building to reverse.
 - The building is in jeopardy of physical deterioration due to a lack of maintenance.
 - The overall historic character of the building is considerably compromised.

The 3900 Block of Kenwood and the 4300 Block of Troost have the least integrity of the blocks due to alterations to existing buildings and incompatible infill, but they both retain contributing buildings to the district. The 4500 Block of Troost has only two contributing buildings, the Fire Station and the Handy-Baker Motor Company. Their significant size and massing anchor the streetscape and help retain the integrity of the block. Some of the district's buildings have had vinyl siding installed, but most of the siding was installed without covering details and could easily be removed. This district is an intact early 20th century middle class streetcar suburbs in Kansas City, and retains its integrity of location, design, materials, feelings and association.

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Property Descriptions

The property descriptions were part of a 2001 Survey of South Hyde Park that was updated by the Hyde Park Neighborhood Association and Kansas City Landmarks staff. The descriptions differentiate between builders and developers. A builder is carpenter, contractor, or skilled craftsman that physically worked on construction of the house. A developer is defined as a real estate investor that may have had input to the design, but did not build the resource. Sometimes a person or company was both the builder and developer.

601 E. 39th St. House. (1909). *Architect:* unknown; *Builder:* Edwin Ruthven Crutcher; *Developer:* L. Crutcher & Son. C Outbuildings: N/A

This one story hipped roof house has a raised concrete patio clad in stone and surrounded by a stone balustrade surrounding it. The building has 6/1 double hung windows and a basement garage with an entrance off of 39th St. There is a mission style parapet dormer above the front door that has a double hung window with an arched upper sash. Wrought iron railings lead down the concrete stairs to the street level. This is one of three houses on E. 39th Street built by Edwin Crutcher, a realtor in Kansas City, who was vice-president of the Lombard Investment Company and resided at 3448 Troost Avenue.

603 E. 39th St. House. (1910). *Architect:* unknown; *Builder:* Edwin Ruthven Crutcher; *Developer:* L. Crutcher & Son. C Outbuildings: N/A

This two story hipped roof Craftsman house has a full width porch supported by ashlar cut stone piers with arches on the sides and is surrounded by a low stone wall. The building has 6/1 double hung windows. There is a unique pentagonal bay dormer on the front façade. The house sits on a stone foundation and is clad in stucco. Stone retaining walls border the front steps. This is one of three houses on E. 39th Street built by Edwin Crutcher, a realtor in Kansas City, who was vice-president of the Lombard Investment Company and resided at 3448 Troost Avenue.

605 E. 39th St. House. (1909). *Architect:* unknown; *Builder:* Edwin Ruthven Crutcher; *Developer:* L. Crutcher & Son. C Outbuildings: N/A

This 1 1/2 story side gabled bungalow has a full width porch supported by ashlar cut stone piers and surrounded by a low stone wall. The building has 4/1 double hung wood sash windows. There is a gable dormer on the north (front) side of the roof with decorative brackets and wide eaves. The house sits on a stone foundation and is clad in stucco. Stone retaining walls border the front steps. This is one of three houses on E. 39th Street built by Edwin Crutcher, a realtor in Kansas City, who was vice-president of the Lombard Investment Company and resided at 3448 Troost Avenue.

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701 E. 39th St. House. (1920). *Architect:* unknown; *Builder:* unknown; *Developer:* B.D. Morley. C
Outbuildings: N/A

This 1 1/2 story side gabled bungalow has a full width porch supported by stone piers and surrounded by a low stone wall. The building has 3/1 double hung wood sash windows. There is a gable dormer on the north side of the roof with decorative brackets and wide eaves. The house sits on a stone foundation and is clad in wood shingles. There is a single car basement garage with an entrance off of Charlotte St.

705 E. 39th St. House. (1920). *Architect:* unknown; *Builder:* unknown; *Developer:* B.D. Morley. C
Outbuildings: See 709 E. 39th Street

This 1 1/2 story side jerkinhead roof bungalow has a full width gabled roof porch supported by paired wood post on stone piers and surrounded by a low stone wall. The building has double hung wood sash windows. The house sits on a stone foundation and is clad in vinyl lap siding. There is a shared underground parking facility with 709 E. 39th St. The building has a deck on top and a stone retaining wall along the drive.

709 E. 39th St. House. (1920). *Architect:* unknown; *Builder:* unknown; *Developer:* B.D. Morley. C
Outbuildings: garage NC

This 1 1/2 story side gabled roof bungalow has a full width gabled roof porch supported by wood post on a concrete floor. The building has double hung 3/1 wood sash windows. There is a shed dormer on the north façade with three light awning windows. The house sits on a stone foundation and is clad in vinyl lap siding. There is a shared underground parking facility with 709 E. 39th St. The building has a deck on top and a stone retaining wall along the drive.

801 E. 39th St. House. Earl and Fran Middaugh Residence (1908). *Architect:* unknown; *Builder:* L.G. Cockin, Jr.; *Developer:* Arthur C. Cowan. C Outbuildings: N/A

This 1 1/2 story end gabled bungalow has a full width gabled roof porch supported by stone piers and surrounded by wrought iron balustrade. The building has double hung 1/1 wood sash windows. The house sits on a stone foundation and is clad in asbestos shingles. There is a limestone retaining wall with concrete steps leading up to the property. The first residents were Earl and Fran Middaugh lived at this residence with their daughter. He was a cashier at a bank.

803 E. 39th St. House. James L and Ada McKewn Residence (1908). *Architect:* unknown; *Builder:* unknown; *Developer:* unknown. C Outbuildings: N/A

This 1 1/2 story side gabled roof bungalow has a full width gabled roof porch supported by brick piers on the corners and Doric columns in the center. The building has double hung wood sash windows. The house sits on a

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stone foundation and is clad in asbestos shingles. There is a driveway on the east side of the house. This was the house of James L and Ada McKewn. He was a manager of an advertising agency.

805 E. 39th St. House. Fred Groat Residence (1908). *Architect:* unknown; *Builder:* L.G. Cockin, Jr.; *Developer:* Arthur C. Cowan. C Outbuildings: N/A

This 1 1/2 story side gabled bungalow has a partial width porch supported by wood piers on ashlar cut stone bases and a wood balustrade. There is decorative half timbering in the gable end of the porch. The building has double hung vinyl sash windows. The house sits on a stone foundation and is clad in wood shingles. Fred J. Groat, a rate clerk for the railroad, resided here.

807 E. 39th St. House. Richard B. and Minnie Crook Residence (1908). *Architect:* unknown; *Builder:* L.G. Cockin, Jr.; *Developer:* Arthur C. Cowan. C Outbuildings: N/A

This 1 1/2 story side gabled bungalow has a partial width porch supported by wood piers on ashlar cut stone bases and a wood balustrade. There is a small shed dormer on the north façade. The building has double hung vinyl sash windows. The house sits on a stone foundation and is clad in wood lap siding. Richard B. and Minnie Crook resided here. He was a vice president of a steel firm.

811 E. 39th St. House. David and Marguerite McDonald Residence (1908). *Architect:* unknown; *Builder:* L.G. Cockin, Jr.; *Developer:* Arthur C. Cowan. C Outbuildings: garage NC

This 2 story Craftsman designed house has a partial width porch supported by ashlar cut stone piers and a wood balustrade. The building has a hipped roof with four hipped dormers, all have exposed eaves. The building has double hung 6/1 wood sash windows. The house sits on a stone foundation and is clad in wood shingles. There is a one car garage with a hipped roof located in the southwest corner of the property. There is a one car garage with a gable roof and scored plywood siding located on the west side of the house.

815 E. 39th St. House. Katherine and Bert Neustadt Residence (1910). *Architect:* Harry Alexander Drake; *Builder:* unknown; *Developer:* Bert Neustadt. C Outbuildings: N/A

This 1 1/2 story end gabled bungalow has a partial width porch supported by ashlar cut stone piers. The stone piers extend above the roofline and are crenellated. There is a bay window on the front façade that partially extends under the porch and is integrated with the porch roofline. The building has two large shed dormers on the east and west facades. The house sits on a stone foundation and is clad in stucco. This was the home of Katherine Neustadt and her son Bert, who was in real estate.

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South Hyde Park Historic District
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901-03 E. 39th St. Apartment. (1909). *Architect:* Edgar C. Faris; *Builder:* P.J. McCavick; *Developer:* unknown. C Outbuildings: N/A

This two unit Colonnaded apartment building has brick cladding with quoining, a flat roof and was designed in the Craftsman style. The building features a two story combined square column porch with ashlar cut stone on the bottom story and a half and wood on the top half story. The second story balustrade features a starburst pattern. There is a two story bay window on the west side.

907-09 E. 39th St. Apartment. (1909). *Architect:* Edgar C. Faris; *Builder:* Patrick J. McCavick; *Developer:* unknown. C Outbuildings: N/A

This two unit Colonnaded apartment building has brick cladding with quoining, a flat roof and was designed in the Craftsman style. The building features a two story combined square column porch with ashlar cut stone on the bottom story and a half and wood on the top half story. The second story balustrade features a starburst pattern. There is a two story bay window on the west side.

607-09 E. 40th St. Apartment. (1922). *Architect:* unknown; *Builder:* H. Kelley; *Developer:* H. Kelley. C Outbuildings: N/A

This four unit two story Colonnaded apartment building has brick cladding, a flat roof and was designed in the Craftsman style. It has a central entry flanked by 2 two-story porches under a single roof. The porches feature two story square brick columns with a low brick wall on the first story and a wood balustrade on the second. The building is clad in brick on the first story and stucco on the second story. This building is part of a complex of 5 buildings that are and the southeast corner of 40th Street and Kenwood. There is sharing parking for the complex in the rear of the buildings.

611 E. 40th St. Apartment. (1922). *Architect:* unknown; *Builder:* H. Kelley; *Developer:* H. Kelley. C Outbuildings: N/A

This two unit two story Colonnaded apartment building has brick cladding, a flat roof and was designed in the Craftsman style. The building has an entry bay on the west side with a pair of two-story porches under a single roof. The porch features two story square brick columns with a low brick wall on the first story and a wood balustrade on the second. The building is clad in asbestos shingles. This building is part of a complex of 5 buildings that are and the southeast corner of 40th Street and Kenwood. There is shared parking for the complex to the rear of the buildings.

