DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The William B. Sappington House is a Greek Revival style Central Missouri mansion approximately 60 feet wide across the facade, two and one half stories high.

The house was extensively restored from 1948 to 1955 by the present owners. By 1948, the house was in a state of deterioration brought on primarily by approximately 50 years of neglect and damage inflicted by tornados in the early 1940's. The house is presently in excellent condition.

The house has a main block that is square in plan. A "T" is joined to the rear (south) wall of the main block and an ell meets the south wall of the "T."

The extensions of the fabric of the house include: 1) a two story front (north) portico centered on the facade; 2) two brick patios constructed by the present owners at the southeast and southwest corners where the "T" joins the main block; 3) a look-out area and central, glassed-in cupola on the deck at the highest level of the roof of the main block.

EXTERIOR

The limestone foundation was laid in ashlar masonry with three courses exposed above the ground level. The rectangular blocks have a pecked finish bordered by parallel grooving. Limestone lintels of the basement windows extend into the first four courses of the brick wall and have arched soffits and recessed central panels. The basement windows are barred.

The red brick walls above the foundation are inset 1". The high fire bricks were made by slave-labor on the property with the clay excavated from the basement. Brick walls have been painted with red "Bond-ex" to prevent deterioration. These walls are laid in Flemish bond on the north and east walls and Common bond on the west and south walls of the main block and on all exposed walls of the "T" and its ell addition.

The Facade

The north wall facade is symmetrical and a well proportioned example of Greek revival architecture. The focal point of this wall is the central two story portico, surmounted by the pediment. The classic formula was closely followed with the Doric order on the first floor and the Ionic order on the second. The pediment is outlined by a dentil course.

Four stone steps surround the base of the portico. Considering the location and period of the house, the steps were carved with a notable degree of refinement. Thin, vertical grooves articulate the surface of the risers. The treads have rolled edges with a thin necking.

An outstanding feature of the facade is the central entrance doorway on the first floor which is framed by a deep reveal paneled in wood. The door itself is surrounded by lights set in ornamental geometric patterns. The second floor door is also surrounded by lights, but they are simple rectangular panes of uniform size, conforming more typically to central Missouri examples of the preceding "Federal" style.

The facade windows are well proportioned in relation to total wall surface. As on all walls of the house, these windows have shutters which replace those originally on the building. These windows have exposed stone sills and lintels with the exception of the second story window caps which are masked by the entablature. Exposed lintels on all sides of the house have recessed central panel and "ears."

The windows throughout the main block of the house are double-hung, 6 over 6 light sash.

Gable End Walls

Both east and west gable end walls of the main block are cut off by parapet walls between the double end chimneys rather than exhibiting triangular apexes. The windows on the gable end walls are symmetrically arranged with respect to the vertical midline of the wall surface, but are widely spaced to avoid the chimney flues and fireplaces. At attic level, a three-pane fan window is centered on the gable of both walls.

Limestone cornice stones give a partial return of the entablature on the gable walls. The gables have limestone coping.

The chimneys of the main block are flush with the exterior wall surface and are topped with limestone mouldings.

Roof

A flat roof deck between the chimneys provides a look-out over the surrounding land. A glassed-in cupola occupies the center of the deck. The original roof deck and surrounding wooden railing and cupola were destroyed during a tornado in the 1940's. The cupola is an accurate replacement of the original. The railing was modified from a row of vertical balusters, as seen in the view published in 1876, to "X" braces.

All sloping surfaces of the roofs of the main block and southern extensions of the house are covered with slate shingles.

South (rear) Wall

A large portion of this wall is obscured by the "T" adjoining the main block. Fenestration conforms to pattern and form established on the facade with the exception of one window position which was originally a doorway giving access to the second floor level of a two story porch. This porch was attached to the east wall of the "T" extension. The doorway has been closed with brick but its lintel remains in place.

The rear wall entablature is narrower than on the facade and exposes the second floor window lintels which conform to those over the first floor windows on this wall and on the facade.

"T" Extension

This portion of the house projecting to the rear (south) is two stories high with a ridge roof oriented north and south. The windows on this section also conform to those previously described. The 1876 view of the property shows a two story porch attached to the east side of the "T". This porch was removed and was reportedly replaced by an early twentieth century porch. (Mrs. John R. Lawrence, May 14, 1969.) The later porch was removed by the present owners who constructed a one-story brick kitchen addition on the same location in the 1950's.

