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The Walnut Street Historic District is located at the northern end of Augusta, Missouri (population 275), a town situated on bluffs once overlooking the Missouri River before it changed channels (Photo #1). The District comprises a mix of residential, commercial and institutional buildings constructed from the mid-19th to mid-20th centuries, which represent all of the Property Types defined in Section F: Vernacular Residence and Subtypes: House-store and Outbuildings (20); Styled Residences (7); Commercial/Industrial Buildings (4); and Institutional Buildings (3). Included in the district are a total of thirty-four contributing buildings, six noncontributing buildings, and one building District buildings are previously listed in the National Register. predominately modest vernacular designs in either wood or brick and are sited on generous lots often with one or two small outbuildings. Overall, district buildings have been well-maintained and preserved with few nonhistoric alterations. In limited instances there has been removal or replacement of deteriorated wood porch elements, and weatherboarding sheathed with nonhistoric siding, neither of which alterations substantially detracts from the integrity of design.

The District appears today much as it did fifty or more years ago, with sidewalks installed only on some streets, and town blocks with low building density which never were fully improved. Many of the buildings are still owned by descendents of German settlers. The commercial buildings are in use although most have changed use from general stores to antique or craft shops, and a couple of residences have opened as Bed and Breakfasts or craft shops. Ebenezer U.C.C. Church is still active.

The District includes good examples of all of the Associated Property Types defined in Section F of the Multiple Property document. On the map entitled, "Architectural Survey of Augusta, Missouri," non-contributing buildings are coded with an asterisk; they include buildings which are less than fifty years old; two small historic log houses which have been moved to a District lot; and one building which has received radical alterations.

228 Jackson/5596 Walnut (2 attached houses counted as 1 building): Property Type: Vernacular Residence; 228 Jackson is a ca.1855 1 story, 4-bay log house with paired center doors; side-gabled metal roof; center chimney; stone foundation; weatherboarding covered with metal siding; 5596 Walnut is a ca. 1910 2-story, 6-bay frame house with hipped metal roof. Present use: Lindenhof Bed & Breakfast.

5595 Walnut: Property Types: Vernacular Residence, Subtype: Housestore; Commercial/Industrial Building; Tiemann General Store constructed in 3 stages ca.1860-1880-1910; shed roof, 1-story brick with stone basement (west section) on the corner of Jackson was built ca.1860 as a house-store by Carl Tiemann, a merchant born in Hannover, Germany; the 5-bay west elevation features a transomed double door sheltered by a small frame porch; brick dentils trim the cornice; the ca.1880 east section with front gable and glazed storefront was built by Fritz Tiemann, Carl's son; the middle section features a glazed storefront with a pressed metal parapet. Present use: antique shop.

5585 Walnut: Property Type: Vernacular Residence; ca.1880-85 red brick, 2-story, 5-bay, central passage house built by Fritz Tiemann; hipped, metal roof; segmentally arched windows; bracketed wood cornice.

5573 Walnut: Property Type: Commercial/Industrial Building; ca. 1867 brick winery with stone-walled wine cellar built by the Augusta Wine Co.; front gable features a brick parapet; segmentally arched openings. Present use: vacant.

5569-67 Walnut: Property Type: Vernacular Residence, Subtype: House-store; built ca.1893 as a first- story saloon and second story residence of William Hammerle; in the late 1890's it was owned by J.Wm Koch & Co.Furniture, Lumber & Undertaker; front-gabled, 2-story, frame building with small, 1-story frame addition on the east side. Some windows have been altered on the primary facade. Present use: tavern and restaurant.

5576 Walnut: Property Type: Institutional Building; red brick, gabled-roof fire house with 2 garage bays, built in 1943 by the Town of Augusta.

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Block 30

5558 Walnut: Property Type: Commercial/Industrial Building; ca.1900 ell-shaped, gable-roof, frame butcher shop with ca.1920 concrete block addition. Present use: wood craft shop.

236 Ferry: Property Type: Vernacular Residence (1) and subtype: Outbuilding (1); Gabled-ell, weatherboarded 1 1/2 story house built ca. 1900 with stone foundation and metal roof; shed roof, frame privy stands on the south side of the house.

237 Public: Property Type: Styled Residence; ca. 1920 frame weatherboarded Bungalow with side-gabled asphalt roof; shed-roof, full facade porch supported by large, tapered wood piers.

5548 Walnut: Property Type: Vernacular Residence; ca. 1865, 1 story, 3-bay frame house with side-gabled metal roof; center chimney.

Block 37

5559-57 Walnut: Property Type: Vernacular Residence; ca.1855-60 brick, 1 1/2 story house with side-gabled, metal roof; stone foundation; 6-bay primary facade features paired, center-bay front doors; segmentally arched windows; brick denticulation. Built by Charles Lowenhaupt, a brick and stone mason born in Chur-Hessen. Present use: art gallery.

5549 Walnut: Property Type: Styled Residence; ca. 1895 Queen Anne style, 2 1/2 story, frame house with weatherboarding covered with metal siding; wrap-around porch; compound, dormered roof covered with asphalt; built by H.S.Clay, a physician. 1990 addition on the west features a turret.