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615-17 E. 40th St. Apartment. (1911). *Architect:* unknown; *Builder:* W. Simpson; *Developer:* unknown. NC
Outbuildings: N/A

This two story vernacular duplex has a flat roof with a low parapet wall. The building has cut stone cladding on the first story and asbestos shingles on the second story. There are one story porches with hipped roofs and Doric columns on the east and west facades, that serve as the main entrances to each unit. 
This section of Gillham Road runs seven blocks from E. 39th St. south to Brush Creek. The site includes two baseball diamonds with chain link backstops, a wading pool, concrete stairs and trails along the west side of the Road, and a children's play area currently under construction at 41st St. While the landscape design is intact, many of the features, including the curbs, paving, stairs, backstops, and the wading pool are recent alterations that are not contributing significant features and have not altered the historic feel of the parkway. The Park Maintenance Barn is the only intact structure that is significant. The section of Gillham from 35th Street to Brush Creek Blvd. is perhaps one of the most important parts of the boulevard system. The boulevard was planned for community recreation as well as traffic flow. The park is closely associated with the adjacent neighborhoods. The neighborhood is a good example of late 19th and early 20th century experimentation in residential layouts around parks. This layout provided both a "central park" for each community as well as a pleasurable experience for outsiders passing through. The current facilities like the wading pool and playground continue this historic commitment to the surrounding community.

The Parks and Recreation building is constructed of native limestone and trimmed with vitrified brick. An additional shed/stall area was added in 1914 to the south of the barn proper. The shingle-hipped roof has wide overhanging eaves. A central hipped roof dormer, containing paired sash windows and a hay loft wooden door, is placed over the main entrance. The main entrance, originally a barn door, has been altered. The entrance is now a board and batten wooden door with multi-light transom. Fenestration consists of multi-light sash windows with stone sills. Some windows have been boarded up. Vitrified brick has been used for window and door surrounds as well as string coursing. Originally the first floor interior and the court were brick pavement. The once stone and wrought iron fence running along the south side of the complex and to the north of the building has been altered (date unknown).

The Park and Recreation building, 3915 Gillham Road, was designed by Adriance Van Brunt in 1904. L. Crosby & Son were awarded the contract to construct the building. Designed as an "ornamental barn", it was to be used by the park employees and housed the horses, sprinkling carts and other park vehicles. Originally, the barn contained twelve ordinary horse stalls, a hospital stall, wagon sheds, harness roan, tool roan, office and a men's roan. In 1914, an addition was made to the barn. Stone was added to the existing stone wall and a roof added creating the open storage area to the south of the main structure. The stone piers which at one time were part of a fence were presumably also added at this time.

The Park and Recreation building is significant as one of the few early remaining limestone barn complexes constructed as a park structure. Furthermore, the building was designed by the master, Adriance Van Brunt. In addition, the site of the building is in keeping with Kessler's philosophy "that all structures for operating purposes . . . which are artificial and more or less out of keeping with natural scenery, should never become conspicuous in either design or color . . . it should be so located and so screened as not to offend the eye."

The various alterations to the character of the house make this property noncontributing due to lack of integrity.

This two story gothic revival church has a gabled roof and twin towers a three story bell tower on the northwest corner of the building. There is a cut stone parapet and a stone cross at the ridge. There are triple rectangular windows with continuous stone sills in the tower. The main entrance is centrally placed within a blunt arch with stone voussoirs and a gothic arched window is centered above it.

The rectory is to the west of the church and connected by a 102 foot colonnade. The 2 story gabled Rectory house is in excellent condition and is in the Tudor Revival style with an L shape plan. The rectory has a stone foundation and is clad in brick with stone quoin surrounds. The rectory has a terra cotta parapet, metal awnings, and aluminum storm windows over the wood double hung windows. A brick breezeway with a clay tile roof connects the rectory of the south side of the church.

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A stone retaining wall surrounds the property and there is a parking lot east of the buildings that extend to Troost Ave. There is a low stone wall surrounding the parking lot. There is a metal shed located in the parking lot on the east side of the rectory.

The parish for this church was canonically established in 1906. The first pastor was Father John Keyes. The original site for the church and school was at 40th & Tracy Streets. In 1909, part of lots 23 and all of 24, Troost Highland Addition, were purchased from R. S. Asbury at a cost of \$39,000. There was a house on the site which was used as a rectory. In 1910, the remainder of lot 23 and part of lot 22 were deeded to Father Keyes. The following year the present church was built and modeled after St. James Episcopal Church in London. The architects, Sanneman and Van Trump declined to take a fee for their design. The church was completed Dec. 22, 1912. The Carthage limestone used in the construction of the church came from the top 65 ft. of the Winner Piers (forerunner of ASB Bridge). The stone was mined in Cotton Falls, KS in 1887 and cost \$19,000. The church itself cost \$40,000 to construct and originally had a seating capacity for 430 persons. There are no pillars in the church. The church was dedicated on Aug. 24, 1913. In 1924, a \$60,000 addition to the east of the church was begun. New stained glass was installed in this addition. This addition was dedicated in 1925. In 1927 a \$40,000 Kilgen organ was installed and 1965 the high altar and communion rail were removed. The rectory was built in 1929-30 and is located on the site of the first rectory for St. James Church and cost \$35,000 to construct.

This small shed has a gabled roof with metal siding. The building served as a sales office for the used car lot. The openings have been altered to accommodate the siding. This building is noncontributing due to alterations.

4518 Troost Ave. Fire Station. Fire Station No. 31, Truck Company No. 11 (1931). *Architect:* Madorie & Bihr; *Builder:* J.E. Dunn Const Co; *Developer:* unknown. C Outbuildings: N/A

This two story Beaux Arts fire station has a flat roof with a hipped clay tile parapet on the front façade. There are two sets of three arched windows on the second story. The center second story window has a pedimented gable and a balconet. The first story of the front façade has three bays with rusticated limestone cladding and a centered arched opening. The north, south and west facades have 1/1 double hung wood sash windows. The building has a concrete foundation with brick masonry walls and limestone cladding on the front façade.

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4524 Troost Ave. Commercial. (1929). *Architect:* unknown; *Builder:* unknown; *Developer:* unknown. NC
Outbuildings: N/A

This one part commercial block has a flat roof with a hipped parapet. The front façade has metal siding and one open bay. The building has a concrete foundation and concrete block walls. This building is noncontributing due to the numerous alterations to the front façade.

4528 Troost Ave. Commercial. (1913). *Architect:* Jackson & McIlvain; *Builder:* James Gilert; *Developer:* unknown. NC Outbuildings: N/A

This one part commercial block has a flat roof with a hipped parapet. The front façade has vertical wood siding and three bays. The building has a concrete foundation and concrete block walls. This building is noncontributing due to the numerous alterations to the front façade.

4538 Troost Ave. Commercial. Handy-Baker Motors Inc (1928). *Architect:* unknown; *Builder:* unknown; *Developer:* unknown. C Outbuildings: N/A

This three story two part commercial block has a flat roof with a brick parapet. There are 12 bays on the south façade and 9 bays on the east façade. A large center bay is flanked by two smaller bays, similar to the Chicago style window. There are five bays on the first story of the south façade and three bays on the east façade. There are metal windows in the bays with inset awning windows. The building has a concrete foundation and has brick cladding on reinforced concrete walls. The building cost \$30,000 to build.

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SUMMARY

The South Hyde Park Historic District, located in Kansas City, Jackson County, Missouri is nominated to the National Register of Historic Places as locally significant under Criterion A and C in the area of COMMUNITY PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT and in the area of ARCHITECTURE. The district is significant in Community Planning and Development as a neighborhood that evolved out of Kansas City's southward population shift. This development was furthered by the extension of city limits, expansion of public transportation and the City Beautiful Movement, implemented by George Kessler's Park and Boulevards System. The district's built environment retains a high degree of integrity, reflecting popular early 20th century architectural styles. The district represents common suburban building types from its era, consisting of housing with accompanying commercial and religious structures. Most of the district's houses are modest, working class houses, but high style residences and multiple family buildings contribute to the mix. The limited period of significance begins in 1885, when the first subdivision was platted, to 1939, the end of the district's major residential development.

HISTORY OF THE DISTRICT

Most of the area known today at South Hyde Park was platted in the 1880s, before the city limits extended to the area. Most of the district's subdivisions—Troost Highlands, Vanderbilt Place, Lansdowne, Garland's Resurvey and Stegner's Resurvey—were platted between 1885 and 1887. A street grid established by Kansas City's downtown was laid out with no regard for the rolling hills and valleys of the area. The premature platting was part of a speculative fever that hit Kansas City in the late 1800s, when much of the countryside around the town was laid out into city lots. Properties were sold and resold during this time, providing investors with large profits, as well as significant losses.¹ As downtown Kansas City became increasingly industrial and crowded, the city's growing population began moving south. The new subdivisions platted in the late 1880s and early 1890s gradually filled the open country that was previously pasture and truck farms. City limits expanded to 49th Street in 1897, absorbing the town of Westport, established in the mid-1800s as an outpost for travelers heading to Santa Fe or Oregon. The South Hyde Park district's last subdivision was platted in 1902. James Squier, a cattle dealer and financier, owned forty acres between 43rd and 45th Streets, Holmes to Troost. He lived on Troost until his death in 1900, when his property became the Sunny Slope subdivision.

The 1900 Tuttle & Pike's Atlas shows the land comprising the district as completely platted (except for J.J. Squier's property) but with less than 50 houses. Development accelerated with the arrival of city water in 1905, the paving of roads between 1903 and 1906 and the extension of the Troost street car to 48th Street in 1907. Once the infrastructure was in place, building in the neighborhood began in earnest. Most of the more than 700 residences in South Hyde Park were built between 1900 and 1910, with many of them constructed in clusters by common developers, builders and/or architects. The area boomed, appealing mostly to the middle class. The availability of public transportation made the district easily accessible to downtown employment and shopping.

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Early residences ranged from a few very large houses placed near Troost Avenue to rows of compact bungalows. The Kansas City Shirtwaist was an extremely common compromise in the neighborhood between grand and efficient housing. The two-and-a-half-story foursquare with different wall treatments on each level provided a spacious, yet reasonably priced house for its residents. Rows of these houses line the blocks of the South Hyde Park district, nearly identical in form but adorned with varying architectural details. Bungalows also predominate, providing easily built and economical housing. Pockets of the one-and-a-half-story Craftsman dwellings abound, primarily in the western portion of the district.