The windows in the kitchen addition have double-hung, 8 over 8 light sash.

Ell Extension

South of the "T" extension of the main block, is a one story brick ell also under a ridge roof oriented north and south. The ell is the former summer kitchen that was set apart from the house, connected only by a roofed passageway visible in the 1876 view. The present owner enclosed this passageway to form a room. The ell and "T" both have chimneys at the center of their south gable walls. These are flush with the outer surfaces of the walls, and are less ornamental at their tops than the main block chimneys.

The windows are 8 over 8 light sash, double-hung.

INTERIOR

The symmetry of the facade is reflected on the interior in the floor plan of the main block. The front door opens into a central hallway flanked by four parlors, one front and one rear on each side of the hallway on the first floor. Bedrooms are arranged in the same manner on the second floor. Each of these rooms is 20 x 20 feet.

The Hallway

Focal point of the central hallway is the "S" stairway suspended in its entirety from the wall side only and having no landings. The cornice includes a dentil moulding. Large black and white tiles laid diagonally cover the original wood flooring. Ionic columns are set out near the side walls at the midpoint of the length of the central hall.

West Parlors

The two rooms at the west side of this central hallway are connected by a large sliding door to form a formal double parlor. The pair of rooms is elegantly finished with original matching Florentine marble fireplace mantles, and paired Ionic columns.

East Rooms

On the east side, a library and dining room are arranged similarly to the parlors, on the west. These rooms are more simply finished. They do not have a plaster cornice, or columns. The northeast room is a library, and the southeast room is the dining room. One of the original chandeliers, formerly located in the northwest parlor, hangs over the dining table. The interior aspect of main block windows has a deep reveal carried below the sill to the floor and paneled at an angle of approximately 45 degrees, rather than square.

The "T" houses an informal sitting room with a large fireplace. Original pecan flooring, in place in this room, was inverted by the present owners during their restoration in the early 1950's. This room has a stairway along the west wall giving access to a second floor bedroom above.

The sitting room opens into the kitchen addition, a long, narrow chamber toward the east wall of the "T." From the kitchen extends an entry hall to the original summer kitchen. The hall and a bathroom also date from the project in the 1950's. The new kitchen is finished with materials removed from a razed house of about the same period, located in Arrow Rock, Missouri. These materials include hewn ceiling beams, bricks, and

walnut paneling used in the kitchen cabinets.

GROUNDS AND LANDSCAPE FEATURES

The house and yard are located on a high swell of land with an overview of a large surrounding area. The view extends far beyond the original Sappington property and is especially notable from the roof observation deck. A straight brick walk connects the front(north)portico with a gateway opening onto the access road.(Route TT). The brick walk had been covered with cement and grassed over when the present owner purchased the property, but it is now uncovered and in use. The walk is bordered with thin slabs of limestone set on edge.

The gateway is framed by two substantial stone posts in the form of obelisks, finished in the same manner as the house foundation stones. Similar, but taller, obelisks flank the driveway entrance to the east.

A wrought iron gate swings between the gate posts and a wooden picket fence extends more than 100' to either side. Some pickets are replacements of original; all are of the early type with an acorn shaped finial on a narrower neck at the top of each wooden picket. Present support posts for the pickets are concrete.

Some knowledge of the original landscape plantings can be gained by comparing a view of the house and grounds published in 1876 (Illustrated Atlas Map of Saline County Missouri, p. 60.) with the present arrangement of trees in the yard. Large old cedar trees predominate in the front (north) yard. They are arranged symmetrically with respect to the line formed by the brick walk between the front portico and the gateway. Two of the cedar trees are on top of low mounds. The 1876 view shows the mounds as terraced plantings in concentric circles surrounding the bases of the trees.

The 1876 view of the house and grounds also includes 12 outbuildings in the vicinity of the main house. These buildings included slave houses, sheds of various sizes, barns, and a smokehouse. A former slave cabin southwest of the main house is the only remaining original outbuilding. This structure was built for double occupancy. It has a single chimney at the center of the ridge roof and two entry doors on the east wall. The foundation is rubble masonry. The brick walls are common bond with four courses corbeled at the eave line to form a cornice. Large limestone blocks form two steps up to each entrance. The cabin has been renovated and enlarged with wings to the west (rear) and is in use as a caretaker's residence. Sheds and barns presently on the property are twentieth century replacements of original structures.