5543 Walnut: Property Type: Institutional Building; brick church erected by Ebenezer Evangelical Church (now Ebenezer U.C.C.); 1861 4-bay nave with round-arched windows and wood, barrel-vaulted ceiling; gabled asphalt roof; entrance tower built in 1901 features a polygonal slate roof, clock, and corbeled brick trim.

5538-36 Walnut: Property Type: Styled Residence; built in 1925 as a parsonage by Ebenezer Church; 1 1/2 story, 5-bay Bungalow of frame construction covered with stucco; side-gabled, asphalt roof features a shed-roof dormer; concrete foundation.

Built by the Ostoff/Lowenhaupt family. Three frame outbuildings: side-gabled two-door building (possibly a privy) stands east of the house; irregular-shaped storage shed is adjacent to the north; fronting on Locust Street is a roughly 25'X30' gabled, metal roof storage building on concrete foundation.

5517 Walnut: Property Type: Vernacular Residence; ca.1855, 1 1/2 story, 5-bay, weatherboarded house built by Berthold E.Hoffmann, a school teacher/attorney born in Hessia; side-gabled, dormered, metal roof; stone foundation; center-bay front door features sidelights; small gabled-roof porch with ornamental wood railing and porch posts; stone retaining wall in front.

5516 Locust: Property Type: Commercial/Industrial Building; ca.1938 1-story, frame commercial garage sheathed with brick patterned asphalt; concrete foundation; front-gabled, metal roof; large center garage-bay opening. Present use: storage.

5509 Locust: Property Type: Styled Residence; ca.1920 weatherboarded Bungalow with side-gabled, dormered, asphalt roof; full-facade porch with shed roof supported by large, tapered wood piers.

221 Lower: Property Type: Vernacular Residence; ca.1855, 1-story, 3-bay brick house with historic frame rear addition; side-gabled, metal roof; stone foundation; flat arched openings; brick denticulation. Built by Prussian-born Robert Ewig, a tanner.

5500-04 Locust Street: Property Type: Vernacular Residence, (subtype: house-store); multi-part, 2-story brick and 2-story frame building: ca.1870s west section is vertical board on a stone foundation with vertical board irregular doors on both stories; ca.1900 2-bay frame middle section is covered with metal sheathing in a rusticated brick pattern; ca.1880 2-story brick east section features a glazed storefront with cast iron columns and a cast iron balcony on the east elevation; trimmed with vergeboard on primary (north) facade and brick denticulation on east side; segmentally arched windows. Brick east section and middle section were built as the Carl Wencker General Store. Present use: antique and book store.

5508 Locust: Property Type: Commercial/Industrial Building; late 19th century 1-story frame blacksmith shop adapted to commercial garage/gas station with ca.1930 1-story brick addition on the west side; high frame parapet with decorative asphalt shingles and "Goodyear Augusta Garage" lettering unifies the facade'; garage-bay openings in east section. Present use: glass blowing shop.

Block 48 5503-05 Locust (Staudinger-Grumke House-Store, NRHP 1992) Property Type: Vernacular Residence, subtype: house-store (previously listed) and subtype: Outbuilding (5); ca. 1859 2 1/2 story brick building with ca. 1880 frame addition used as a saloon and store; 5-bay primary facade with brick dentiled cornice, flat arch and wood lintel openings; side-gabled, metal roof. The building count has been amended to include five contributing outbuildings associated with the property which were excluded in the original count. These outbuildings consist of a ca. 1900 board and batten multi-purpose building (5505 Locust); a ca. 1920 frame ice house adjacent west; a ca. 1890 frame double privy; a ca. 1910 board and batten chicken house; and a ca. 1920 frame duck house, all located north of the ca. 1859 house-store.

The Walnut Street Historic District is eligible for listing in the National Register under Criteria A and C and is significant in the following areas: ETHNIC HERITAGE: EUROPEAN: Located strongest area of German settlement in Missouri, Augusta, by the 1850s, was a predominantly German town and remained so in custom and language until the World War II era. The District encompasses the heart of the town's historic residential, institutional and commercial sector, and District buildings and occupants reflect multiple aspects of Augusta's German heritage in characteristic cultural/social activities such as music societies, wine industry, churches, and building design. ARCHITECTURE: District buildings form the largest concentration of architecturally significant properties in Augusta, and are good representative examples of all of the Property Types defined in Section F of the Multiple Property document: Vernacular Residence and Subtypes: House-store, and Outbuildings; Styled Residence; Commercial/Industrial Building; and Institutional Building. The buildings are distinguished by the quality of their materials, workmanship and vernacular design and are unified by similar size and scale. See Statement of Historic Context, " German American Culture in Augusta, 1833-1943", and The period of significance was terminated in 1944 subthemes. following the abitrary fifty year limit.