Construction in the neighborhood continued to progress after 1910, but at a slower pace. World War I had a negative impact on the building trade in Kansas City, as well as the rest of the country. Nevertheless, 153 structures were built in the district between 1911 and 1920. The 1910s brought an expansion of multi-family housing to the neighborhood, a trend that continued into the 1920s. Grand colonnades, stylish walk-ups and duplexes that mimic single-family houses make up the apartment buildings scattered throughout the area. Construction of commercial buildings, most along Troost Avenue, also increased in the 1920s, providing outlets for the groceries, bakeries and other businesses desired by the neighborhood residents.

Most construction ended in the district by the mid-1920s. Just seven buildings—all commercial structures—were built between 1928 and 1939, the end of the district's period of significance. The area was full, with very few vacant lots. The Great Depression also brought an end to nearly all privately funded construction in Kansas City, as well as across the country. By 1927, the South Hyde Park District had reached its final stage, achieving today's density and mix of building types.

COMMUNITY PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT

At the turn of the last century, Kansas City was poised for growth. The city's population grew from 132,716 in 1890 to 163,752 in 1900, but vastly increased to 248,381 in 1910.² By 1890, residents began moving south as families left the formerly elegant neighborhoods of Quality Hill and Independence Avenue for houses away from downtown, preferably located near one of the new parkways. Kansas City annexed the town of Westport in 1897, pushing city boundaries south and east. Just as homeowners were ready to move south, developers were also ready to construct the neighborhoods to house them. Neighborhood development typically went hand-in-hand with city water service. Kansas City water capacity increased dramatically in the late 1800s with the city taking over the local privately owned waterworks, Quindaro pumping station and Turkey Creek pumping station in 1895, as well as the Westport pipeline in 1896.³ City water and sewer lines were complete in the South Hyde Park district in 1905, contemporaneous with a burst of construction activity.

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Once water was established in the district, the already platted developments were ripe for construction. The location between a planned city park and streetcar line set the scene for rapid development in the early 1900s. Nearly 100 houses were built in the district in 1905 and 1906, almost twice the number built from 1890 through 1904. The numbers continued to increase dramatically, with nearly 350 houses built from 1907 through 1909. By 1910, the neighborhood planned in the late 1880s was a solid reality.

Kansas City implemented a plan for growth with the adoption of a broad park and boulevard system in 1893. The initial plan that included four parks connected by a network of boulevards expanded in 1909 and again in 1915. The system encouraged planned land use by defining and separating industrial, commercial and residential areas. The thoroughfares promoted quality residential development adjacent to the attractive green spaces. Gillham Road and Gillham Park were part of the 1909 expansion, but the movement was afoot much earlier. An 1899 classified advertisement from *The Kansas City Star* offers the yet-to-be-built parkway to developers: "600 feet near 47th on Holmes, Charlotte, Harrison and Troost. The new boulevard is planned to go through this ground, the electric line to the new driving park will be constructed either north or south of these lots, they are eminently (sic) in the way of improvement and I can sell the whole bunch for \$2,000. George Law, N.Y. Life Bldg."⁴ Kansas City acquired the area for Gillham Park and Gillham Road through condemnation between 1901 and 1906 and completed the road from 1904 to 1908.⁵ A section of Gillham Road was paved from 42nd to 45th streets between 1903 and 1906.⁶ Many of Kessler's planned amenities for Gillham Park were not constructed due to budget constraints, but the ten-acre park and parkway were completed by 1910. Architect Adriance Van Brunt designed the Park Management Building at 3915 Gillham built in 1905. The native limestone barn was to be used by the park employees and to house horses, sprinkling carts and other park vehicles. The building was expanded in 1914, adding an open storage area on the south side.⁷ The green space of Gillham Park, the only site included in the district, provided an attractive western edge to the expanding neighborhood. The space not only provided an appealing border for Gillham Road, but also embraced the rolling topography of the valley.

Expansion of the Troost streetcar line also contributed to the growth of the district. As Kansas City's neighborhoods steadily proliferated south, the streetcar lines spread with them. Public transportation in Kansas City began with horse-drawn railways, later replaced by cable cars that scaled the bluffs from the Missouri River to downtown. By the 1890s, newly powered electric trolleys caught the public's attention as a more versatile and a less expensive mode of transportation. Transit lines began converting to electricity and by 1900, Kansas City had more than 100 miles of electric routes.⁸ Almost all of Kansas City's streetcars were electric in 1908,⁹ including the Troost line that previously ended at 33rd Street and now ran to 48th Street. By 1914, the Troost line continued west at 48th Street to Rockhill Road, then north and west to Main Street. The South Hyde Park district was not planned to accommodate automobiles, with many of the lots measuring just 25 feet wide. The nearby streetcar was an important amenity for downtown workers. The 1910 census shows that occupations of neighborhood residents included many professionals and middle class downtown workers—stenographers, clerks, managers, operators and manufacturing workers. The Troost streetcar, with a fare of just five cents until 1918,¹⁰ served as the primary means of transportation for these residents.

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With the district poised for development in the late 1800s, a few residents took root. The 1900 Atlas shows just two clustered developments in the area, seven houses on the east side of the 3900 block of Kenwood¹¹ and eight houses on the 4100 block of Holmes. Most of the early residences shown on the map do not correspond to current structures. Information is also not available from Kansas City building permits, because the houses were constructed before the area became part of the city. Information for early dwellings comes from the occasional building permit or *Kansas City Architect and Builder*, a trade periodical. An unknown builder constructed three matching houses in 1900 at 616, 618 and 620 East 42nd Street. The size and similarity of the one-and-a-half-story dwellings indicate that a speculator built them. Jared G. Eggleston, a contractor and carpenter, was one of the district's early developers. He built three houses between 1898 and 1900 at 4012, 4016, and 4211 Charlotte and another at 4025 Holmes. The house at 4016 Charlotte served as Eggleston's residence.

Classified advertisements in *The Kansas City Star* promoted lots to developers and completed houses to residents in the early 1900s. A June 1904 listing reads, "Beautiful Sunny Slope 44th and Troost Ave./ We have 6 new homes just completed in the addition; stone and brick; on beautiful 50-foot lots; houses are completely modern and up-to-date; range in price from \$5,000 to \$8,000; come out to-day and look them over. Sunny Slope Realty Co., 700 Commerce Bldg."¹² Another advertising vacant lots reads, "Beautiful Troost Highlands is all the name implies; It's located at 39th and Campbell; a beautiful high spot; just the place for a nice home; we are going to make a price on the 5 remaining lots so that you will buy them; they have got to be sold at once to close out an estate....in 2 years will be worth more than double. \$15 but make us an offer. Woods, Waller & Holtz Realty Co."¹³

It was not until the entire district had city water in 1905 that most of the multiple property developers arrived. Some were organized businesses with the abilities to take on large-scale development, such as a group of men that made up the Butler Investment Company, Butler-Hollister Realty Company and Butler-Weaver Realty Company from 1905 until 1910. The group built and/or developed approximately 40 houses in the district. The district generally developed east to west, with earlier and larger houses located along Harrison and Campbell Streets, although pockets of development provide exceptions to this pattern. Speculation was rampant in the district. Classified advertisements regularly promoted dwellings ready for occupants. Houses were offered in ads individually, such as a May 7, 1905 classified for 4309 Charlotte (\$5250)¹⁴ or a July 7, 1907 ad for 4215 Charlotte (\$2550)¹⁵, or in batches, such as a June 4, 1905 ad that promoted the Sunny Slope development with eight- to ten-room houses ranging from \$5000 to \$13,000.¹⁶

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The man with the biggest impact on the district, Napoleon Dible, worked in the neighborhood in 1908. Dible was a contractor, builder and developer responsible for thousands of houses in early Kansas City suburbs. Dible typically built his houses from just a few floor plans and his South Hyde Park homes are no exception. He built approximately 35 houses in the district, all of them two-and-a-half-stories tall in the Kansas City Shirtwaist style. Another large developer, Charles T. Houlehan, built approximately 30 houses in 1908 and 1909 in the district. Houlehan was owner of CT Houlehan Contracting Company and served as developer for all but two or three of the houses. Other developers operated on a much smaller scale, such as Fred Cox, a contractor who built three houses in 1904 at 4333 and 4337 Charlotte and at 4419 Campbell. Builders like Cox likely took designs from pattern books for their buildings. W. Chaffe Whitehead, who lived at 3926 Troost, focused on developing seven Shirtwaists on the northeast corner of 40th and Harrison between 1905 and 1907. Volney and Julian Primm developed six Shirtwaists in 1909 in the 4400 block of Campbell. Volney Primm lived in one of them at 4429 Campbell. A survey of the district reveals dozens of builders and developers working alone or in tandem to create much of the new landscape before 1910.

Toward the end of the decade, architects designed an increasing number of houses. Information from building permits reveals that the neighborhood served as proving ground for newly established Kansas City architects Clarence Shepard and Edgar Madorie. The district also provided opportunities for established designers, such as Louis Curtiss, John McKecknie and Horace LaPierre. Designs by lesser-known architects are also present, such as those by Matt O'Connell. O'Connell designed and built two houses at 4100 and 4104 Harrison in 1904 and three houses at 4101, 4103 and 4105 Campbell in 1906.

Approximately 60 single-family houses were built in the district in the 1910s, and even fewer in the 1920s, filling the lots that were not yet occupied. Building construction in Kansas City slowed after 1914 due to costlier supplies and labor. Increased tension in Europe resulted in shipping embargoes and higher prices for building materials. At home, an upsurge in organized labor raised wages. Although Kansas City's population continued to climb, reaching 324,410 in 1920 and 399,746 in 1930,¹⁷ large-scale home construction ended in the district, simply because most of the neighborhood was fully occupied. Vacant lots gradually filled with individual houses and smaller scale developments. Albert Laitner served as the contractor and builder for Laitner Brothers, a plumbing company that developed several houses in the district. Albert Laitner built his own house at 4036 Holmes in 1909 and then built four in 1913 at 4137, 4139, 4145 and 4147 Holmes. Laitner Brothers served as the developer for at least two of the houses. The Wells Brothers Building company built 16 houses scattered mostly in pairs throughout the district in 1911. Architect John Stansberry designed and built four houses around the intersection of 40th and Charlotte in 1913. Timothy Kelly built the district's last three bungalows in 1921 at 4135, 4137 and 4142 Kenwood.

