Autumn 2009 Notes

From April 1 until Nov. 1, Dr. Edmund A. Babler Memorial State Park is open daily from 7 a.m. until 9 p.m. The visitor center is open daily from 8:30 a.m. until 4 p.m.

Dr. Edmund A. Babler Memorial State Park visitor center presents free nature films during regular business hours in the Owl's Eye Theater. Stop by the visitor center between 8:30 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. to see the feature film of the week.

Campground amphitheater programs are offered every Saturday at 7 p.m. from Memorial Day until the end of September. Contact the visitor center to find out this week's topic. You don't have to be a camper to enjoy these awesome programs!

What are those purple boxes hanging from trees in the campground? They are research traps for emerald ash borers. These traps can help us determine whether or not the park has a problem with this invasive beetle. The emerald ash borer has plagued nearby states. These non-native beetles are very invasive and destroy all species of ash trees. Emerald ash borers like to hitch a ride in firewood. Emerald ash borers were found in southern Missouri last summer. Please help maintain the ash trees in the area by not bringing wood into the park. You may purchase wood for campfires from the campground host. If you do bring your own wood, please take any "leftovers" home with you!

Are you interested in a nature or history program for your school field trip or your Scout group? Park interpreters do programs on a wide variety of topics. The autumn and winter schedules are filling up, so contact park interpreters to schedule a program for your group today!

Aug. 8, 2009 - Bug Day and Open House - 10 a.m. - 2 p.m.

On Nov. 7, 2008, a fire devastated the Alta Shelter Picnic Pavilion at Dr. Edmund A. Babler Memorial State Park. The main rock work still stands and plans are being made to restore the shelter with the same design and materials used by the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC).


The Alta Shelter was built in the late 1930s by the CCC, one of Franklin Roosevelt's work programs during the Great Depression. The men in the CCC lived and worked in parks, including Babler State Park, building structures, roads and trails and re-establishing healthy forests and wilderness areas. The heavy timber posts, cross-gabled roof, hand chiseled stone walls and four fireplaces at the Alta Shelter were a beautiful example of the workmanship of the CCC - buildings and structures designed to blend in and enhance the natural atmosphere of their environment.

Although many of the buildings still stand proud and tall, not many of the CCC men are still around - the youngest of them would be in their 90s. But any CCC member still around would probably tell you that the CCC changed his life. Most of the men came from families struggling to survive during the Great Depression. Not only did the CCC provide them with beds to sleep in, three filling meals a day, educational opportunities and confidence in their abilities, the men, aged 18-25, also learned to have a strong work ethic and a determination that everything worth doing is worth doing well.

Although fire destroyed portions of the Alta Shelter (see pictures), many other buildings at Babler State Park continue to demonstrate the superb craftsmanship of these hard working young men. The Cochran Shelter, bridges throughout the park, the old nature center, the historic stables, and many other buildings remain as beautiful, functional examples of the expertise and skills of the CCC. Many other parks throughout the Missouri state park system have a similar history and also display structures built by the CCC.

Next time you visit Babler State Park, give a second look to these picturesque structures and appreciate the exceptional skill and work that makes our park what it is today.
