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St. John's Episcopal Church, near Prairieville and Eolia, Missouri, is a brick rectangular structure in the style of a small Greek Revival temple, with Gothic Revival detailing, a form related to contemporary churches of "Tidewater Virginia." Built in 1856, it has a one story, one room plan and is an excellent example of the transition between the Greek and Gothic Revival styles in rural church architecture.

EXTERIOR

The exterior brick walls, laid in running bond with infrequent header courses, rest on a foundation of limestone blocks set in lime mortar. The bricks were hand-made.

The openings consist of, on the south (front) elevation, a large central doorway flanked by two windows on either side, three windows each on the east and west sidewalls, and a central window and small entrance door to the east on the north (rear) facade. The south central doorway is double leafed, each leaf measuring 2' x 11'6". The head of the doorway consists of a pointed arch light with the mullions gently arching left and right. A brick soldier course outlines this arch. All windows are identical. They contain 12 over 12 light double-hung sash, topped by a pointed arch light area which is divided by the gentle arcs of the continued vertical muntins. The lower sash lights are glazed clear while the upper sash and the pointed arch areas have frosted. untinted glazing. The windows have cut limestone sills and brick soldier courses around the pointed arches. The window on the north (rear) facade is boarded over and the door to the east is singleleafed, paneled and topped by a three light transom. The doorway is outlined by a single soldier course jack arch.

The church building has a simple wooden entablature. There is a full return on the south (front) gable end and a partial return on the north (rear) gable wall. The cornice is made up entirely of flat members joined in such a way as to give the effect of a more complex molding. The south (front) gable end has moldings similar to those of the cornice, following the pitched edge of the roof, forming a heavily delineated pediment. The lack of total resolution of the design may be noted in the detailing of this entablature which passes over the upper apexes of the brick soldier courses outlining the pointed arch window and door heads.

The simple ridge roof has a painted sheet iron covering with standing seams. Two brick chimney stacks protrude from the roof on the southern third of the east and west (side) elevations. These stacks are contained within the thickness of the brick walls.

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St. John's Episcopal Church building has primary significance as a pristine example of the transitional design in architecture which combines elements of both the Greek and Gothic revivals in a building that closely follows the form of contemporary churches in the Tidewater area of Virginia. Several of the original communicants including the main contributor to the construction of the building, John W. Davis, were from Virginia. This building therefore demonstrates a way in which design ideas were carried westward with the settlers.

The basic mass of the church building established its relatedness to the Greek temple form. The building is composed of a rectangular block under a ridge roof with the ridge oriented along the long axis of the block, and with utilitarian and ornamental elements arranged symmetrically on each facade. The primary facade is at one of the gable ends, and if it were to follow the classic vocabulary more fully, it should also have a pedimented portico. This building lacks the portico, but has the gable of the primary (south) facade accentuated by being bordered with an entablature and moldings along the eave lines.

The elements of its design borrowed from the Gothic vocabulary are evident primarily in the height and width of the windows and main front door in relation to the width of the intervening sections of wall. The pointed arch heads on all but one opening and the intersecting arc muntins of the pointed arch lights further relate the design to Gothic predecessors.

That the coming together of these two design sources is not totally resolved in this building is evidenced in the detailing of the entablature which passes over the upper apexes of the brick soldier courses outlining the pointed arch window and door heads.

The St. John's Episcopal Church was erected ca. 1856. On July 12, 1857, Bishop Hawks dedicated the church. (Lottie Wright Davis, History of St. John's Episcopal Church, 1966, p. 22.)

INTERIOR

The interior of the church consists of one large room oriented north and south, with two small vestry rooms at the north end, flanking the altar east and west. All of the doors and windows have simple raised moldings. The flooring is of natural finished pine boards and the walls and ceilings are plastered and painted. The flat ceiling is 18 feet high.

There are one central row of double pews, and two single rows of pews against the east and west sidewalls, respectively. The pews are painted white and trimmed with natural finished walnut. They appear to be original. The rows of side pews are discontinuous near the southern third of the room to provide space for the original cast iron stoves, which are identified in the casting as "Minnesota No. 6 Pat. 1855, C. F. Filley, St. Louis."

Arrangement and furnishings of the altar area also appear to be original. The altar on the north wall is approached by two wooden steps that extend the width of the room, east and west between the vestries. Two lecturns stand in front (just to the south) of the altar rail, one to either side of the altar area. The communion table is ornamented by a continuous pointed arch motif, which is consistent with the design of the pointed arch windows and door of the building. The baptismal fount is directly in front of the south wall of the west vestry.

Both east and west vestries have doorways opening onto the altar area.

The original hardware is still in place. The building has no wiring or electricity.

Structural condition and general maintenance are excellent.

This surmary description of the physical appearance of the building is based, in part, on data included in the field report by architectural consultant, William B. Lane. A.I.A., received June 1969. The report was contracted by the Missouri State Park Board and is filed at its central office, P.O. Box 176, 1204 Jefferson Building, Jefferson City, Missouri 65101.

The land for the church site was bought from Daniel w. Allen for \$150.50 and paid for by John w. Davis, who was originally from Hanover County, Virginia. When Davis burned the brick to build his house, he also burned 500,000 bricks for the church and reputedly donated an additional \$1,000 toward the cost of construction. (Lottie Wright Davis, History of St. John's Episcopal Church, 1900, p. 19; and Lottie Wright Davis, hecords of Dawis, Meriwether and Kindred Families, 1951, pp. 99-100.)

The contract was let to Levi Ruggles of Louisiana, Missouri, August 1, 1055. This occument included full specifications for the church building, and gave instructions that the seats, windows, doors and base should be finished in the same manner as those of the "Old School" Presbyterian Church in Louisiana, Missouri. The cotal cost of the building was \$2,000, payable in three installments. (Davis, 1966, pp. 20-22.)

The original members first worshiped outside around a large wooden cross, now preserved inside the present building. A smaller cross was used when services were later held in a log school house, the homes of the members and the local Methodist Church. (State Historical Society of historic Sites File: Pike County.)

The church was closed during the Civil War but was respended in 1866. (State Historical Society of Missouri, Historic Sites File: Pike County.) The building was restored in 1940 and remains in occasional use. (Louisiana Press-Journal, October 17, 1941, p. 1, col. 2.)

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