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Nearly all buildings constructed early in the district were single-family homes. Before 1910, the district had less than ten multi-family dwellings and no commercial buildings. The earliest multi-family buildings were colonnaded duplexes, such as 3930 Campbell built in 1907 or 4125 Campbell built in 1908. By 1910, colonnaded apartments had proliferated throughout the district, as well as across Kansas City. Many of the approximately 40 multi-family buildings built in the district during the 1910s were in this style, discussed in-depth in the MPDF “Historic Colonnade Apartments of Kansas City, Missouri.”¹⁸ The colonnaded dwellings appealed to the middle class as affordable and spacious housing at a reasonable cost. The attached front porches were well suited to the neighborhood, giving tenants a chance to enjoy a breeze as they overlooked their new environs of Troost Avenue, residential streets or Gillham Park.

The increase in apartment buildings continued into the 1920s, when approximately 40 more multi-family dwellings were constructed. Some apartment buildings in the district are clustered, but most appear individually. The building type is scattered throughout the area rather than focused on one or two streets. Because most of the buildings appeared later in the development of the district, they occupy sites that were not claimed by the first wave of homeowners and speculators. They may also reflect the value of land within the district, establishing a much higher return on building sites than single-family homes.

Many of these later apartments were larger than those built earlier, but the 1920s era generally reflects eclecticism in sizes and styles. The colonnade style continued to be popular, especially when placed along Troost or on Kenwood overlooking Gillham Park. Frank E. Styles developed three grand three-story colonnaded buildings in 1923 at 4031-33, 4035-37 and 4039-41 Kenwood. Builder and developer H. Kelley was responsible for three matching two-story brick colonnaded duplexes built in 1922 at 4001, 4005 and 4007 Kenwood. Prominent builder and developer Charles Phillips erected six three-story tapestry brick walk-up apartments on the south side of East 42nd Street between Charlotte and Campbell, built in 1921. Smaller but stylish apartment buildings that fit well with the single-family blocks were also built during the 1920s. Examples of these include a simple duplex built in 1922 at 4026-28 Campbell or a two-story Tudor Revival apartment building at 3933 Charlotte.

The 1925 atlas shows the lots in the South Hyde Park district as nearly fully developed. By 1928, residential construction came to near-complete stop in the district and never resumed, a result of the unavailability of vacant lots.

Three churches were built within the district. They were all placed on Harrison, probably so that they could be easily reached on foot or by streetcar. The First Church of the United Brethren was built at 4000 Harrison in 1907, the Immanuel Presbyterian Church (altered) was built in 1909 at 4101 Harrison and St. James Catholic

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Church was built at 3901 Harrison in 1911. (The St. James parish originally met in Walsman Hall at 40th and Tracy, where the congregation built a school in 1907.)

As the South Hyde Park district filled with residents, commerce arrived to provide local shopping opportunities. Several businesses were located along Troost Avenue by 1917, most clustered in the 3900 block and the 4500-4600 blocks. Shops included several grocery stores, cleaners, a drug store, barber, milliner and a post office. Later demolition in these blocks resulted in the loss of the early commercial buildings. The W. Chaffee Whitehead Residence, built circa 1891 at 3926-30 Troost was converted to the Oglesby Hotel in 1911. Whitehead, a real estate developer who built several houses on the 3900 block of Harrison Street, sold the house to Courtney H. Rauk. Rauk added a rear three-story addition for the hotel. The building became the Highlands Hotel by 1930. Just one extant commercial building constructed before 1922 remains in the district, the Sunny Slope Gas Station, built in 1913 at 4528 Troost.¹⁹ Many of the district's extant commercial buildings were constructed in 1922, all but one located on Troost. In fact, the Meiners Brothers Grocery Store built in 1922 at 4108 Holmes is the only one of the 17 historic extant commercial buildings in the district that is not on Troost. Five extant commercial buildings were constructed facing Troost Avenue in 1922. They housed the Paul B. Koener bakery and Fred C. Johannes doll manufacturer at 4112-14; the Joseph Tabolosky tailor shop at 4212; Hazel A. Moss, a dressmaker, and R. Spector, a grocer, at 4248-54; and an unknown business at 4216. The building at 3922-24 Troost, built in 1924, housed R.L. Fish and Sons grocery at 3922 and a restaurant owned by Blanche Cohn at 3924. The final commercial buildings built near the 3900 block of Troost were the Gus Brown fruit stand at 4000 Troost in 1927 and Robert Kinnear's bakery/Howard Cleaners at 3940 in 1930. Later commercial development occurred on Troost, especially in the 4500 block. The Handy-Baker Motor Company was built at 4538 Troost in 1928, the Johnson B. Forest used car salesroom at 4524 Troost in 1929 and the Bibbs Auto Sales Company at 4512 Troost in 1934. Fire Station No. 31 at 4518 Troost was built in 1931.

Troost Avenue remained mostly residential within the district, but the street's future was as a commercial corridor. Development along the district's eastern boundary eventually served as one of Kansas City's first outlying shopping districts. A 1929 article in the *Kansas City Journal-Post* stated, "Troost Avenue, the longest street in the city, now is zoned entirely for business. In the regulation of traffic, light signal are being installed at Fifteenth and Troost, 31st and Troost and 39th and Troost."²⁰

With a mixture of housing types, plus the addition of commercial and religious structures, what type of resident did the district attract? Census information from 1900 shows that most heads of the households were laborers with occupations such as carpenter, plumber, miller, plasterer, and machinist, plus the occasional clerk or salesman. Most of the houses held families with children in school. By 1910, residents were more professional, but also interspersed with the service trades. The 1910 census lists occupations within the district as life insurance agent, contractor, telegraph operator, bank cashier, plumber and stenographer. It also shows that the

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4500 block of Troost Avenue was home to many employees of the street railway, with professions that included conductor, laborer, motorman and inspector. District residents often had extended family members or grown and working children living with them and many households included a servant in the 1910s. In the 1920s, the neighborhood continued to serve as a home for a collection of professional and service workers that included grain trader, salesman, railroad conductor, draftsman and real estate agent. During this time, more wives worked and the households often included boarders or grown children living with their parents. The 1930 Social Directory lists 35 upper class Kansas Citians living within the district, most with occupations of lawyer, clergyman, accountant and engineer. During the 1930s, Kansas City's most desirable neighborhoods were south of 47th Street, identified as the Country Club District. The upper- and middle-classes of Kansas Citians that sought out the developments in the South Hyde Park district in the early 1900s now looked for homes in southern Kansas City.²¹ South Hyde Park retained a solid middle-class core of residents. Occupations listed in the city directories include clerk, store manager, railroad worker, teacher, salesman, dressmaker and insurance agent. Kansas City was strictly segregated during its period of significance, so it is unlikely that any African Americans lived in the district.²² All of the residents from 1900 to 1930 were listed in the census as white and nearly all were native born.

Kansas City faced a housing shortage in the early 1940s that continued until the end of World War II. Many of the large houses in the South Hyde district were divided into apartments, a trend that began much earlier. Early examples include a 1905 Shirtwaist at 3916 Charlotte divided into a duplex in 1914 or the division of a 1911 bungalow at 4033 Holmes into a duplex in 1925 by adding a rear sleeping porch and finishing the attic. Building permits reflect later partitions, such as a 1942 permit to subdivide 4022 Charlotte, built in 1910, but construction very often took place without a permit. Many of the grand houses built on Harrison especially suffered during the 1940s, split into three, four or five living units. City directory listings reflect the demographics of World War II, with many of the homes occupied by a female head of the household. During this time, men and women were employed in occupations that included railroad worker, printer, bank employee, Remington Arms employee and store manager.

Subdivision of the single-family houses increased with each decade until approximately the late 1970s, when a neighborhood renaissance began. During that decade, urban pioneers began purchasing the houses and restoring them to their original single-family use.

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ARCHITECTURE

Architectural styles within the South Hyde Park Historic District reflect the period of development, primarily from the early 1900s until about 1930. The district was developed for mostly middle- to upper-class residents who worked and shopped downtown. While the neighborhood includes a few grand residences, most of the houses and apartments were designed to be attractive and affordable to the middle class. Additional buildings added to the district after development began—churches and stores—reflect architectural trends popular at the time of construction. The result is an early 20th century community with a very high degree of integrity, reflecting its development as a streetcar suburb.

The South Hyde Park Historic District is overwhelmingly residential, composed of block after block of mostly single-family housing. Of the 735 primary contributing buildings in the in district, 660 are single-family residences. Historic multi-family residences also play an important role in the composition, scattered throughout the neighborhood. These range from duplexes that mimic individual dwellings to colonnaded four- and sixplexes to larger buildings that contain 12 or more units. The collection of non-residential buildings includes three churches, one fire station, and 17 commercial buildings.

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Housing styles in the district reflect the architectural styles popular during years of development. The American Foursquare/Kansas City Shirtwaist styles are most common, followed by the Bungalow/Craftsman styles. Also well represented within the district are Colonial Revival/Neoclassical and Queen Anne/Folk Victorian dwellings. The platting of the district into narrow lots clearly reflects its time and working class population. The neighborhood was built near the streetcar line and platted without alleys or accommodations for individually owned automobiles. Garages built in the district were constructed after the houses, almost as an afterthought.

The two-and-a-half-story American Foursquare/Kansas City Shirtwaist style is the most common style within the district. The style is present in 332 of the houses, most built between 1903 and 1912. The American Foursquare is a boxy rectangular or square dwelling with a low-pitched hipped roof and symmetrical façade. The dwelling typically has four rooms on the first story and four on the second story. Virginia and Lee McAlester define this house as the earliest form of the Prairie style that later developed into the most common vernacular variation.²³ The McAlesters go on to describe the type as having either a central or off-center entrance, full front porch and wide, overhanging eaves emphasizing the house's horizontal lines. The Prairie version of the American Foursquare was built primarily between 1900 and 1920, popularized by pattern books from about 1905 to 1915. The style of house was also offered as a kit in mail order catalogues. The Kansas City Shirtwaist is a variation of the versatile Foursquare that dominates early Kansas City suburbs. The style's name came from the women's dress styles from the time, the upper portion made of a different material than the lower portion. As demonstrated on dwellings, the first story of a Kansas City Shirtwaist is usually clad in stone or brick, the second story in clapboards and the third story in shingles, although there are many variations of wall coverings and details. Distinctive Colonial Revival details can include corner pilasters, a dentil frieze or a Palladian window in the eave.²⁴

Many variations of the American Foursquare/Kansas City Shirtwaist styles can be found in the district. Matt O'Connell designed and built two early identical Shirtwaists at 4100 and 4104 Harrison in 1904 with bell-cast front gables and stone porches. Napoleon Dible, the district's most prolific builder and developer, built only Shirtwaist houses during his 1908 development in the district. Large collections of his houses can be seen on the 4100 blocks of Harrison and Campbell and the 4200 blocks of Campbell and Charlotte. Many of Dible's Shirtwaists are identical in form, but feature individual details, such as second-story chamfered bay windows, third-story gable dormers projecting from hip roofs, bell-cast front gables or heavily ornamented third-story Palladian windows. Simple examples of the style were built and developed by the Wells Brothers in 1911 at 903, 905 and 907 East 42nd Street. Very late two-story examples of the style were designed and built by John M. Stansberry in 1913 at 3940 and 3944 Charlotte. The Shirtwaist style proved to be easily built and personalized for the numerous designers and builders that worked in the district during the peak building years. This cost-efficient adaptability made them an ideal form for the district's early development.