The District lies within the boundaries of subdivisions opened by Christian Knoernschild in the mid-1850s when German immigration was at its peak in St. Charles county. The oldest District buildings are associated with first generation (1850s-1860s) settlement, individuals and institutions which formed the cultural nucleus of the community. All of the early owners of the houses were natives of northwest Germany (Hesse, Hanover, Prussia) and were engaged in skilled occupations and professions such as brick and stone mason, wine grower, tanner, merchant, stock dealer and teacher/attorney. Three of the homeowners, Carl Tiemann, Berthold Hoffmann and Ferdinand Koch, were founding members of the Harmonie Verein; Carl Tiemann was also president of the Augusta Mutual Savings & Loan Association, established in 1860 (See Historic Context subthemes: "Immigration and Settlement ca. 1830-1860"; and "Development of Cultural Traditions and Institutions, ca.1850-1865). District houses of the early settlement period are typical vernacular designs executed in log, frame, and brick; two were combination house-stores. Ebenezer Evangelical Church (now United Church of Christ), founded in 1843, erected its present Romanesque Revival building in 1861 in a round-arched style characteristic of traditions (See Historic Context German design subtheme, "Architecture ca. 1836-1943").

The prominent role that Augusta's wine industry played in the town's history is represented in the District by one pivotal property, the Augusta Wine Co. Building, as well as by two saloons, and several District residents who were associated with wine production (See Historic Context subtheme, "Wine Industry ca. 1850-1917"). An unusual example of local initiative, the Augusta Wine Company was organized as a co-op by a group of Augusta vintners seeking a stronger market position for their product. Incorporated in 1867 with a capital stock of \$6000 (increased to \$7200 in 1869), the objectives of the company included building a "spacious wine cellar...to prepare a better and uniform quality of wine; to give to those who raise grapes on a small scale an opportunity to sell the same at a good price" (Deed Book V2, pages 537-38). Stock was issued at \$100 per share. The first president was Follenius, son of Giessen Society leader, Paul Follenius. Growers pooled their grape product annually, and profits were divided among the members in proportion to the value of the grapes delivered by each after deducting all cost for winemaking. The brick wine hall at 5573 Walnut Street (Photo #7) was erected circa 1867 above two The building's segmental arches, levels οf cellars. denticulation on side elevations, and high parapeted gable-end are features typical of Missouri German vernacular design traditions. The Grape Culturist (July 1870) reported that the company in 1869 had made 8000 gallons of wine and planted 3675 vines; 5200 vines under cultivation were over two years old. District resident John William Koch (son of Berlin Society member and winegrower Ferdinand Koch) was superintendent of the winery for a number of years; later he purchased the major share and conducted business on his own into the 1890s.

Among the buildings constructed during the latter 19th century by second generation Germans are several whose substantial size and design reflect the prosperity of a conservative, well-established community. The commodius, two-story brick Fritz Tiemann house (5585 Walnut) built circa 1880 adjacent to the family store (Photo # 5) marks a break with the older convention of combination house-store which his father Carl had built about 1860. Both the house with its Italianate cornice and the gable-fronted store addition with open glazed storefront illustrate limited adoption of national style elements on vernacular designs. Contemporary with the Tiemann buildings is the circa 1880 house-store at 5500 Locust (Photo #3,left) erected by Carl Wencker,jr. While maintaining the traditional house-store plan, the building exhibits awareness of new fashions in its decorative vergeboard, cast iron storefront and iron side balcony (See subtheme, "Architecture ca.1836-1943"). The


relocation of the Wencker general store from its mid-19th century riverfront site (established by Wencker's Prussian-born father) was symbolic of the shift of commerce to the north side of town when the river receded and vehicular transportation via county roads replaced river trade. Both Wenckers, father and son, served as Postmaster in Augusta operating from their respective stores.

In addition to development as the institutional and commercial center of town, the north end of Augusta also became a favored residential section and in the late 19th and early 20th century received the most stylish house designs: first, modest frame Queen Anne houses (Photo # 9), followed by Bungalows in the 1920s. One of the Queen Anne styled houses was built for Carl Wencker who had sold his house-store in 1904 and was operating a vineyard. Although the majority of 20th century properties were built by second or third generation German Americans, at least one circa 1910 house was constructed for a retired Prussian-born farmer who moved into town (See subtheme, "Architecture ca.1836-1943").

Underscoring local recognition of the primacy of the northern section of town, Augusta's first sidewalks were built in 1888 connecting Tiemann's general store at Walnut and Jackson Wencker's general store at Locust and Lower (1), at the northeast edge, where, circa 1905, a new Post Office building was erected on a lot owned by the town. In the second quarter of the 20th century, when garages were introduced to service horseless carriages and automated farm machinery, these businesses were located along northern corridors which connected to county roads. Augusta's Public Square, (Block 31, bounded by Walnut, Chestnut, Green, and Ferry Streets) had been donated to the town in 1855 by Christian Knoernschild as a market place. The town hall (demolished) was constructed there in 1892. In 1942, municipal services were expanded when the Augusta Community Fire Company was organized; the following year a new brick two- engine fire house was constructed at Walnut and Green Streets in the town square.



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