<p>STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE</p> <p>The William B. Sappington House is of primary significance because of the excellence and refinement of its architectural design. The house is an outstanding example of the mid-nineteenth century Classic Revival style in rural Central Missouri. The significance of the history of early planning and construction of the house is enormously enhanced by the survival of the original owner-builder's account book kept during the building of the house. (William B. Sappington, "Expense Account in Building House," 1845 ff., in the possession of a descendant, Mrs. C. Wayne Elsea, Marshall, Missouri.) Such early record books are exceedingly rare in central Missouri. The house has further significance in the history of Missouri for its association with Dr. John S. Sappington who discovered quinine as a cure for malarial fever. The Sappington family, through marriage, was also prominent in the early development of Missouri's political history.</p> <p>This house is set apart from other contemporary examples in central Missouri because the design idea is given full expression. The result is a handsome country mansion of generous size. In the neighboring locale many examples of the period were intended to appear large but were actually scaled down editions of the design idea. This house is truly a large scale structure, 60 feet wide on the main facade, enclosing large interior spaces with 14 foot high ceilings.</p> <p>The unstinting application of architectural refinement to the house affirms the desire on the part of the original owner-builder for resolution of form in his residence. Notable details include the pecked and grooved finish on the stones framing the cellar windows, not only on the primary facade of the house, but on the sidewalls as well; the wide entablature that includes a dentil course and a series of moldings, and the exacting adherence to the classic Greek tenets of the organization of architectural elements in the portico.</p> <p>John S. Sappington, father of William B. Sappington, was a frontier physician who practiced along the Missouri River from Jefferson City to Lexington, Missouri. (Duane Meyer, <u>The Heritage of Missouri-A History</u>, 1965, p. 294.) In 1832, John Sappington began manufacturing quinine pills as a cure for typhoid, typhus and malarial fevers.</p>

All of these diseases were common to the people living near the Missouri River during the early settlement period. John Sappington's book The Theory and Treatment of Fevers Revised and Corrected by Fernando Smith, M.D., was published in 1844.

William B. Sappington helped sell his father's "Anti-Fever Pills" and built the presently standing house in 1843-45. 1844 was the year of William's marriage to Mary Mildred Breathitt, his first cousin and the daughter of John Breathitt, Governor of Kentucky (1832-34).

John Sappington never lived at "Prairie Park" but maintained his own large log and wood frame residence on adjacent property where he died in 1856. After the death of John Sappington his property passed to his son-in-law Claiborne Fox Jackson during whose residency there it was known as "Fox Castle". This house burned in 1874. (Mrs. C. Wayne Elsea, descendant, interviewed by M. Patricia Holmes on October 25, 1969.)

The local prominence attained by the Sappington family in the central Missouri area is attested to by the record of their political associations. In 1844, William was sent as a delegate to the Democratic National Convention which nominated James K. Polk for the presidency. Although William refused to run for political office, his brothers-in-law became prominent office holders. A brother-in-law, Meredith Miles Marmaduke, was Governor of Missouri during the 1840's; Governor Claiborne Fox Jackson, who successively married three daughters of John S. Sappington, was Missouri's Governor from 1860-61. John S. Marmaduke was the grandson of John S. Sappington and was Governor of Missouri from 1884-87.

The Sappington House was the focal point of a 600-acre plantation, three miles southwest of the town of Arrow Rock. In addition to managing the farm, William Sappington served as president of the Bank of Missouri at Arrow Rock from 1866 to 1881. (History of Saline County, 1881, p. 571-2.) The plantation, called "Prairie Park", was slave-operated and supported thirty-two slaves at one time.

The house was occupied continuously by the William B. Sappington family until 1910. However, the maintenance of the building began to decline after the death of William B. Sappington in 1888.

After 1910, the property was sold several times. The Sappington family furniture, which was stored in the attic, was gradually dispersed by subsequent owners. In 1948 Dr. John R. Lawrence, a physician in Marshall, Missouri, and his wife purchased and extensively restored the house.

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

Sketch Plan