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The Bungalow/Craftsman style is the second most common style in the district, seen on approximately 224 buildings. The Bungalow, most often built between 1905 and 1930, was the favorite house style in this country from around 1905 until the early 1920s. The form usually has one- or one-and-a-half-stories, an asymmetrical façade, a low-pitched roof and a prominent front porch. The style has its roots in the California houses of Charles Sumner Green and Henry Mather Greene.²⁵ The Craftsman style was most popular from around 1900 to 1920. The style was heavily influenced by the English Arts and Crafts movement and was popularized by Gustav Stickley's magazine, *The Craftsman*. Craftsman houses have many of the characteristics found on the Bungalow form, such as asymmetry, a full front porch and low-pitched roofline. The Craftsman style includes shingle, stucco or clapboard wall cladding and abundant interior woodwork that may feature wainscoting, heavy framing around windows and doors and a prominent staircase.²⁶ The Bungalow and Craftsman styles were frequently combined, resulting in infinite varieties of small, well-built houses with crafted details. Bungalow and Craftsman houses usually have full front porches with massive supports, exposed rafter tails in the eaves and leaded or multi-paned windows. The styles were especially adaptable to narrow city lots and were relatively inexpensive to build. Both styles were attractive to developers because they could be built according to plans from pattern books or were available as kits as early as 1908 from mail order catalogues.

The district has many small Bungalow/Craftsman houses, but also dozens of dwellings that include Craftsman features applied to vernacular styles. Although houses as built as early as 1898 and 1899 are classified as Bungalows in the survey, the style did not take root in the district until around 1909. Charles T. Houlehan built and developed several houses in the 3900 block of Campbell in 1908-1909 that display a combination of these styles. The houses at 3907, 3923 and 3929 are traditional Bungalow/Craftsman houses, but the houses at 3914, 3916, 3917 and 3920 show variations, such as wall dormers, large front gables or shed dormers. Nevertheless, all fall into the Bungalow/Craftsman classification. Newly established architect Edgar P. Madorie designed 3909, 3911 and 3915 Campbell in the Bungalow/Craftsman styles, built by Houlehan in 1908-1909. In 1912, Wilford B. Stiers built and developed three bungalows at 4140, 4144 and 4146 Charlotte. The house at 4140 has an arched porch, stucco walls and dominant gabled dormer, presenting a Tudoresque appearance. The houses at 4144 and 4146 have more Craftsman details, but are executed in very different manners. Several bungalows were built on Holmes Street in the 1910s, likely to fill vacant lots. Albert G. Laitner built matching examples of the style in 1913 at 4137 and 4139 Holmes, while a diminutive version of the style was built at 4225 Holmes in 1916 by the firm of Huccke & Sexton. Timothy Kelly built the last versions of the Bungalow/Craftsman style in the district at 4135, 4137 and 4141 Kenwood in 1921.

A group of Colonial Revival/Neoclassical style buildings makes a substantial contribution to the district, with 49 houses. Most of these buildings were constructed during the district's building peak between 1908 and 1915. The Colonial Revival style was the most popular style for American homes during the first half of the 20th

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century. Colonial Revival houses are usually symmetrical and can be one or two stories tall. They are most often of frame construction, although masonry cladding may be present. Rooflines typically include side gables or gambrel gables. A fanlight, sidelights and/or a columned portico may emphasize a central entrance. Double-hung windows are usually multi-paned in the upper sashes. Colonial Revival houses within the district are usually larger than American Foursquare/Kansas City Shirtwaists, conveying the impression of a grander house. Wall cladding often fills the first two stories and several examples of the style have side entrances. One of the earliest examples of the style is located at 3918 Holmes, built in 1902. The lower two stories are clad in stone and stone piers support the front porch columns. Especially fine examples of the style are located at 3908 Charlotte, built by general contractor Fred Mans for his own family in 1910, 4327 Charlotte built in 1908 and 4422 Harrison, designed by the architectural firm of Owen & Payson and built by James F. Kelly in 1909. Included within the Colonial Revival classification is the Neoclassical style. An interesting example is located at 4022 Harrison, designed by Samuel Tarbet and built by Louis Hector in 1909. The house features a grand Neoclassical front entry attached to a Colonial Revival form, almost as if it was an afterthought. Nelle Peters designed a charming Neoclassical single-family dwelling built in 1912 at 1008 East 44th Street.

The fourth most common single-family housing type is classified as Queen Anne/Folk Victorian with 26 buildings. These styles represent the oldest houses in the district, most built between 1890 and 1900. Due to their age, most of the extant examples of these styles within the district have changed through the application of non-historic additions or siding. The Queen Anne style was the most popular style for nationwide domestic building from around 1880 to 1900, although later examples are common in the Midwest. A Queen Anne house features an irregular roofline, asymmetrical massing and devices used to avoid smooth walls, such as projecting bays and ornamental molding. Walls can be clad in shingles, clapboard or brick. The style typically has a front porch that often wraps around one side of the house. The Queen Anne interior floor plan usually includes several small rooms designed for specific purposes. Another trademark of the Queen Anne house is an abundance of woodwork in public rooms. Queen Anne houses within the district are between one-and-a-half and two-and-a-half stories tall. An excellent example of the Queen Anne style is a shingle-clad house at 4200 Charlotte, built in 1891. Albert Banfield, a bricklayer foreman, built his own house in 1899 at 3908 Holmes. Both dwellings are ornate one-and-a-half-story examples of the style. The Folk Victorian style, popular in this country between 1870 and 1910, is defined by the addition of Victorian ornament to a simple gabled or L-shaped form. Ornate trim can include porches with turned support posts and spindlework balustrades, brackets under the eaves or decorative shingles in the gables. Much of the original ornament on these houses within the district has been removed or covered, but a good example of the style can be seen at 4017 Holmes, a shingle-clad one-and-a-half-story residence built in 1890.

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Most of the single-family homes within the district are modest, but the neighborhood also includes a few grand dwellings. A 1904 classified advertisement in *The Kansas City Star* promoted a house at 4300 Troost, no longer extant, with five bedrooms, one bath, a billiard room and servants' quarters as "an elegant home in an exclusive neighborhood" for \$7500.²⁷ Most of the district's largest houses were built on Harrison, reflecting the early prosperity of Troost Avenue. One of the district's earliest houses was built in the Queen Anne style for developer W. Chaffe Whitehead in 1891 at 3930 Troost. Grand Foursquares were built in 1903 at 4008 Campbell for lawyer Richard B. Wilcox and in 1906 at 4246 Harrison for Richard McCartney, a stockyard hide broker. Clarence E. Ennis designed and built an impressive Shirtwaist for Ignacio B. Koch, a sales agent for the American Lumber Company at 4332 Harrison in 1907. One of the most impressive houses in the district is a brick Tudor residence designed by Albert Turney as his own home at 4346 Harrison in 1905.

Several of the district's builders and/or developers resided in the district in houses they were responsible for, including builders Jared Eggleston at 4016 Charlotte, Albert Laitner at 4036 Holmes, George Laitner at 4006 Holmes, Oscar Peterson at 4033 Holmes and developer Volney H. Primm at 4429 Campbell.

Like the single-family homes, apartment buildings within the district reflected the architectural styles of their day. Multiple family buildings in the district generally fall into three categories: small buildings that blend into the landscape of single-family housing, colonnaded apartments and walk-up apartment buildings constructed in the 1920s. Early small multi-family dwellings were built to hold two families. Like the surrounding houses, they were constructed in many styles. A 1907 Dutch Colonial duplex was built at 3924-26 Harrison for Charles Leeds, a salesman for the Soda Fountain Supply Company. Builder Harry Green constructed a Prairie style duplex with Mission detailing in 1908 at 4125 Campbell. Builder and developer Charles Luce is credited with a duplex that resembles a Kansas City Shirtwaist, built in 1911 at 900 East 41st Street. The trend continued in the 1920s, when construction in Kansas City began again after World War I. Builder Michael Lynch constructed a simple brick two-family building in 1922 at 4026-28 Campbell. The duplex has a two-story front porch that represents a colonnaded apartment but is clearly from a later era. Similar in design is 4020 Harrison, built by Charles Luce in 1921 for two families. Another example is a four-family building with Tudor styling built in 1925 at 3933 Charlotte by builder William Koch and developer Harry Fisher.

Most of the apartment buildings within the district were built to house four to six families. They are easily identified as multi-family housing. The colonnaded apartment building form first appeared in Kansas City in the early 1900s as the population boomed. Local housing shortages, a rapidly growing middle class and a growing group of property speculators ushered in a trend toward four- to twelve-unit apartment buildings.²⁸ The colonnaded apartment building, designed for the middle- and upper classes, became a Kansas City fixture to meet those needs. The building type is defined in the MPDF "Historic Colonnade Apartment Buildings of Kansas City, Missouri" as brick buildings at least two stories in height with at least two self-sufficient

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apartment dwelling units and prominent multi-story colonnaded porches. The buildings were built in a variety of styles. Nearly 40 of the apartment buildings are in the district, appearing around 1908 and remaining popular until the late 1920s. Many of the district's colonnades were professionally designed, representing the work of active architects of the day. Edgar Faris designed two early colonnaded duplexes built at 901-03 and 907-09 East 39th Street in 1909. The firm of Sanneman and Gould designed a fourplex with Classical Revival detailing built in 1912 at 4407 Harrison. Ernest Brostrom's sixplexes at 912-14 and 918-20 East 41st Street built in 1912 display Prairie style detailing within the tapestry brick. Architect Nelle Peters was the district's most prolific designer of multiple family buildings, contributing five colonnaded buildings built in 1912 and 1914 to the district. Her 1912 buildings are sixplexes with classical detailing, located at 4341-43 and 4345-47 Harrison. Charles E. Phillips, a very productive Kansas City builder, hired her to design the classical sixplex at 4141-43 Campbell and two sixplexes with Tudor detailing built in 1914 at 4120-22 and 4124-26 Troost. Colonnaded apartments built in the 1920s in the district are more subdued than earlier examples, presenting brick piers instead of Classical columns and restrained ornament. Examples include three four-family buildings constructed and developed in 1922 by H. Kelley at 4001, 4005 and 4007 Kenwood and two sixplexes built in 1924 by Harry Fisher at 4009-11 and 4013-15 Charlotte. Developer Frank E. Stiles resurrected the grand style with three six-family buildings constructed in 1923 at 4031-33, 4035-37 and 4039-41 Kenwood overlooking Gillham Park. The district's last colonnaded apartments are two tan brick duplexes built by developer Marion A. Crummett at 3911 and 3915 Holmes in 1927.

The early 1920s brought a new wave of building in Kansas City, following the economizing of World War I. Nearly all construction in the district during the 1920s was multi-family dwellings, likely reflecting the scarcity of vacant lots and the value of properties within the neighborhood. A new building type led all construction during this time, the walk-up apartment building. These boxy buildings were three or more stories tall, held six or more apartments and did not include individual front porches as seen on the colonnaded buildings. Entrances led to stairways located in the center of each building. Walk-ups within the district had prominent cornices and eaves, but other ornament varied with each building. Charles Phillips built and developed six brick walk-ups on the south side of East 42nd Street between Charlotte and Campbell in 1921. The rectangular buildings have bracketed eaves and tapestry brick ornamentation. Nelle Peters designed two walk-ups for builder and developer C.O. Jones in 1923 at 3940-42 and 4007-09 Holmes. These buildings display classical styling in the tapestry brick form, with arched windows, and pieced headers, but with very simple cornices placed below flat roofs. Another 1923 walk-up was built at 4039 for the Lee Smith Realty company. The very simple tan brick building has a one-story arched full front porch, bracketed cornice and a Spanish Revival appearance.

Most of the commercial buildings in the district were built on Troost in the early 1920s. Those that retain integrity are mostly one-part commercial blocks or tapestry brick apartment buildings, reflecting the commercial character of the street at the time. Ornament on the commercial buildings is overall very modest. Examples can be seen on the one-story storefronts, such as a grocery at 4248-54 Troost built in 1922, 3922 Troost built to house a grocery and restaurant or 3920 Troost, built in 1930 to house a baker and a cleaner. Several multi-family buildings on Troost also had businesses in the first story, such as the plainly adorned

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buildings at 3942-46 and 4200-04 Troost, built in 1912 and 1916, respectively. A few commercial buildings stand out along Troost, due to their creative ornamentation. These include a one-part commercial block ornamented with terra cotta at 4000 Troost built in 1927 to house Gus Brown's fruit stand and the two-story Baker Manufacturing warehouse at 4232 Troost, built in 1932. Handy Baker Motors Inc., built for auto sales and service in 1928 at 4538 Troost is an excellent example of a modern two-part commercial block. Also notable is Fire Station No. 31 built in 1931 at 4518 Troost, designed by Madorie and Bihr and built by J.E. Dunn Construction in the Beaux Arts style. The last commercial building constructed in the district is the 1939 St. James Recreation Center at 3936 Troost.

Two extant churches in the district that retain architectural integrity are the First Church of the United Brethren at 4000 Harrison and St. James Church at 3901 Harrison. Both churches are designed in the Gothic Revival style, a frequent style for churches of all sizes from the mid-1800s to the early 1900s. Gothic Revival churches usually have masonry walls that extend into the gables, a steeply pitched roof and doors or windows set within lancet arches. The Clark Williams Company built the First Church of the United Brethren in 1907. The congregation raised the \$30,000 in construction funds before building began. The church was remodeled and expanded in 1925. The church was expanded in 1925. Sanneman and Van Trump designed St. James Church. Construction began in 1911 by builder J. Donley and the building was dedicated in 1913. The St. James parish originally met in Walsman Hall at 40th and Tracy, where the congregation built a school in 1907. Madorie and Bihr designed the rectory south of the current church and Charles Houlehan built it in 1929. J.A. Edelman designed the recreation center at 3936 Troost and Edelman Construction Company built it in 1939.

Builders and developers within the district did not necessarily confine themselves to one building type or even one partnership. Charles H. Luce is an example of an enterprising businessman, working as the contractor/builder on 17 buildings in the district between 1911 and 1921, six of which were multi-family housing. He is also listed as the developer for one of his apartment buildings and four of his houses. Partnerships between architects, builders and developers frequently formed and quickly disbanded. Architect Edgar Madorie teamed with builder and developer Charles Houlehan for three bungalows in 1908 and 1909, but also built three of his own Shirtwaist designs in 1909. Builder Francis M. Jackson built two houses designed by Owen and Payson, plus one house designed by Sidney Frink and developed by Frank and Lucie Dayton. Architect Nelle Peters designed buildings for several builders in the district, including C.O. Jones, Charles Phillips and N.M. Cameron. No information can be found for many of the partnerships. This indicates that they were probably no more than two individuals that teamed up to develop a batch of properties and then disbanded. These include Morrow & Downs, Saunders & Robinson and Slusher & Smith. Due to the size of the district, the list of known architects, builder and developers is quite large. Contributors to the district include the well known and the obscure. Listed below is a summary of available information on the most active contributors to district.

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Architects

Andrew B. Anderson is listed in the 1910 and 1920 city directories as an architect with an office in the New York Life Building. He designed a house at 4139 Charlotte in 1908.

Ernest Brostrom (1888-1969) designed two three-story brick colonnaded apartment buildings at 912-914 and 918-920 East 40th Street in 1912. Born in Sweden, Brostrom came to the United States with his parents at the age of nine years. He moved to Kansas City in 1907 to manage a local office for the Sioux City firm of Eisentrout-Colby-Pottenger. He began promoting his own designs within five years. Brostrom specialized in church plans, designing dozens throughout the Midwest. His most prominent buildings in Kansas City are the Jensen-Salsbery Laboratories Building (1918) at 520 W. 21st Street, the Rushton Baking Company (1920) at 814 Southwest Boulevard, Kansas City, Kansas and the Newbern Apartment Building (1921, 1925) at 525 East Armour Boulevard.

Louis Curtiss (1865-1924) designed one bungalow at 4517 Gillham Road in 1909. Curtiss, born in Canada, studied architecture at the University of Toronto and the Ecole des Beaux-Arts in Paris before coming to Kansas City in 1887. He briefly worked as a draftsman for Adriance Van Brunt and then joined Frederick C. Gunn in a partnership in 1889. Ten years later, he established a solo practice. One of Kansas City's most creative architects, Curtiss' buildings include the 1900 Folly Theater at 1020 Central Street, the 1908-1909 Boley Building at 12th and Walnut and the 1903-1905 Mineral Hall at 4340 Oak Street.

William J. Dawson designed three houses—3916, 3918 and 3922 Harrison—built between 1904 and 1908. He is listed as the owner of each house in 1906, 1907 and 1908 City directories. Dawson is listed in the 1910 City directory as working in real estate at 3726 Troost and in the 1910 census as an architect.

Harry Alexander Drake designed a house at 815 E. 39th Street, built in 1910. He is listed in the 1910 and 1920 City directories as an architect working out of the Reliance Building.

John H. Edelman, Jr. designed the 1939 St. James recreation center at 3936 Troost. Edelman's father and grandfather were also builders in Kansas City and the **Edelman Company** built the Recreation Center.

Clarence E. Ennis designed two houses built at 4324 Harrison in 1907 and 4040 Harrison in 1908. The 1910 city directory lists Ennis as a builder residing at 4512 Forest. The 1920 city directory lists him as an architect living at 1216 East Gillham Road (later named Manheim.)

Edgar C. Faris (1882-1945) designed two two-story brick colonnaded apartment buildings at 901-903 and 907-919 East 39th Street in 1909. Faris, born in Wheeling, West Virginia, came to Kansas City as a child. He began work as a draftsman in 1902 and opened his own office by 1906. Faris' early work was usually in tapestry brick, but later work in the 1920s took a fanciful turn to Moorish and Spanish Revival styles. Faris's most recognized

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building in Kansas City is the 1925 Ponce de Leon Apartment Hotel at 4553-33 Main. He was also recognized as an accomplished artist and painted many fresco murals on the walls of Kansas City apartment buildings.

Sidney R. Frink is listed in the 1905 city directory as an architect working at 17 West 10th Street and living at 202 East 34th Street. The 1910 city directory lists him as having an office in the Reliance Building. Frink designed one house in the district built at 4343 Holmes in 1907 and seven buildings built in 1909. His 1909 designs included six bungalows in the 4300 block of Gillham Road for developers **Frank and Lucie Dayton**.

Harry I. Goddard designed one house built at 904 E. 43rd Street in 1912. In 1910, Goddard was a partner in the architectural firm of Kurfiss & Goddard, located in the Scarritt Building.

Frank Graves is listed as the architect for 4310 Harrison, a house he reportedly built for his mother. He is listed in the 1910 city directory as residing here. He is not listed in the 1920 city directory.

James Oliver Hogg designed the three-story colonnaded apartment building at 4012-4014 Troost Avenue in 1914. Hogg was born in Madison, Wisconsin, the son of a Scottish immigrant and builder. He arrived in Kansas City around 1886 after studying architecture at the University of Illinois. Hogg primarily designed commercial buildings. His work extended beyond Kansas City to include a building at Park College in Parkville, Missouri, a bank in Tulsa and a courthouse in Fort Smith, Arkansas. He teamed up with his father to design and build a police station and courthouse in Hannibal, Missouri.

William J. Koch designed a four-family building at 3933 Charlotte built in 1925. He is listed in the 1910 city directory as a draftsman for Phenix Stone & Lime Company. In 1920, he was a draftsman for the JC Nichols Building Department.

Horace LaPierre (1873-1945) designed four South Hyde Park Shirtwaists located at 810 East 41st Street and at 4040, 4042 and 4046 Charlotte Street. The houses were built in 1908 and 1909 by **Elmer and Myers**. LaPierre was born in Ottawa, Canada. He worked for architect George Mathew as chief designer and superintendent of construction from 1896 until he took over the firm after Mathew's death in 1903. LaPierre's buildings were typically massive and slowly constructed. Extant Kansas City designs include the Armour Memorial Home at 2119 Tracy and the U.S. Epperson House at 52nd and Cherry.

Edgar P. Madorie designed three Bungalows built in 1908 and 1909 at 3909, 3911 and 3915 Campbell and three Shirtwaist houses built in 1909 at 4132, 4136 and 4138 Charlotte. Madorie is first listed in Kansas City directories in 1897 as a carpenter. He began working as a contractor in 1899 and as an architect in 1907. The firm of **Madorie and Bihr** began in the mid-1920s, designing the 1929 St. James Rectory at 3909 Harrison and the 1931 fire station at 4518 Troost Avenue.

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John H. Martling designed a colonnaded apartment building built in 1910 at 4200-02 Harrison. Martling is listed in the 1910 city directory as an architect working at 15 West 9th Street. The 1920 directory lists the firm of Martling & Brandenburger in the Massachusetts Building.

John W. McKecknie (1862-1934) designed one two-story house at 3900 Holmes in 1912. The partnership of McKecknie and Frost is credited with a bungalow at 4227 Kenwood, built in 1914. (An Edward Frost is listed in the 1915 city directory as a carpenter living nearby at 3531 Wayne.) McKecknie was born in Clarksville, Ohio, graduated from Princeton University and studied architecture at Columbia University. After working in New York, he came to Kansas City in 1898 and opened his own office in 1900. McKecknie was responsible for 120 local buildings. His work was diverse, including single dwellings, newly designed colonnaded apartments and commercial structures. He designed Kansas City's first large building constructed of reinforced concrete, the 1903-04 Gumbel Building at 801 Walnut. Other early buildings include the 1910-11 Grand Avenue Temple and Office Building at 9th and Grand and the 1911-12 Siegrist Engraving Company at 924 Oak Street. In 1914, he formed a partnership with Frank Trask that lasted until McKecknie's death in 1934.

Matt O'Connell designed and built five houses in the district between 1904 and 1908 located at 4101, 4103 and 4105 Campbell, 4433 Campbell and 4100 Harrison. O'Connell is listed in the 1905 and 1910 city directories as an architect. The 1910 directory lists his residence nearby at 3611 Tracy.

Warfield D. Owen designed two Shirtwaists at 3936 and 3938 Harrison built in 1909. He is listed in the 1910 city directory as a draftsman for Edwards & Sunderland and living nearby at 3426 Tracy. The 1920 directory lists him as a draftsman for Shepard & Wisner.

Owen and Payson, an architectural firm, designed five South Hyde Park buildings—one house at 4422 Harrison built in 1909, two houses at 4301 and 4305 Campbell built in 1910 and two colonnaded apartments at 4009 and 4011 Kenwood built in 1912. Albert S. Owen also designed one house at 4438 Harrison in 1908. Albert Owen (1868-1934) was a native Missourian who practiced carpentry until he formed a partnership with Charles Payson in 1908. Payson had worked with Louis Curtiss, Frederick Hill and Root & Siemens. The firm of Owen and Payson operated from 1908 until 1919. It was reconfigured several times over the next decades under various names. Owen and Payson's designs included a variety of structures, such as residences, schools and commercial buildings. Some of the firm's most distinctive designs include the Hawthorne Apartments at 3507-14 Gillham Road, St. Regis Hotel at 1400 East Linwood, St. Mark's Lutheran Church at 3800 Troost and Visitation Church at 5137 Main.

Nelle Nichols Peters (1884-1974) designed 10 buildings in the district, all but one of them apartment buildings. In 1912, she designed a Neoclassical house built at 1008 E. 44th Street. She also designed apartment buildings at 4341-43 and 4345-47 Harrison built in 1912; 4112-14, 4120-22 and 4124-26 Troost built in 1914; 4141-43 Campbell built in 1914; 4007-09 Harrison built in 1915; and 3940-42 and 4007-09 Holmes built in 1923. Peters, credited with over 1000 Kansas City buildings, was born in North Dakota and graduated from Buena Vista

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College in Storm Lake, Iowa. She worked as a “draftslady” for the Sioux City, Iowa architectural firm of Eisentrout, Colby and Pottenger. The firm sent her to Kansas City in 1909 and she soon opened her own office. Peters began a close working relationship with builder/developer Charles Phillips in 1913. Phillips was responsible for more large apartment buildings than any other developer and Peters was his primary architect. This partnership led to Peters’ specialty in apartment building design, evident in the number of multi-family dwellings she designed in the district. By the mid-1920s, she worked for several developers, including C.O. Jones, for whom she designed apartment buildings in the 3900 and 4000 block of Holmes in 1923. Other Kansas City projects include the 1924 Ambassador Hotel at 3560 Broadway and the 1928 Luzier Building at 3216 Gillham Road.

The Great Depression took its toll on Kansas City architects and Peters was no exception. Available work in the early 1930s was not for apartment houses or hotels, Nichols’ specialties. She became seriously ill during the 1930s and was often confined to a wheelchair. As a solo female architect, she did not receive the government patronage that helped many architectural firms through the Depression. Her career all but ended at this time, although she continued to work until she retired in 1967. When she died in 1974, she was unrecognized for her work.

Sanneman & Van Trump designed St. James Church built at 3901 Harrison in 1911. Raymond H. Sanneman was a prolific Kansas City architect, designing the 1920 Monroe Hotel at 1904 Main Street. The firm was located in the Commerce Building. The firm of Sanneman & Gould is credited with an apartment building built at 4407 Harrison in 1912, but the firm does not appear in City Directories.

Clarence Shepard (1870-1949) designed and built eight single-family houses in the district between 1907 and 1910. He also designed an apartment building for builder **Charles Luce** built in 1912 at 3923 Holmes. Shepard studied architecture at the University of California and worked with Frank Lloyd Wright before coming to Kansas City in 1905, where he opened his own office. Shepard designed more than 600 homes in Kansas City, primarily in the Country Club and Mission Hills districts. He also designed the Second Presbyterian Church at 52nd and Oak Streets. The firm of Shepard and Wisner formed in 1911 and lasted until 1925. Shepard worked as the principal designer and Wisner marketed the firm. The firm was responsible for the 1917 Georgian Court Apartments at 400 East Armour, the 1925 President Hotel at 1327 Baltimore and the Central Presbyterian Church, built from 1921 to 1924 at 51st and Oak.

Arthur L. Sparks designed one apartment building at 3942-46 Troost in 1912. He is listed in the 1910 city directory as an architect.

John Stansberry designed and built four Shirtwaists in 1913 at 3938, 3940, 3944 Charlotte and 712 East 40th Street. He is listed in the 1910 city directory as working for Anchor Real Estate & Building Company.

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Frederick Sutter designed one walk-up apartment building constructed in 1913 at 4000-02 Troost. He is listed in the 1910 city directory as a draftsman for Henry R. Hoit.

Samuel B. Tarbet designed one Neoclassical house in 1909 at 4022 Harrison. Tarbet is listed in the 1910 city directory as an architect. By 1920, he collaborated with Robert Gornall to form the firm of Tarbet & Gornall.

Albert Turney was active architect in Kansas City from approximately 1895 until 1936. He designed two houses in the district—one built in 1908 at 4340 Harrison and his own home at 4346 Harrison built in 1905. He is listed in the 1905 and 1910 city directories as an architect. Turney was responsible for many fashionable residences and apartments in Kansas City. He designed three Kansas City fire stations in 1905, located at 3033 Holmes (Fire Station #17), 1504 E. 6th Street (Fire Station #14) and the Fire Headquarters at 1020 Central. Turney placed a classified advertisement in *The Kansas City Star* on June 16, 1907 that read, “ Art Homes for the busy man who can’t afford the expense, worry and time. Albert Turney Architect. Prices \$8,000 to \$30,000; they are right in every way; different from those you have seen...Office Dwight Bldg.”

Builder and Developers

Albert Black built five houses in 1911 and 1912 in the 4200 block of Kenwood and the 4100 block of Holmes. He is listed in the 1910 city directory as a contractor with an office in the Scarritt Building.

Butler-Hollister Realty, Butler-Weaver Realty and the **Butler Investment Company** were quite active in the district between 1905 and 1910, building and/or developing approximately 45 houses. The companies were all configurations of a common group of men. The Butler-Hollister Realty Company is listed in the 1905 city directory as located in the Gumbel Building downtown, with N.W. Butler as president, J.H. Hollister as vice president, J.A. Butler as secretary and W.B. Weaver as treasurer. The 1910 directory lists the Butler-Weaver Realty Company as located in the Commerce Building with Willard B. Weaver as president, N. Warren Butler as vice president, John A. Butler Secretary and Treasurer, Verna A. Weaver as Acting Treasurer and Charles F. How as Sales Manager. The Butler Investment Company, active only in 1905, was likely an outgrowth of these organizations.

Arthur C. Cowan developed four bungalows built in 1908 by **L.G. Cockin** at 801, 805, 807 and 811 East 39th Street. Cowan is listed in the 1910 city directory as the president of the Cowan Investment Company. (Cockin is not listed in the 1910 city directory.)

Fred Cox built three Shirtwaist houses in 1904 at 4333 and 4337 Charlotte and 4419 Campbell. He is listed in the 1905 city directory as a general contractor and in the 1910 directory at a civil engineer for the Kansas City Stock Yards.

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Edwin Ruthven Crutcher was the contractor for three houses built in 1909 and 1910 at 601, 603 and 605 East 39th Street. The firm of **L. Crutcher & Sons** was the developer for the houses. Edwin Crutcher lived on the southeast corner of 36th and Oak (later Gillham Road) in 1910.

Frank and Lucie E. Dayton developed five Bungalows in the 4300 block of Gillham Road, designed by architect **Sidney Frink** in 1909. The 1910 city directory lists Frank Dayton living at 3420 Harrison and working as a salesman for Waller & Holtz Realty Co.

Raymond J. DeLano built three and developed five apartment buildings in 1915 and 1921. DeLano is listed as a lawyer in the 1910 city directory. The 1920 directory lists him as the president of DeLano-Park Realty & Loan Co. He lived at 4437 Gillham.

Napoleon Dible (1871-1960) built and developed 35 Shirtwaist houses in the district in 1908, most grouped together. Dible grew up very poor and had a frugal lifestyle. He graduated from Kansas Wesleyan University and moved to Denver, where he worked in the advertising business. He moved to Kansas City in 1903 and quickly learned the trade of building and developing homes. By the time of his death in 1960, had designed and constructed more than 5000 houses, more than any Kansas City builder at the time. He specialized in constructing affordable houses with assembly-line construction techniques in a handful of floor plans. One of his most prolific projects was the post-World War II construction of 1000 homes in the Ward Park addition and 1500 homes in Rockhill Manor.

Jared Eggleston built four houses in the district—4012, 4016 and 4211 Charlotte and 4025 Holmes—from 1898 to 1900. He is listed in the 1899 City Directory as a carpenter living at 4016 Charlotte (one of the houses he built.)

Harry E. Fisher/ Fisher Building Co. built two houses in 1891 and 1910 and three apartment buildings in 1924 and 1925. He is listed in the 1910 and 1920 city directories as a carpenter.

Samuel Frazier built 12 Shirtwaist dwellings from 1905 until 1908 in the district. He is listed in the 1905 and 1910 city directories as a carpenter.

Benjamin F. Hart built five residences on the 4200 block of Holmes between 1912 and 1915, one of them his own house at 4214 Holmes. Hart is not listed in the 1910 city directory, but is listed in the 1920 directory as a teacher at Westport High School.

Henson & Russell built four bungalows developed by Butler Investment Company in 1905 at 4304, 4306, 4308 and 4310 Holmes. William M. Henson is listed in the 1905 city directory as working for Butte Investment Co. and working in real estate. Two men with the surname of Russell—Arthur E. and Orlando A.—are listed in the 1905 directory as working in real estate.

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George L. Hoffman developed four houses in the district in 1909. Hoffman is listed in the 1910 city directory with the George Hoffmann Real Estate Co. and living at 3401 Paseo.

Charles T. Houlehan is credited with building 29 single residences in the district and working as the developer for most of the houses. He also built St. James Church in 1911. He is listed in the 1905 and 1910 city directories as a contractor with his firm, C.T. Houlehan Contracting Company.

Charles Ogan Jones built two apartment buildings in 1923 at 3940-42 and 4007-09 Holmes. C.O. Jones, one of Kansas City's most prominent builders and developers, was born in LeRoy, Kansas and came to Kansas City around 1902 at the age of seventeen. He worked in the stockyards as an office employee until he was struck with rheumatism. He then conducted a diamond-trading business from his bed. He built a house for himself and his wife soon sold it and built another, beginning his real estate career. He went on to build 100 homes near 59th and Locust in 1912 and then concentrated on large buildings. When he completed the Aladdin Hotel in 1925, it was the tallest structure in Kansas City. He is credited with approximately 40 large apartment buildings in Kansas City, including the Bainbridge apartment hotel at 900-08 Armour and the Walnuts at 50th and Wornall Road.

Albert, Humphrey, George and Herbert Laitner formed the Laitner Brothers Plumbing Company, credited with building 11 bungalows in the district from 1909 to 1913. Laitner Brothers is listed as developing five of the houses. The Laitner Brothers business was located at 611 East 31st Street. Albert built his own home at 4036 Holmes in 1909 and built four additional houses in 1913 on the 4100 block of Holmes. George built 4006 (his own house) and 4008 Holmes in 1912. Humphrey Laitner built 4032 and 4034 Holmes in 1911.

Charles H. Luce built 17 multi- and single-family buildings and developed five between 1911 and 1921 in the district. Luce is credited with building at least 50 residential buildings in Kansas City, developing most of them. His Kansas City work spans 1909 to 1926. He is listed in the 1910 city directory as working in real estate at 3217 Park Avenue and in the 1920 directory as working in real estate downtown.

Charles MacKenzie and **R. Frazer** are credited with building a Shirtwaist at 4110 Charlotte in 1909. William Charles MacKenzie is listed in the 1905 and 1910 city directories with J. & W.C. MacKenzie Real Estate Loans, Financial & Land Agents. The firm and Charles MacKenzie are not listed in the 1920 city directory.

Gus H. McCanles began his career as a builder in 1907. In 1908, he built five bungalows in the district for developer **Slusher & Smith**. By the time he had built 200 houses in Kansas City, Roy Gregg persuaded him to build apartment buildings. The partnership was successful, with McCanles building some 300 flats and Gregg marketing and managing the buildings. **McCanles Realty**, operated by McCanles and Gregg, developed five apartment buildings in the district in 1915. When Gregg died of the 1920 influenza epidemic, McCanles formed

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a new company with his top earner, George W. Miller. **McCanles-Miller Realty** developed two apartment buildings in the district in 1921.

Morrow & Downs—developed four Shirtwaists in 1906 at 800, 804, 808 and 812 East 44th Street.; 1910 no listing; 1920 NL

Henry Ostrum, a carpenter, built three bungalows in 1911 for the Phillips Realty Company at 4231, 4233 and 4335 Holmes. He also built a multi-family building at 4117 Charlotte in 1926. He is not listed in the 1910 or the 1920 city directories.

Upton Perrine, a contractor, built four single-family dwellings from 1907 to 1909, located at 3926, 3928 and 3930 Holmes and 4513 Gillham. He is not listed in the 1910 city directory.

Charles E. Phillips (1883-1955) built one single family dwelling in the district in 1907. He teamed with architect **Nelle Peters** in 1914 to built three colonnaded apartments. He built and developed five walk-up apartment buildings on East 42nd Street in 1921 and one at 4042 Harrison in 1923. Phillips made a name for himself by building several large apartment buildings along Armour Boulevard and approximately 20 in the Country Club Plaza area. He built the Phillips House Hotel, completed in 1931 as Kansas City's tallest building at the time.

Volney H. and Julian B. Primm developed six Shirtwaists in 1909 in the 4400 block of Campbell. The brothers are listed in the 1910 city directory as working in real estate. The 1910 directory lists Volney as living at 4401 Campbell, but the 1910 census lists him at residing at 4429 Campbell.

James A. Robinson, a contractor, built three houses at 4411, 4415 and 4419 Harrison in 1907. The 1910 city directory lists him as residing at 4336 Charlotte, a house built in 1906 by the Butler-Weaver Realty Company.

James T. Robinson developed nine Shirtwaists on the 4300 block of Campbell built from 1905 through 1909. Robinson is listed in the 1910 city directory as working in real estate.

William C. Robinson, a contractor, built three Shirtwaists on the 4100 block of Campbell for developer **Elizabeth Howard** and one Shirtwaist at 4314 Harrison. The 1910 city directory lists him residing at 3519 Highland.

George E. Shelton built and developed four houses between 900 and 908 East 42nd Street in 1910. The 1910 city directory lists him as working in real estate in the Massachusetts Building downtown and living at 3708 Walnut.

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John A. Shilling built 17 Shirtwaists from 1908 to 1910. He is listed as developer for two of the houses. The 1910 city directory lists him as a contractor with an office in the New York Life Building and residing at 4230 Campbell, one of the houses he built.

Wilford B. Stiers built six houses and developed three of them from 1908 to 1912. The 1910 city directory lists him as a contractor living at 3833 Campbell.

William B. Wear built one house in the district in 1909 and two houses in 1912. The 1910 city directory lists him as a contractor living at 3708 E. 29th Street.

The Wells Brothers—Ralph, his twin Rollo and Harry—moved to Kansas City from Belleville, Kansas in 1903 and established the Wells Brothers Building company one year later. Two generations of the Wells family built more than 2000 homes in Kansas City, many of them in new areas developed by the company. The Wells Brothers built 16 houses in the district in 1912 and probably developed all of them. **Harry Wells** is individually credited with building six houses in 1912.

Truman Wheelock built and developed five houses in the district in 1909 and built and developed one more in 1913. His company, the **Wheelock-Stine Investment Company**, built and developed eight in 1908. Wheelock was born in 1872 in Douglas County, Illinois and moved to Kansas City, Kansas in 1896, where he worked as a contractor. He began speculative building and went into partnership with N.T. Stine in 1907. The Wheelock-Stine Investment Company specialized in offering easy payments on new homes.

W. Chaffe Whitehead developed seven houses around 40th and Harrison from 1905 to 1907. Whitehead lived at 3926 Troost in a circa 1891 Queen Anne house.

CONCLUSION

The South Hyde Park District retains a very high degree of integrity as one of Kansas City's early 20th century streetcar suburbs. The district was planned, designed and constructed for Kansas City's middle-class residents. It provided appealing and affordable housing near the recreational spaces of Gillham Park and Gillham Road, but also within blocks of the Troost Streetcar that could quickly transport residents to downtown Kansas City. The district retains much of its original appearance in form, materials and appearance. The housing stock is intact, providing a visual link to the architectural forms and styles popular in the early 1900s. Kansas City's turn-of-the-century real estate boom is represented by blocks of intact housing built quickly by speculators, developers and builders of all sizes. The period of peak development, 1900-1930, is visibly reflected in the styles of housing common during this period that begin with the Folk Victorian and Queen Anne styles, segue to American Foursquares and Kansas Shirtwaists and end with Bungalows and the Craftsman style. Interspersed throughout the neighborhood are multi-family housing represented by duplexes, colonnaded apartments and walk-up apartment buildings.

Verbal Boundary Description

The South Hyde Park Historic District is bounded roughly on the north by East 39th Street, on the west by Gillham Road and the adjacent Parkway, on the south by Brush Creek Boulevard and on the east by Troost Avenue in the city of Kansas City, Missouri. The boundaries are shown on the attached scale map of the district.

Boundary Justification

The description encompasses all properties historically associated with the many subdivisions that developed as a cohesive neighborhood in the early 1900s. The district's buildings, deliberately constructed as part of the district's neighborhood, were all included in a survey of the area by the Kansas City Landmarks Commission, completed in spring 2007. The streets that bound the district are busier thoroughfares than those that run within the neighborhood, providing clear borders. The east boundary, Troost Avenue, is a major commercial street that delineates the district from areas to the east. East 39th Street and Brush Creek Boulevard are major east-west roads that bisect midtown Kansas City, effectively serving as the district's north and south borders. Gillham Parkway was constructed as green space for the area's residents. It is bordered on both sides by landscaped tracts and includes Gillham Park between 39th and 43rd Streets. This expansive landmark serves as a visual boundary for the district's western edge.




